



PREFACE.

A suggestion for a "Merchiston Register" occurs in *The Merchistonian* for 1893. Dr Rogerson at that time compiled a list of Names and Addresses, but he did not proceed farther. His list was invaluable in making the present Register, which was begun in 1902. The sources of information available were *The Merchiston Magazine*, 1837-42, '48; *The Merchiston Chronicle*, 1859; *The Merchistonian*, 1865-7, 1878 to the present time; and a School Roll which was started in 1863. The paucity of material accounts for the slowness with which the work progressed.

The Editor is particularly indebted to the late John Hunter Tait (O.M.) for valuable information about Merchistonians of the seventies and earlier, and for the History of the School, which forms the introduction to the Register; also to John Lamb, Esq. (O.M.), R. B. Webber, Esq., and F. D. Evans, Esq., for their contributions on Football, Cricket, and the Cadet Corps respectively.

There are necessarily many omissions and inaccuracies, the remedying of which must be left to Merchistonians All corrections and additions should be sent to the Editor.

A SHORT ACCOUNT OF MERCHISTON CASTLE SCHOOL.

VERCHISTON CASTLE was opened as a School in 1833 by Charles Chalmers, a younger brother of the celebrated Thomas Chalmers, D.D., LL.D. Their father, John Chalmers, was provost of Anstruther, in Fife, and there Charles Chalmers was born in 1792. From the parish school where he received his elementary education, Charles Chalmers proceeded to the University of St Andrews, where he distinguished himself chiefly in Mathematics and Science; but owing to ill health, he had to leave the University without taking a degree. On recovering his health, Mr Chalmers started business as a publisher in Glasgow, and the firm which he founded under the name of Chalmers & Collins, still flourishes as William Collins & Sons, Limited. In 1826 he retired from business, and returning to Edinburgh he resumed his scientific studies. He took a large house in Park Place, and there received as boarders boys and young men who were attending the Schools or University in Edinburgh, and whose studies he superintended. He found the work so congenial that his establishment changed from a mere boarding-house into a very successful private School, and in 1833 Mr Chalmers took a lease of Merchiston Castle, the family seat of Lord Napier of Merchiston, the descendant of the inventor of Logarithms, and removed there with his family and fifteen pupils on 24th May 1833. At that time, Merchiston was a country place, the town approaching no nearer than Tollcross. There was thus abundant scope for country rambles, bird nesting, and generally the study of

simple natural history, which in those days took the place of the organised games and athletics now constituting the physical side of education. Out-door games, such as cricket, football, and, more especially, shinty were of course played, but less regularly and systematically than now, and the element of competition with other schools was not introduced till some years later. The playing field then in use was the ground in front of the Castle, now covered by Abbotsford Park and Crescent. When that was given over to the builder, a field was rented at the back of the Castle where Mardale Crescent now stands. This continued to be used as the School cricket field until 1878, when the new field in Colinton Road, which had been acquired on a permanent title and levelled at great expense, was formally opened by a cricket match between teams representing Scotland and England.

The special feature of the School curriculum was the attention given to Mathematics and Science, at a time when the Classics were generally considered to be the only subjects of higher education. This feature attracted to the School a large number of boys who were preparing for the more scientific branches of the Services, as will be seen from a study of the *Register*. Others of the earlier pupils attained to high distinction in various branches of Science. Of these probably the most distinguished was Sir Charles Wyville Thomson, Professor of Natural History in the University of Edinburgh, and head of the "Challenger" expedition, which collected such invaluable material for scientific research.

The School prospered from the beginning, and in a short time the numbers increased from fifteen to rather over sixty. As Mr Chalmers' sons grew up, they assisted him in the management, and when in 1848, Mr Chalmers sought relief from the more burdensome duties of the Headmaster by residing outside the School, his son Mr Thomas Chalmers, then recently married, took his father's place as resident House Master. This arrangement continued for two years, when considerations of his own advancing age and his son's indifferent health, led Mr Chalmers to sell the School in 1850 to Mr John Gibson, then Government Inspector of Schools for Scotland. Mr Chalmers survived for fourteen years after he gave up the School. He devoted his leisure to the pursuit of the scientific studies which had always been his hobby, relieving the severity of his application by the cultivation of roses. In 1860 he was struck with paralysis, and in 1864 he died in Castle Bank, which adjoins the bowling green of the Castle, and is now part of the School property. With Mr Chalmers' retirement, the first chapter of the School history ends.

Mr John Gibson was born in Edinburgh in May 1813. He received his carly education in St George's School, Young Street; when studying at Edinburgh University he supported himself, in part at least, by private teaching, and eventually became a master at the Circus Place School. From there hc was chosen as head of the English Department of Madras College, St Andrews. In 1841, when he was 28 years old, he was appointed First Government Inspector for Schools in Scotland, his duties being confined to the superintendence of the schools connected with the Established Church. On the occurrence of the Disruption in 1843, Mr Gibson threw in his lot with the Free Church, and having resigned his Government Inspectorship, he was appointed Secretary of the Education Scheme of the Free Church, and continued to hold that position until the Government re-appointed him Inspector of Schools for Scotland which were not upon a denominational basis. In 1850, as above stated, he became proprietor and headmaster of Merchiston Castle School.

Under Mr Gibson the School increased in numbers, and by him important additions were made to the buildings. The Assembly Hall, with the room next it, now a masters' room, and the three class rooms underneath (called in my time "the old writing room," and the "middle" and "east class rooms," respectively), were built by him, the Assembly Hall being used as the dining-room and being called "the dining-room" till after the present dining-room was built in 1876. Mr Gibson also built the Gymnasium (called at Merchiston "the play-room"), and he also acquired, but only on lease, "Merchiston Bank," a house standing where Merchiston Bank Terrace now stands, as an extra boardinghouse. Mr Gibson's death in 1856 was a great loss to the School.*

On the death of Mr Gibson in 1856 he was succeeded as Headmaster—but not, I think, as proprietor of the School by Mr Thomas Harvey, M.A., Oxon. (and afterwards LL.D. of Edinburgh), who subsequently filled for many years the position of Rector of the Edinburgh Academy. Mr Harvey was a very distinguished Classical scholar. When in the winter of 1859, Dr Livingston, Professor of Greek in the University of Glasgow, was temporarily laid aside through

* I am indebted for the following sketch of him to his old pupil, Dr David Murray :--

"John Gibson was an excellent Headmaster. He was a singularly honourable and upright man, full of energy, and devoted to the School and the welfare of the boys under his charge. He was absolutely unselfish, and all his impulses were generous. He had no patience with anything that was mean or dishonourable, and ever sought to lift the boys to a higher plane and to be true, honest, and straightforward. The School was in perfect control. The boys loved and respected the Headmaster. He was somewhat quick-tempered, and occasionally mistook thoughtlessness for a grave offence, but he was quick to forgive and to forget; he harboured no ill-feeling, and there never was a breach between himself and any of the boys. The hearty grasp of his hand, his radiant smile, and his cheery voice told of a warm, true, and loving heart. His first thought was to make everyone happy, and to make the School a home.

"Educational methods and ideas differ much now as compared with those of fifty years ago, but during the period he was Headmaster Mr Gibson was abreast of the times, and education at Merchiston was much the same as at the Edinburgh Academy, which was then looked upon as the foremost school in Scotland. There were regular courses in Chemistry, Natural History, and Geology, and the Saturday afternoon excursions were one of the features of the School. The worship of athletics had not then set in, and football, as now played, was unknown, but there was plenty of football of a kind, and games of all kinds were played with vigour. Mr Gibson took unwearied interest in them ; he spared no pains or money in providing facilities, and was always ready to grant an extra half-holiday when lessons were being well done and there was a tempting afternoon.

