# **Book of Arrests in Glasgow**

## **From 20<sup>th</sup> October 1816 to 24<sup>th</sup> December 1816**

### **Introduction**

This book was donated to the Trades House Archives by the Old Glasgow Club and as it holds so much exciting and never before seen information, it was decided to transcribe it to enable the wider public to access the material. It is a treasure trove for people researching their family tree and those interested in Glasgow society in the early 1800s.

The following is a short guide to those who may not know about Glasgow Policing in its early years. Glasgow had the first police force in Britain. Glasgow's first police force was established in 1779 but due to the lack of finance it ceased in 1781. It was reformed in 1788 but again due to lack of financing lasted only until 1790. It was 1800 when the Glasgow Police Act came into being. Robert Peels Police did not come into being until 1829.

The duties of the early Glasgow police officers may seem rather strange compared to the present-day duties. The following is an example of some of their duties in the early 1800s:

1. patrolling the streets to detect and prevent crimes during the day, the evenings and at night.
2. detecting house and shop breaking and theft by pocket picking.
3. searching for stolen goods and detecting resellers (receivers) of stolen goods.
4. gathering information on crimes, convicted persons and the public houses they frequent, recording it in a book for the purpose.
5. suppressing riots, squabbles, begging and singing songs.
6. apprehending vagabonds, vagrants, and disorderly persons.
7. controlling carts and carriages.

Patrolling the street was the responsibility of two groups of people: a the watch and b) the Policemen. The images below show what the early Police and watch looked like.



The crimes that were addressed in 1816 at times appear rather trivial such as summoning stone masons for their lamps not working. Horses and carts being left unattended could mean a fine for the owner of the beast. Having a foul vent is an often seen arrest reason and this probably implies that the chimney was smoking excessively. Not keeping the pavement in front of the owners shops or houses could also mean a fine and woe betide those who did not clean away the frost in cold weather.

Punishments which could be given in the police office could vary from a small fine to up to 30 days in Bridewell. Bridewell was a prison built in 1798 and which became later known as Duke Street Prison. It was one of eight prisons that served Glasgow and its surrounding areas. In 1802 Glasgow's Bridewell prison could house 90 felons and by 1818 it was reported to be crowded to suffocation.
