#### The Incorporation of Skinners List of Officers from 1568 to 1851



In ancient times, every Incorporation had an Officer, this was not a rank, it was more of a servant to the Incorporation who assisted the Deacon in the administration of the organisation. On becoming a new member of the Incorporation, the person would have to serve as Officer until a new member was admitted and they would then take over the position. This was an unpaid position and would have to be carried out in addition to trying to earn a living as a tradesman whilst at the same time not being allowed to hire an Apprentice or a servant until two years after he finished his time as an apprentice. He would still have to pay his Quarter dues to the Craft as every other member of the Incorporation had to.

In 1587, the Skinners Incorporation agreed to pay the Officer the "custom pennies in the market". The custom pennies were also known as "strangers' brod pennies" and this was the tax levied on tradespeople from outside of Glasgow, bringing in goods which fell under the Skinner's Craft, for sale in Glasgow. The men of Gorbals did not pay the brod penny as they had an agreement with the Incorporation whereby, they paid the Incorporation for the privilege of setting up stalls next to the Skinners. From just after 1696, the Officer became a permanent official and additional duties were given to him.

#### The duties of the officer included:

- 1. Warn Craftsmen and Masters of dates and times of meetings of the Craft.
- 2. To carry the Box and candles to the meeting place.
- 3. To attend on the Deacon at all public occasions such as banquets, processions, and the conveying of distinguished gentlemen in or out of town.
- 4. Execution with the concurrence of the Town's Officer the decrees of poinding (now known as impounding) and distraint passed by the Deacons and Masters on a Craft culprit.
- 5. One of the recognised searcher of skins, this was so that tax could be paid on the skins
- 6. Warning members of the funeral of a freeman or a freeman's wife, bairns or relations.

Once the Officer was a paid post, he was supplied in addition to his salary with clothing, hat, shoes, stockings, an overcoat, and sometimes a wig.