" Mrs Gibson was a most charming and delightful woman, endowed with a perfect temper, a sunny disposition, and a sweet soft voice. ill health, Mr Harvey was appointed to fill the vacancy, a fact which bore testimony alike to his reputation as a scholar and a teacher. It was he who first introduced into Merchiston a regular system of written examinations, and probably the Classical Education at the School profited by his Headmastership. As a disciplinarian and organiscr he was less successful, and the number of the pupils was rather reduced during his reign. Mr Harvey resigned the Headmastership in 1863, and was succeeded by Mr Rogerson, who was then on Mr Harvey's staff.

Another of Mr Harvey's assistants at Merchiston was Hely Hutchinson Almond, M.A., Oxon., and subsequently LL.D., Glasgow, who died on 7th March 1903, after being Headmaster of Loretto School for forty years. It is a fact With much dignity, she was a mother to each boy, always ready to advise, to help, and to sympathise. She was the friend of every boy. She knew all about his home and his people and how he felt at school. It would have been impossible to find a more ideal wife for a Headmaster than Mrs Gibson. He was a true, earnest, upright, and honourable man ; and she a true helpmate.

"The School met after the holidays in the beginning of October 1856. Upon the first night Mr Gibson conducted prayers as usual. He had some favourite hymns; one was the 121st Psalm, another was the 60th Paraphrase. On this night he chose the latter. He gave out the third and fourth verses. He read, as he always did, with great feeling, earnestness, and reverence, as if the words were a personal prayer. He had a fine, rich baritone voice, and I can hear the words now as I heard them then and never since with such fullness and force :—

> " O may Thy Spirit seal our souls, And mould them to Thy will, That our weak hearts no more may stray, But keep Thy precepts still ; That to perfection's sacred height We nearer still may rise, And all we think, and all we do, Be pleasing in Thine eves.

"After prayers, he came and stood at the door of the dining-hall, shook hands with everyone; with a kind inquiry here and a word of encouragement there. His face, however, was thin and dark, and showed that he suffered pain. He never appeared amongst us again; and in the course of a few days there had passed to his rest a great and good man, vir bonus et justus, one who had worked strenuously and had faithfully performed the life-work laid upon him." not without interest, that the heads of the Edinburgh Academy, Merchiston Castle School, and Loretto School, for a period of nearly thirty years, had all worked together on the staff of Merchiston.

John Johnston Rogerson was born in Annandale in 1831. He received his earlier education at Moffat Academy and afterwards graduated in Arts at Edinburgh University. Taking up teaching as his lifework, he was for a time an Assistant Master at Loretto School under Mr Langhorne. He then spent seven years in a similar position at Cheltenham College. While there he studied for and obtained the degree of LL.B., of London University. In 1891 Edinburgh University conferred on him the degree of LL.D. in recognition of his services to education.

Dr Rogerson returned to Edinburgh about 1858, and became a Visiting Master at, among other Schools, Merchiston Castle. On Mr Harvey's resignation in 1863, Mr Rogerson was appointed to succeed him as Headmaster, and then, or shortly afterwards, purchased from the executors of Mr Gibson their interest in the School.

For thirty-five years Mr Rogerson remained Headmaster, each year increasing his influence, the respect and affection of his pupils, the loyal attachment of his former pupils, and the reputation of the School. To give details of his work at Merchiston would be impossible with the space at my disposal, but what follows conveys, I think, an idea of the gradual expansion of the School, both as regards numbers and equipment, and it may be assumed that the mental and physical training kept pace with that growth.

The old field at the back of the Castle having been feued by the landlords for building purposes, the new field of 14 acres (to which another acre has since been added), in the Colinton Road was feued by Dr Rogerson from the Merchant Company in 1875, and after having been levelled at great expense, was first occupied by the School in the cricket season of 1878. The Old Merchistonians built and presented to Dr Rogerson, for the School, the pavilion in the new field. A year or two later Castle Bank, the house to the east of the Castle grounds, was added to the School property, and a new wing was built and fitted up as cubicles for the older boys. Later, new class rooms were built in the west gardens, and from time to time added to. The buildings there now consist of a Chemical Laboratory, a Physics Laboratory, Class Rooms for Classics, Mathematics, English, and the Headmaster's Private Class; the Grant Museum; and the Library, which was built and presented to the School by Dr Rogerson on the occasion of his retiral.

In the earlier days of the School the lands to the west of the Castle were still part of a farm called Merchiston Grange, but known to many generations of Merchiston boys as "Porteous's," from the farmer's name. When the site of the farm-house was also feued for building purposes, Dr Rogerson acquired it and erected thereon the sanatorium, named Merchiston Grange, after the old farm. In stormier times in Scotland, it was not uncommon for fortified places to have a secret subterranean passage from the keep to some place at a distance, by which, in the event of a siege, communication could be kept up with the outside world. That such a passage existed between Merchiston Castle and "Porteons's" was devoutly believed by the Lower School of my days, and curiously enough, when the workmen were digging the foundations of the sanatorium, they found the traces of an arched tunnel running in the direction of the Castle. Its condition made a full exploration impossible, but it afforded at least a partial confirmation of the legend.

In 1890 Merchiston Lodge, lying to the east of Castle Bank, was purchased by Dr Rogerson, and a Preparatory School started there under his supervision. This has flourished so well that first Merchiston Villa, which lies on the eastern boundary of the Lodge, and then Merchiston House, which faces the Lodge, have been added to the accommodation of the Preparatory, and the boys who enter the big School through the Preparatory as a rule do better, both at work and games, than those who have been grounded under a different system.

In 1884 the Merchiston Castle School Cadet Corps

attached to the Queen's Edinburgh Rifle Volunteer Brigade, was started. The officers of that brigade have always shown the greatest interest in the Cadet Corps, and have given them all the assistance and encouragement in their power. In connection with this movement a miniature rifle range has been fitted up under "the arches" outside the gymnasium. This is useful for occasional practice, but the regular firing practice and the matches of the Shooting VIII. take place on the Volunteer ranges at Hunter's Bog and Malleny. The Corps was specially commended for its smartness at the Review of School Cadet Corps in Windsor Great Park by Her late Majesty Queen Victoria in 1897. Although the Shooting VIII. is made up only of those who are not capable cricketers, they have already won the Scottish Public Schools Trophy and have taken a very good place at Bisley in the competition for the Ashburton Shield.

It is impossible to mention the Cadet Corps without recording the School's indebtedness to the late Mr J. R. Burgess, for many years Vice-Master of the School, and Major David Dickson, Q.E.R.V.B.

To preserve the School on its old lines in all time coming, and to give old Merchistonians an effective voice in its management, a Company was formed in 1896 called "Merchiston Castle School, Limited." Dr Rogerson was the original Chairman of the Company, and he remained Headmaster of the School under the Company until his successor in that office could be found. To this Company Dr Rogerson transferred on 30th September 1896 the whole of his property and rights in connection with the School. The Company have since added to their property Merchiston House and Merchiston Villa, already mentioned in connection with the Preparatory School, and "Castle Gate," a house facing the Castle, and extending with its grounds from Abbotsford Park to Abbotsford Crescent. They have also built on the vacant ground at the back of the Castle facing Mardale Crescent, a new set of baths, lavatories, changing rooms and others; studies for the older boys; a new classroom; rooms for piano practice; a large workshop fitted

with carpenters' benches, turning lathes, etc.; and a couple of fives courts which are much used. Though the finances of the School are administered by the Directors of the Company, the scholastic arrangements are left to the Headmaster, who is the proper educational expert. But this does not prevent the Directors taking a warm personal interest in these as in all matters pertaining to the School.

