Evening Times – November 1905 OGC Meeting in Trades Hall – Mr William Guthrie read a paper entitled “Recollections of Bridgeton” which started about the year 1830 “at the Farme Ford where Dalmarnock Bridge now crosses the Clyde.” “THIS AREA WAS MUCH USED FOR PRIZE FIGHTS BUT THE HUMAN ENCOUNTERS WERE HARDLY SO BRUTAL AS THE DOG-FIGHTS.” “There was a sand bank ....where boys sought pearl-bearing mussels.” “An interesting description was given of the house at which Mary Queen of Scots was said to have stopped for a few minutes in her flight from (the battle of) Langside.”

Evening Times – 16/01/1906 – OGC Meeting on 15/01/1906 – “Mr William C McBain who read an able paper on “The Literature of Old Glasgow” – an example was “McUre’s first history of Glasgow published in 1736.” Another example “Of the Glasgow of the 16<sup>th</sup>, 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> centuries, there was only one opinion, i.e., that it was a beautifully planned city, remarkable for pleasant gardens, orchards and shade trees. He recited the panegyrics of English travellers who with one accord extolled the city as a model in every respect.”

Evening News – 16/01/1906 – OGC Meeting in Trades Hall on 15/01/1906 – Mr William C McBain JP delivered a lecture on “The Literature of Old Glasgow”. An example – Burt’s “Northern Letters” published in 1725, where Glasgow is said to be the “prettiest and most uniform town I ever saw, and I believe there is nothing like it in Britain.”

Daily Record – 19/02/1906 – OGC Meeting in Trades Hall on 18/02/1906 – Lecturer Rev. John Wilkinson, Rector of St Andrews Episcopal Church, Glasgow Green, “who gave an account of Jacobite Episcopacy in Glasgow, and the circumstances under which the English Chapel of St Andrew was built in 1750.”

An example – “Bishop Duncan, who counted loyalty to the House of Stuart such a fundamental of the faith that he declined to administer the last Sacrament to a young soldier who had fought for the Hanoverian King!”

Glasgow Herald - 19/02/1906 - OGC Meeting in Trades Hall on 18/02/1906 - Lecturer Rev. John Wilkinson. An example – “With reference to the proposed demolition of Provand’s Lordship, in Cathedral Square, the secretary was instructed to confer with the Glasgow Institute of Architects on the subject.”

Glasgow Herald – 20/03/1906 – OGC Meeting in Trades Hall on 19/03/1906 – Lecturer Mr Michael Graham read an interesting paper on “The Early Glasgow Press” – the Lecturer explained the nature of the once keenly discussed ‘taxes on knowledge’. The stamping of newspapers, he said began as far back as 1712 when one penny was imposed for revenue purposes ..... and in 1815 it reached the high water mark at 4 pennies. Its final abolition as a compulsory tax did not take place till 1855.”

Glasgow Herald - April 1906 – OGC Meeting in Trades hall – “Mr John Wilson delivered a lecture on “Civic Patriotism” which had inspired our fore-fathers in the up building of Glasgow City.”