In 1898 Dr Rogerson resigned office as Headmaster, and Mr George Smith, M.A. (Edin. and Oxon.), was appointed his successor by the unanimous vote of the Directors. Mr Smith, who is a native of Ayrshire, and had a most distinguished career at both his Universities, was a master at Rugby for seven years before he came to us, during part of which time he was the head of one of the smaller houses there.

Though he resigned the Headmastership in 1898, Dr Rogerson retained the office of Chairman of the Company. He continued to live near the School, and to take an individual interest in the boys, whom it was his delight to entertain whenever the School rules permitted. His house was the great *rendezvous* of old Merchistonians; his correspondence with them was enormous; his influence with them greater than can well be stated. When, on the 25th January 1903, he entered into his rest, there was hardly a corner of the world to which Merchistonians had penetrated but sent forth its note of mourning. Nor was it his own old pupils alone who mourned him; the other schools whom we met in friendly rivalry on the football and cricket field bore generous testimony to the respect in which they held him; and, indeed, every one who knew him looked up to him.

When Dr Rogerson retired from the Headmastership in 1898, the School, the staff, and the Merchistonians founded in his honour two scholarships, to be called the Rogerson Scholarships, each of the annual value of $\pounds 30$, and tenable for three years, to be awarded to boys who are about to leave Merchiston for the University. By his will Dr Rogerson left a sum of money to the trustees of the original fund, to found another scholarship under the same conditions, and to augment the value of the existing scholarships. This results in there being one scholarship for competition each year.

As the athletic records of the School are dealt with by other writers, and the distinctions of all kinds obtained by Merchistonians are set forth in the Register, there is only one more subject to be referred to, viz., the Merchistonian Club. This is an association founded in the 'sixties to promote social intercourse amongst the old pupils of the School, and to show their collective interest in the School. The latter object is attained by the presentation of an annual prize, called The Merchistonian Prize, awarded to the best classical scholar in the School, "if he be found worthy." The social intercourse is promoted by an annual dinner, to which all Merchistonians, whether members of the Club or not, are made welcome; by an annual golf competition amongst members of the Club, at which two medals are competed for-a scratch medal and a handicap medal; and by sending copies of the School magazine to all members of The Merchistonian Club has also on various the Club. occasions proved a useful organisation for concerted action of any sort by Merchistonians, and any football or cricket tours by Merchistonian teams and the annual matches with the School are supported, though not entirely managed, by the Club. It is the duty of every public-spirited Merchistonian to join the Club.

F O O T B A L L.

1857 - 8.

It is probable that football of a kind was played, amongst themselves, by the boys at Mcrchiston in the years prior to 1858; but in that year, so far as we know, the School XX., under the captaincy of A. P. Van der Byl, for the first time engaged with a foreign foe, playing a drawn game with the Royal High School. The Rugby School game had just been introduced into Mcrchiston, and when the match in question was played, they "did not fully understand all its rather complex rules."

1858-9.

In the following season, with J. C. Campbell as captain, several matches were played. We drew with Edinburgh Academy on their ground—this being our first meeting with them. A return match, at Merchiston, also ended in a draw, but in this match we had the assistance of two masters, Messrs Almond (afterwards the respected head of Loretto) and E. P. Rouse (afterwards a master at Eton), while the Academy, to balance matters, had two Academicals to help them. A XX., consisting of ten from Merchiston and ten from the Academy, defeated the Academicals by a goal to nothing, and XVIII. of Merchiston, with four masters, drew with XXII. of the Royal High School.

1859-60.

G. E. Coxon captained the team this season, in which we secured our first win over the Academy, beating them on their own ground by 2 goals to nothing. After Christmas they in their turn had the satisfaction of recording their first victory over us, winning at Merchiston by a goal to nothing. These appear to have been the only matches played.

1860-1.

The Academy match, played at Merchiston, ended in a draw, though we claimed to have had the better of the game, in virtue of a try scored by L. G. Mylne (afterwards Bishop of Bombay), but no goal was kicked. In these days, and until 1875, only goals counted. All goals, whether from tries, drops, or marks, were of equal value. These facts must be kept in mind in studying the records of these bye-gone years. A Merchistonian team, consisting of Merchistonians and present pupils, played a couple of matches against the Academicals, also a blend of old and present boys. They won the first by a dropped goal and several tries, while the second was drawn, though a number of tries were gained by our opponents. The intervals between these somewhat infrequent matches with outside teams appear to have been filled by various matches in the School itself, and titanic struggles they must have been. We read of one—the "table match"—which was drawn after three days' play, no goal being kicked. Another, the first XV. against the School, with masters, lasted for four days, on two of which there was three hours' play, and finally resulted in a win for the School by 2 goals to nothing. This margin, we learn, would probably have been greater had the School team mustered in full force each day, "but absenteeism was rather too prevalent," and a special rule was devised to put a stop to this shirking, though one cannot help thinking the gallant "XV." must have welcomed, in the course of this long battle, an occasional diminution in the enemy's forces. Experiences such as these explain the complaint made in the report of the Academy match just referred to, that "the result of the match was, as that of one day matches will very often be, unsatisfactory, as no goal was kicked,"—a mere two hours game must have seemed a triffing affair.

1861-5.

At this stage *The Merchiston Chronicle*, our authority so far, suspended publication, and for the years from 1861-2 to 1863-4, no records of football matches exist. Nor is a diligent search in the files of the daily papers of the period of any avail, for football matches were not then deemed worthy of report. In 1865 the first number of *The Merchistonian* was published, and from it we learn that the Academy match of 1864-5, played at Raeburn Place, was drawn. Our team that season was above the average, as many of the previous year's XX. had returned, but so unfavourable was the weather, that only one other match was played—against the Academicals, at Raeburn Place, which we lost. It is also on record that in the previous season, 1863-4, we played 8 matches and only lost 1, so we must have had a good side that season also.

1865-6.

Under the captaincy of J. M. Anderson we played two close matches with the Academy, who won both—the first by a goal to a try, the second by a goal from a mark and a try to nothing. The first recorded match with Craigmount was played this season, XV. a side, and was won by us by a goal and several tries to nothing.

1866-7.

J. Cameron was captain till Christmas, being then succeeded by W. Cross, a future international player. Craigmount were beaten at Merchiston (XV. a side) by 6 goals (one dropped) and 11 tries to nothing, and, although the score indicates the one-sidedness of the game, we are told that our opponents "exhibited no small amount of pluck; and in 'hacking,' they showed themselves equal to ns." We drew with the Academy at Raeburn Place, although they scored 2 tries to nothing; but in the return at Merchiston they won by 2 goals and a try to a try—the only defeat we suffered during the season. On Christmas Day 1866, the 2nd XX. journeyed to Polmont, played the 1st XX. of Blairlodge, and won by 2 goals to nothing. The report of this match from *The Mcrchistonian*, vol. II., page 100, we give verbatim, as an example of football reporting in these days, and as showing that football matches, even then, were not devoid of occasional amusing features:—"SECOND TWENTY MERCHISTON v. FIRST TWENTY BLAIRLODGE. — At Blairlodge, Polmont, 25th December 1866.—Time—2 honrs.—No match could have been played in more unfavourable weather than this, for, from the commencement till the end of the time fixed on, it never ceased to rain, more or less. Indeed, the question was at first raised whether or not it

would be advisable to play under the circumstances; but our team having come so far, being anxious for a 'set to,' and their opponents having no objection, a 'friendly' match was commenced. Perhaps some of our gentle readers will think they could well dispense with the kind of friendship which ensued. One has only to bear in mind the following facts,-that it had been raining previous to the match, that it rained during the match, that the ground was of itself exceedingly soft, and that forty boys were engaged kicking the ball and each other, and he will be able to form some idea of the scene. Without being blamed for indulging too much in hyperbole, we may assert that some of the boys looked more like masses of mud than human beings, and that it would have been a matter of no great difficulty to have planted potatoes on them. In fact, it would hardly have been possible to have made them dirtier, and yet what boy does not take an absolute delight in coming out of a football match covered over with mud? The mud is a mark of distinction-an indication (though not always a sure one) that he has nobly fought. It may here be mentioned that we fully commiserated the Blairlodge team, who, unlike us, having no 'togs' to play in but their School clothes, were in such a miserable plight, that we doubt if even 'Old Clo' himself would have given anything for them. With regard to the match itself, we have but little to say. As the Blairlodge team knew nothing about 'rugby rules,' we were forced to play Their rules may be summed up in a sentence, -Play any way you theirs. like, provided. in case of a goal, that the ball be kicked between two upright posts. Nearly an hour elapsed before a goal was obtained, and then it was by Young 'of ours.' We got our second goal just as time was about to be called, Roland cleverly kicking it. Owing to the circumstances we have already mentioned, there was little display of prowess on either side. With regard to the Blairlodge team, our attention was mainly directed to three brothers, all of them very little fellows, who played very spiritedly, and were of immense service to their XX. On our side R. Pringle played with great pluck ; indeed we never saw him play better, his move-ments during the whole of the game seemed to be ubiquitous." During this season we had four XXs. playing for us.

1867-8.

Under the captaincy of A. Thew, the seasou opened auspiciously with a runaway victory over Craigmount on their own ground, our score being 3 goals and a number of tries to nothing. Madras College, then a large School with "from eight to nine hundred pupils," was met for the first time. The match was played at St Andrews, and after a close struggle we just won by a goal to nothing ; but as Masters appear to have played on both sides, this cannot strictly be counted a "School" match. The Academy proved much too strong for us, and won both matches—the first by a goal, a dropped goal, and 2 tries to a goal ; the second by 3 goals and 5 tries to nothing. This scason, apparently for the first time, we played Loretto. One master, at least, played on either side, and we won by 3 goals (2 from marks) and 5 tries to a goal, kicked by Mr Almond, "by a very good kick."

1868 - 9.

The records for this year are incomplete, as *The Merchistonian* had become somewhat irregular in its publication, but with J. J. Downes as captain, we drew with Craigmount on their own ground, Craigmount scoring 2 tries to nothing; and beat them in the return match, no particulars being available. The Academy still proved too strong for us, and won at Raeburn Place by 2 goals and 3 tries to nothing.

1869-70.

To W. H. C. Dickins, who captained the team this season, belongs the credit of stemming the tide of defcats from the Academy, for we beat them at Raeburn Place by a goal and a try to a try-the first win for several One sentence from the report of this match deserves to be ycars. excerpted, as showing how important a part spectators might play in these days, when the referec was yet undreamt of, and all debatable points were argued out by the respective captains. "Both Schools were well represented outside the flags, some 'Old Merchistonians' having come from a great distance, and we trust they will ever on such occasions make it a point to give us their conntenance, which must of necessity (in the event of any dispute arising) save the few from being swamped by the many." With Craigmount we played a scoreless draw at Craigmount---a very tough match in which "the play was most determined throughout, and not less so, it must be confessed, was the hacking." The Merchistonian now lapsed for a period of seven years, so there are no "internal" records of School life, but, fortunately, football had by this time become a matter of public interest, and football matches, both school and club, appear to have been regularly reported. The files of The Scotsman furnish what is probably a fairly complete record of matches, and to these we are indebted for such information as we give of the doings from 1870-1 to 1876-7.

1870-1.

E. Thew was captain, and the season opened with a victory over Loretto at Pinkie by a goal and 4 tries to nothing—XV. a side being played. The Academy match, at Raebnrn Place, was drawn, the Academy scoring a try to nothing. No other School matches appear to have been played.

1871 - 2.

W. Ross captained the XX., but the list of School matches is as meagre as the previous season. The Academy were beaten at Merchiston by 2 goals to nothing, the return at Raebnrn Place resulting in a scoreless draw. It may be interesting to note, in passing, that on 25th November 1871 the Academy and Loretto met for the first time on level terms---XI. a side being played.

1872-3.

Frost and snow materially interfered with football, but two matches with the Academy were brought off. In the first, at Raeburn Place, we drew, scoring a try to nothing, and in the second, at Merchiston, the Academy suffered a severe defeat, our score being 2 goals and 3 tries to nothing. The Loretto match was frequently postponed owing to the weather, and nltimately fell through. Trinity College, Gleualmond, we played for the first time. The match took place on Sth March on the North Inch, Perth, XV. a side, and we won by 6 goals and 2 tries to nothing, but the reporter adds, "it is only fair to state that, owing to a long continuance of snow, Trinity College have had almost no practice since Christmas, besides they are not accustomed to play the Rugby Union Rules." Arthur Kirkland captained the team this season.

Football.

1873-4.

Alfred Kirkland succeeded his brother as captain. Fettes Collegc appeared as our opponents for the first time and drew a match, in which we claim to have had much the better of the game, but we failed to score. The two Academy matches were drawn. In the first, at Raeburn Place, nothing was scored, in the second, at Merchiston, they obtained 2 tries to nothing.

1874-5.

C. J. Kirkpatrick, who captained the School this season, had but few of the previous year's XX. to help him, and the team is described as "light." It was certainly very unsuccessful in School matches as the record shows. Fettes Collegc, by beating us by a goal and 7 tries to nothing, showed that they were a power to be reckoned with in the future. Loretto (XV. a side) were beaten at Merchiston by a goal and a try to nothing, but the Academy proved much too strong for us, winning by 4 goals and 2 tries to nothing. The return match with Loretto at Pinkie (XV. a side again) was lost by a goal.

1875-6.

The history of this season can be given in very brief compass. A severe winter curtailed the opportunities for football, and only two School matches were played. The first, against the Academy at Merchiston, was drawn, a try all. The second, against Craigmount, also at Merchiston, was won by a try to nothing, for tries now counted towards the winning of the game. H. Cowe was captain, but in neither report are the names of our team given.

1876-7.

A larger number of matches were played during this season and greater success attended our efforts. A. H. Dickins was captain, the first captain of a XV., for the old XX. became a thing of the past, and XV. a side henceforth the regulation number. The Academy were beaten at Raeburn Place by a try to nothing. We drew with Craigmount at Merchiston, a try each. Fettes beat us at Merchiston by a dropped goal to nothing. We played two matches with the Royal High School, winning at Holyrood by 2 goals (1 dropped) and a try to nothing, and at Merchiston by 4 goals and "many" tries. Craigmount, on their own ground, just won by a try to nothing, but the Academy at Merchiston were easily beaten by a goal and 4 tries to nothing. This latter match marks the turning point in our encounters with the Academy. From this time onwards, till now, we have held the upper hand, and although, in the long series of matches which follow, we have had many a tough fight and not a few defeats, they drop from the position of our chief rivals, and Fettes College take that place, a *rôle* which, to say the least of it, they have played somewhat effectively ever since.

1877 - 8.

This season *The Mcrchistonian* was revived, and has been regularly published ever since. With A. H. Dickins again captain, and most of the previous year's team back, prospects were bright. That these anticipations were amply fulfilled is proved by the fact that we won six and drew one of the seven School matches played. For the first time our 1st XV. played Blairlodge. The match was played at Polmont, and resulted in a win for us by 5 goals and 5 tries to nothing. Fettes College were beaten at Fettes by a try to nothing, after a very hard struggle. We won easily against Craigmount on their own ground, by 5 tries to nothing; and another casy victory, over the Academy, at Merchiston, in which we scored 2 goals and 5 trics to nothing, completed a very satisfactory record for the first half of the season. After Christmas we again beat Craigmount, at Merchiston, this time by 2 goals and a try to nothing. Another hard match with Fettes on our ground resulted in a scoreless draw. This was the last School match on the old ground behind the Castle, for at Easter a move was made to the present ground on Colinton Road. The "flitting," and the fact that this last match on the old ground left us "cock" school for the year, is fittingly recorded in poetry in *The Merchistonian*, Vol. V., p. 138.

FAREWELL.

No more upon our ancient field We see the football bound, No more the smiting bat shall yield Reverberating sound. No more a-down the well-known hill Shall player charge the foe: Such days are o'er, our field no more Its wonted games shall know. The only sound that strikes the ear Is the thud of the mallet's fall, And houses rise upon the site Of many a hard-fought maul; But though we grieve our field to leave, One pleasure still we own To cheer our saddened hearts again, And for our loss atone ; For the last match our field has seen, Our field will ever see, Has made us chicf of all the schools-So may we ever be !

A second win over the Academy, at Raeburn Place, by a goal and 2 tries to nothing, concluded a very successful season, in which we could fairly claim to be the best school team, though our superiority over Fettes College was very slight. J. A. Campbell, who proved a tower of strength to the XV. throughout the season, was chosen to play for Scotland, and was thus the first Merchiston *schoolboy* international.

1878-9.

With seven of the previous ycar's victorious team back, a fairly good season might have been expected, but the weather throughout proved most unfavourable, and only three School matches could be played. We won the Academy match at Raeburn Place, by a goal and try to a dropped goal; lost to Fettes College on their ground, by a goal, dropped by A. R. Don Wauchope, to nothing; and drew with Craigmount, no scoring. T. A. Begbie captained the team.

1879-80.

E. C. Millar was captain, and with but few of the previous year's team to fall back upon, the XV. proved but moderate. Craigmount beat us at Merchiston by a dropped goal to nothing, and we just managed to get the Football.

better of Blairlodge at Merchiston, by a try. The other School matches before Christmas were all off owing to frost. In the second term the Academy won easily at Raeburn Place, by a goal and 3 tries to nothing. The previous defeat by Craigmount was avenged on their ground, for we managed to win by a goal and a try to nothing, but Fettes College proved much too strong for ns, winning by 3 goals and 4 tries to nothing, special mention being made of the brilliant play of the Fettes Captain, A. R. Don Wauchope, who thus early showed what a great player he was. We managed, however, to wind up a rather disastrous season by a win over the Royal High School, by 3 goals to 2 tries. Unsuccessful as the XV. was, it was the first to wear a special XV. cap, but it was rather less pretentious than the present silver-braided one.

1880-1.

This season the Loretto match, which had fallen into abeyance for some years, was revived, and the "Schools Championship" became an accepted institution. With H. C. Webster as captain, and a good nucleus from last season, prospects were bright, and were not belied by the performances of the team. We began rather badly by a defeat from Fettes College, at Fettes, after a close match, their score being a try to nothing, but after that all went well. Blairlodge, at Polmont, furnished poor opposition, for we won by 11 goals and 8 tries to nothing. Craigmount were beaten by a try to nothing ; Loretto, at Pinkie, by a goal to a try ; Academy, at Raeburn Place, by 3 tries to 1. After Christmas we just managed to win against Loretto, on our ground, by a try to nothing, but swamped the Academy, at Merchiston, by 4 goals and 7 tries to nothing, and pulled off the return match with Fettes College by a goal and a try to nothing, thereby winning the School Championship. Of the eight School matches played, seven were won and one lost—17 goals and 21 tries against 3 tries ; but the bulk of the scoring was done against Blairlodge and the Academy. Fettes College, Craigmount, Loretto, and ourselves were very evenly matched.

1881-2.

T. Anderson was captain, and five of the previous XV. were back. We began by beating the Academy at Raeburn Place by a goal to nothing, and followed this up by a win over Blairlodge at Merchiston by 3 goals and 2 tries to nothing. Craigmount were easily beaten at Craigmount by 2 goals and 5 tries to nothing, but the match with Fettes College, at Merchiston, ended in a scoreless draw. Loretto at Pinkie beat us rather badly by 3 goals and a try to nothing—a result which is described as "somewhat of a surprise." Craigmount again sustained defeat, our score being 5 goals and 7 trics; and we secured another victory over Blairlodge by 1 goal and 4 tries to nothing. The Fettes College match at Fettes resulted as the previous game had done in a scoreless draw-though our opponents are allowed to have had the better of the game. The Academy were beaten at Merchiston by 2 tries to nothing. Loretto, at Merchiston, again won pretty easily by a dropped goal and 2 tries to nothing. No "surprise" is expressed this time, but complaint is made that our opponents passed the ball before they were held, tactics which we then thought somewhat unworthy, though "baffling." Of ten School matches, six were won, two drawn, and two lost, and we scored 12 goals 20 tries against 4 goals and 3 tries-all scored by Loretto, who were champion team. Our captain, T. Anderson, played for Scotland against Ireland, and had thus the distinction of being the second of our schoolboy internationals.

1882-3.

This was the jubilee year of the School, and it was but fitting that the championship should come to us again. Eight of the previous year's XV. had returned, and G. W. Jones made a most capable captain. A serious epidemic before Christmas led to the postponement of the earlier School matches, but we were able to show our right to the championship by defeating all the schools in turn. The Academy were beaten at Merchiston by 4 goals (one dropped) and 6 tries to nothing. In the match with Loretto at Pinkie, a new formation was tried, -six behind the maul instead of five, which had been the usual number hitherto. The extra man was a third quarter back, but the innovation was not considered a success. We won, however, by two goals to nothing. A victory over Blairlodge at Merchiston was secured by a goal and 2 tries to nothing. In the Fettes College match, also at Merchiston, we again played six backs, this time the extra man was a half, so that we played for the first time with three halves and two quarters, an arrangement which continued till a fourth half (or three-quarter in modern parlance) was added. We won the match by a goal and a try to nothing, All the four School matches were won, and we scored 8 goals and 9 tries to nothing.

1883-4.

J. S. Clark had six "caps" back and the makings of a good side, which quite came up to expectation. The first School match was against Blairlodge, at Polmont, which we won by 2 goals and a try to a try. Our prejudice against "passing" seems to have died pretty rapidly, for the reporter bewails the fact that while our backs dropped and tackled well, they "were sadly deficient in the 'passing' game." Loretto were beaten at Merchiston by a goal a dropped goal and a try to a try. A very close match with Fettes College, at Merchiston, was won by them by the narrow margin of a goal to a try, and was the only defeat we sustained in School matches. Craigmount were easily beaten on their own ground by 4 goals (one dropped) and 3 tries to nothing; and a win was secured over the Academy on our ground by a goal and a try to nothing. The return with the Academy was a very one-sided affair, our score being 7 goals (2 dropped) and a try to nothing ; but Loretto furnished a close match at Pinkie, and we just won by a dropped goal to nothing. Blairlodge and Craigmount both lost at Merchiston, the first named by a goal a dropped goal and 3 tries to a goal, the latter by 5 goals and 6 tries to nothing. On the result of the final match with Fettes College hung the championship, and we just managed to win the match and the championship by a goal and try to 2 tries-a successful place-kick deciding the issue in both Fettes matches. Ten School matches were played, nine were won, and one lost. We scored in these, 25 goals and 18 tries to 2 goals and 4 tries-a feature of the season being the number of goals dropped.

1884-5.

The season opened with good promise. T. M'Millan, one of the finest forwards we ever had, was captain, and altogether six of last year's team were back. Unfortunately, in most of the matches before Christmas, we had, through various causes, but seldom a full side, and the season's record suffered in consequence. A comparison between the results before and after Christmas will show how much this handicap meant. We began by beating Blairlodge at Merchiston by 2 goals (one dropped) and 3 tries to nothing, but a depleted team lost to Loretto at Pinkie by a goal to nothing, a still further depleted team was thrashed at Fettes by 5 goals and 5 tries to nothing, but we got back some of our own by beating Craigmonnt at Merchiston by 2 goals and 6 tries to nothing. After Christmas, with full sides on the field, we were able to make up much of the lost ground. Craigmount were beaten on their own ground by 3 goals and 11 tries. We won the return with Loretto by a goal and 3 tries to nothing, and a match with George Watson's College, at Merchiston, also resulted in an casy win,—a goal and 7 tries to nothing. On a very muddy ground at Polmont we beat Blairlodge by 2 tries to nothing. The season concluded with a fairly easy win over Fettes College, who had beaten us so badly earlier in the season, by 3 tries to nothing. All the matches since Christmas were won without our lines being crossed. Nine School matches were played, seven were won and two lost, and we scored 9 goals and 35 tries to 6 goals and 5 tries. The place-kicking seems to have been curiously ineffective.

1885-6.

H. P. Iuglis captained the team, which was considerably under the average in weight, but met with fair success. The School matches which were lost were lost by narrow margins, and frost and snow interfered materially with the game. We beat Blairlodge at Polmont by 2 goals and 5 tries to nothing, lost the Loretto match, at Merchiston, by a try to nothing, and the match with Fettes College, on their ground, by a goal to nothing. The Academy were easily beaten on our ground by 5 goals (1 dropped) and 2 tries to nothing—a match only remarkable for the fact that A. N. Woodrow scored 5 tries. The return with Fettes College was played on the Wanderers' ground at Raeburn Place, and we succeeded in making a draw of it, by a dropped goal to a goal. All the other School matches were off owing to the weather, including the fixture with Trinity College, Gleualmond, a match sought to be revived this season. Of the five School matches played, two were won, two lost, and one drawn, our score being S goals and 7 tries to 2 goals and 1 try.

1886-7.

Eight of the previous year's team were back, and W. A. Hutcheson captained the side. We began badly, but improved as the season went on, and ultimately divided championship honours with Fettes College. The first School match, against Blairlodge, at Merchiston, was won easily by 6 goals and 6 tries to nothing—A. W. J. Livingstone scoring 5 of the tries. The Loretto match, at Pinkie, was lost by 3 tries to nothing—our only defeat in school matches. Fettes College we beat at Merchiston by a goal and a try to a try, but they were not quite at full strength. Frost prevented other matches being played before Christmas—our first fixture with Durham School falling through on that account. After Christmas we beat the Academy by 2 goals and 5 tries to nothing, and Loretto by a a goal and try to nothing, both matches being played at Merchistou. The final match with Fettes College, on their ground, was drawn—no scoring. They had much the better of the game throughout, and only our splendid defence saved the match and gained us the right to share first honours with them. Of six School matches played we won four, lost one, and drew one, scoring 10 goals and 13 tries against 3 tries.

1887-8.

Though handicapped by want of weight the team, under W. J. Reid, had a most successful season, winning all the School matches—a result mainly due to a very fast and keen, if light, pack, and Reid's excellent work behind. Craigmount were easily beaten on their own ground by 2 goals and 3 tries to nothing. Blairlodge lost at Merchiston by a goal and 3 tries, as did Loretto by a goal and 2 tries to a try, this latter being the only score against us in Scottish School matches. We beat Fettes College at Fettes by a goal to nothing—an easier win than the score indicates—and the Academy at Merchiston by 2 goals and 5 tries to nothing. The return with Loretto resulted in a win for us by 3 goals and a try to nothing. The Academy fell even easier victims to us at Raeburn Place than in the first match, for we won by 4 goals and 3 tries to nothing. Durham School were met for the first time and we won at Durham by 4 tries to a try. Frost and snow were responsible for a number of matches being put off. The seven School matches played were all won and we scored 14 goals and 21 tries to 2 tries—gaining the School championship once more. W. J. Reid played for the West in the International trial match, East v. West.

1888-9.

With eight others who had played more or less regularly for the XV. throughout the previous season, G. T. Neilson had plenty of support, and another highly successful season falls to be chronicled. The great strength of the team again lay in the forwards and they did the bulk of the scoring. We began by beating Blairlodge at Polmont by a goal to nothing and followed this up by a somewhat easy win over Loretto at Pinkie, our score being a goal and 4 tries to nothing. A hard match with Fettes College, on our ground, resulted in a bare win for us by a try to nothing. The first visit of Durham School to our ground gave us another victory—3 goals and 2 tries to nothing—while the Academy, at Merchiston, fell very easy victims for we won by no less than 7 goals and 5 tries to nothing. It is a curious fact that while not a single try gained in the first half was converted, 7 goals were kicked from the 7 tries scored in the second. We again managed to get the better of Fettes College, this time by 2 goals to nothing. Our last match, against Blairlodge, at Merchiston, was won by a goal to nothing. The seven School matches played were all won and we scored 14 goals and 13 tries to nothing, so that we again made good our claim to the championship. G. T. Neilson was second reserve for Scotland and uarrowly missed his international cap.

1889-90.

E. T. Bell was captain and had six "caps" back, but the team proved only moderate. The first School match against Blairlodge at Merchiston was won by a goal to nothing, and a very close match with Loretto on our ground resulted in a narrow win for us by a try to nothing. Fettes College at Fettes got the better of us by a goal and try to nothing, —thc first School match we had lost since November 1886. Durham School we beat at Durham by a goal and try to nothing, as also the Academy at Merchiston by 2 goals to nothing. Loretto won the return match by a goal and try to nothing after having much the better of the game, and the results of the season sum up to four wins against two defeats and 5 goals and 2 tries against 2 goals and 2 tries. The penalty kick made its first appearance this season.

1890-1.

With only five "caps" back our prospects were none too bright, but in W. Neilson we had a captain and player of exceptional merit and the team proved a strong one. We began with a scoreless draw with Blair-

lodge at Polmont, but after that things went better for us. We beat Loretto at Newfield by a dropped goal and 2 tries to nothing, and Fettes College at Merehiston by 2 goals and 2 tries to nothing. Our opponents made it a condition in this match that "hecling-out" should be allowed, and to this, under protest, we agreed, but declined ourselves to resort to what is described in the report of the match as tacties "utterly destructive of all school forward play." The victory was the more appreciated in eonscquence, though, alas ! we have had to bow, as in the case of "passing," to inevitable changes in the game. The Academy fell easy victims to us at Merchiston by 4 goals (1 dropped) and 5 tries to nothing. For the first time we played Leys School, Cambridge, who were on tour in Scotland, and won by 4 tries to nothing. After Christmas we only met Blairlodge and Loretto, both at Merchiston, and beat the first-named by a goal and try to a try and the latter by 2 tries to nothing. Six School matches were won and one was drawn, aud we scored 8 goals and 16 tries against 1 try, securing the School Championship. Our enptain played for Scotland against Wales and England, being thus the third of our schoolboy internationals.

1891-2.

W. Paterson succeeded W. Neilson as captain, and had only three besides himself of the previous year's team. The team, in consequence, lacked weight and experience and were slow to improve. For the first time in our history we were beaten by Blairlodge, who won at Merehiston by 3 tries to nothing. We fell easy victims to Fettes College at Fettes, losing by no less than 4 goals (1 penalty) and a try to nothing, but just managed to beat the Academy at Raeburn Place, by a goal to a try, although they had by no means a full side. An easy victory over George Watson's College at Merchiston, whom we beat by a goal and 6 tries to nothing, was followed by another substantial defeat, at the hands of Loretto, who won on our ground by 3 tries to nothing. A journey to Cambridge, where we played Leys School, gave us a welcome victory, though only by the narrow margin of a try to nothing. Loretto won the return as easily as the first match, scoring 2 goals and 2 tries to nothing, and Durham School at Merchiston, by 5 tries to nothing. Of the nine School matches played we won but five, losing the other four, and scoring 2 goals and 13 tries as against 6 goals and 10 tries.

1892-3.

This season was even more disastrous than the last, and we actually lost more School matches than we won. J. A. Macgregor captained the team, which contained five from the previous season. Quite a record was established, as all of the five School matches played before Christmas were lost. The Academy won at Merchiston by a goal to nothing—their first win for many years. Blairlodge at Polmont beat us easily by 2 goals and 4 tries to nothing. George Watson's College, at Myreside, scored the only victory they can yet claim over us, by 2 goals (1 dropped) to a goal and a try. Fettes College beat us on our ground by 3 tries to nothing, and yet another record was established for Durham School beat us for the first and only time, so far, by a goal to 2 tries (the try at this time counting 2 points to 5 points for a gaol). We did a little better after Christmas beating the Academy by 2 tries to nothing, and Trinity College, Glenalmond at Merchiston, by 2 goals and 3 tries to nothing. We managed to draw with Loretto, no scoring, but sustained another defeat from Blairlodge, this time by a goal and 2 tries, both the latter matches being played on our ground. So ended what is probably the least successful season we ever have had. We won two matches, lost six, and drew one, scoring 3 goals and 8 tries to 7 goals and 9 tries.

1893-4.

To have back eight of the previous team, bad side as it was, gave grounds for hoping for better things and the team under J. L. M. Neilson was fairly successful. Yet it was a most disappointing year. At times the team played in a style that showed them the equals of our best XV.s, at other times almost any side could have beaten them. Individually the forwards in weight, pace, and cleverness were much above the average. On the rare occasions when they gave us of their best they were easily superior to anything they had to meet, but too often they were all at sixes and sevens and wonderfully ineffective. The season began badly, for the Academy beat us, at Raeburn Place, by a goal and a try to nothing, and Blairlodge secured a narrow victory at Merchiston by a goal to a try. George Watson's College we beat on our ground by 5 goals (1 dropped and 1 penalty) and 2 tries to nothing, and Fettes College, at Fettes, almost as casily by 3 goals (1 dropped) and a try to nothing. Loretto, at Merchiston, were beaten by 2 tries to nothing, and Durham School, also on our ground, by 5 goals (one mark) and 4 tries to nothing. In the return match we had an easy victory over the Academy scoring 5 tries to nothing, and another close match with Loretto resulted in a win for us by a try to nothing, but Blairlodge again just won, this time by a goal to nothing. George Watson's College and Fettes College we beat by a goal and 2 tries to nothing, and a goal and a try to a try respectively. Eight School matches were won, three were lost, and we scored 15 goals and 19 tries against 3 goals and 2 tries. W. G. Neilson while still at School this year got his International cap against England.

1894-5.

This was a season of much frost and little football—no matches being played after Christmas—G. O. Turnbull captained the team, which included four from the previous season. The start was most unpromising, for the Academy beat us at Merchiston by 2 goals and a try to nothing; but our team was certainly an improving one and might have done fairly well in a full season's football. We beat Blairlodge at Polmont by 2 goals (1 penalty) to nothing, and drew with George Watson's College, on their ground, no scoring. A narrow win over Loretto at Pinkie, by a goal to nothing, was followed by an equally close game with Fettes College, who won in the closing minutes of the game by a goal to nothing. The last match before Christmas and, as it turned out, the last of the season, gave us an easy victory over Durham School at Durham, by 4 goals and a try to nothing. We won three matches, lost two, and drew one, scoring 7 goals and a try to 3 goals and a try.

1895-6.

The season was mainly remarkable for the number of drawn games and, although we again won the Championship, it cannot be said we showed any marked superiority over our nearest rivals. Indeed, the schools all round scem to have been very equal. D. A. Macdonald was captain, and we had in all five from last season. We began with a

narrow escape from defeat in the match with Trinity College, who drew with us, at Glenalmond, scoring a try to our penalty goal, the try now counting 3 points. This was followed by a defeat, sustained at Raeburn Place, where the Academy won by a try to nothing, which was the only School match we lost. At Mcrchiston, we beat Blairlodge by a penalty goal and 3 tries to a try, and George Watson's College by a dropped goal to nothing. Though we won the match with Fettes College at Fettes, by 2 goals (1 penalty 1 mark) and a try to a goal, there was but little between the teams, a remark which also applies to the match with Loretto on our ground which we won by a goal to nothing. Durham School was beaten at Merchiston by 2 penalty goals and 2 tries to nothing. After Christmas we had a lucky draw with Loretto at Pinkie, no scoring,—a substantial win over Blairlodge at Polmont, by a goal and 3 tries to a goal, and three scoreless draws—with Fettes College, the Academy, and George Watson's College. Twelve School matches were played, and of these we won six, lost one, and drew five, scoring 9 goals and 9 tries to 2 goals and 3 tries.

1896-7.

R. M. Robertson captained the team, which contained seven from the previous season—a fact which might have justified anticipations of a much better record than we actually had. The forwards were quite average, but the backs were poor, and of scoring power there was none. We began well enough, beating Trinity College, Glenalmond, on our ground, by 2 goals and 3 tries to nothing, but the Academy beat us easily, also on our ground, by a goal and 2 tries to a goal from a mark. We could only draw with George Watson's College and Fettes College, both being met at Merchiston, and in neither match was there any scoring, the match with Blairlodge at Polmont producing a similar result. For the first and, so far, only time we played St Peter's School, York, at York, another draw, this time a penalty goal each, falling to be recorded. We only played two School matches after Christmas and managed to lose both—Fettes College beating us by 2 goals (1 mark) to nothing and the Academy again by a goal and 2 tries to 5 goals and 4 tries, make up the record of a very poor season.

1897-8.

We have to thank D. Couper, the captain, and the rest of this season's team for a very different record from the previous year, for not only did we win the Championship, but did so without a point being scored against us in School matches, three draws alone marring the completeness of the record. Though on the light side the forwards were very clever and splendidly led, while, for once in a way, we had backs who could score as well as defend. We began with an easy win over Trinity College at Glenalmond by 2 goals (1 mark) and 4 tries to nothing. This was the first match in which we played four three-quarters-a formation since retained. Victories were obtained at the expense of Blairlodge and George Watson's College, the former being beaten at Merchiston by a goal and 2 tries to nothing, the latter at Myreside by 2 goals and 4 tries to nothing. Scoreless draws with Loretto at Merchiston and the Academy at Raeburn Place, a narrow win over Fettes College at Fettes, and an easy victory over Durham School at Merchiston, by 6 tries to nothing, completed our programme before Christmas. In the second term we were even more successful for we beat George Watson's College by 2 goals and 2 tries to nothing, the Academy at Merchiston by a try

to nothing, and Blairlodge at Polmont by a goal and a try to nothing, but we again drew with Loretto on their ground. We played cleven matches, won eight, and drew three, scoring 8 goals and 21 trics (102 points) to nothing. In all matches the team scored 150 points to 5, being undefeated.

1898-9.

J. Aitchison had six besides himself of the old lot, but the team, though performing creditably, were unable to retain the Championship. Their opening was ominous, Trinity College, Glenalmond, registering their first and, as yet, only victory against us, by winning at Merchiston by 2 goals to nothing. We did better thereafter, beating Blairlodge (who were very weak) at Pohmont by 5 goals (1 dropped) and 3 tries to nothing, and George Watson's College at Merchiston by 2 tries to nothing. Our match with Loretto resulted, as was usual about this time, in a scoreless draw, but we just beat Fettes College at Merchiston by a try to nothing. Against the Academy, on our ground, we won easily, scoring 2 dropped goals and 3 tries to nothing, and the match with Durham School furnished another draw,—no scoring. After Christmas the team fell off somewhat, and lost to Fettes College by a goal to a penalty goal, though they won against George Watson's College by a try to nothing and drew once more with the season's champions, Loretto, nothing being scored. Ten School matches were played, five were won, two lost, and three drawn, and we scored 8 goals and 10 tries (65 points) against 3 goals (15 points).

1899-1900.

A. W. Duncan captained the team in which there were eight of the previous year's XV. Himself a player much above schoolboy average, he proved a very good captain, and brought his team up to a high pitch of excellence. Both in front and behind the side was considerably better than the ordinary School team, and fully deserved the Championship honours that were won. The first School match was against Trinity College at Glenalmond, and this we won by 3 tries to nothing. Easy victories over Blairlodge and George Watson's College followed. The first named we beat at Merchiston by 3 goals (1 penalty) and 7 tries to nothing, the latter at Myreside by a goal and 5 tries to nothing. Loretto at Merchiston furnished stronger opposition but we beat them by a goal and a try to nothing, and drew with Fettes College, on their ground-no scoring. The Academy were easily beaten twice, first, at Raeburn Place by 2 goals (1 dropped) and 4 tries to nothing, and in the return at Merchiston by 2 goals and a try to nothing. George Watson's College again suffered rather severe defeat, losing by 5 goals and 5 tries, while the score in the first Loretto match was repeated in the return, for we won again by a goal and a try to nothing. With Fettes College we again drew, scoring a penalty goal to a try. In the ten School matches played we scored 16 goals and 27 tries (156 points) against a try (3 points), winning eight matches and drawing two. We were only beaten by Edinburgh University, and in all matches scored 176 points against 6.

1900-1.

Good as the previous season's record was it was quite surpassed this year, and by Christmas we had actually run up a total of 220 points to nothing in School matches. Though only six of the previous XV. had returned J. Gray proved a most efficient captain, and such capable recruits were forthcoming that the team proved in every department one of the best we have had. At the same time, in making comparisons it should be kept in mind that the other schools were probably weaker than usual—some of them markedly so. The high scoring began at once. Trinity College, Glenalmond, were beaten at Merchiston by 3 goals and 6 tries to nothing. Blairlodge, weaker than ever, lost to us at Polmont by 6 goals and 5 tries to nothing, and George Watson's College at Merchiston suffered an equally decisive defeat, for against them we scored 2 goals and 9 tries to nothing. A notable win was secured in the match with Fettes College on our ground by 3 goals and 4 tries to nothing, and another at the expense of the Academy, also at Merchiston, by 2 goals and 3 tries to nothing. Loretto furnished the closest game of the season and we won at Newfield by 2 tries only. A very onesided game at Durham, against Durham School, in which we scored 7 goals and 6 tries to nothing, brought the first term's operations to a close. After Christmas four matches were played and all were won with a good deal to spare. We beat the Academy by 2 goals and 3 tries to nothing, George Watson's College by 2 goals and 7 tries to nothing, Blairlodge by 3 goals and 11 tries to nothing, and Fettes College by 4 goals and a try to nothing. All the eleven School matches were won, and we scored 34 goals and 57 tries (341 points) to nothing. In all matches we scored 383 points to 60, losing three club matches.

1901-2.

For the third season in succession we secured the Championship, and though our victorics were fewer and less pronounced than those of last season, no defeat was sustained in School matches. These three years are the most successful we have yet had. With forwards quite up to our usual standard, we had backs who were exceptionally good, and the combination was irresistible. The danger of our successes lay in the possibility that in cultivating a new back game we might lose the tradition of good forward play, which had been our stand-by in past years, and was really the key to the successes in question, and into that error we fell. There is no necessary antagonism between the development of forwards and backs, but we have unfortunately, by some means or other, almost completely lost the art of our old forward play. The folly of sacrificing our greatest asset,—" Merchiston forward play,"—has been painfully apparent in these latter years, when the exceptional backs were not forthcoming, and we have witnessed a steady deterioration in the style and efficiency of our forwards, and this has necessarily reacted on the back play. To him who will stem the tide and turn our energies into the old channels, without sacrificing any improvement in our back play, our hearty thanks will be due. To return to the history of the season, A. A. Bisset captained the team, in which were seven from last ycar. We beat Trinity College at Glenalmond by 2 goals and 3 tries to a penalty goal; and Blairlodge at Merchiston by 5 goals and 5 tries to nothing. With Loretto, on our ground, we drew—no scoring, but easily beat the Academy at Raeburn Place, by 6 goals and 2 tries to nothing. We played Sedbergh for the first time, winning at Merchiston, by 2 goals and 2 tries to 2 tries, and just beat Fettes College at Fettes by the narrow margin of a try to nothing. After Christmas only two School matches were played, and we won both, beating George Watson's College at Merchiston by a goal and 2 tries to nothing; and Loretto, at Pinkic, by 2 goals and a try to nothing. Loretto were not at full strength, which probably accounted for our unexpectedly easy victory. Nine School matches were played, eight were won and one was drawn. We scored 23 goals and 18 tries (169 points) against 1 goal (penalty) and 2 tries (9 points). In all matches we scored 240 points to 121 (of which 102 were scored by Edinburgh University and the Merchistonians) losing four matches.

1902-3.

H. R. Cook was captain, and only two other members of the last season's team were back-quite an exceptional "leave." The captain certainly made the most of the rather raw material at his command, and is to be congratulated on the fact that only one School match was lost. His effort to revive the tradition of good forward play was a move in the right direction, and to that, more than anything else, we owe the fact that the record at the end of the season was as good as it proved, and in this the "reformer" we have sighed for may find some encouragement. We began with a fairly easy win over Trinity College, Glenalmoud, at Merchiston, scoring a goal and 2 tries to nothing; but the match with George Watson's College on our ground produced a hard struggle, and we only just won in the closing minutes of the game by 2 tries to 1. Another close match, this time with Loretto at Pinkie was drawn-no scoring. In the match with Fettes College on our ground, our defence proved equal to their strong attack, and again a scoreless draw was the result, though they had the better of the game. The remaining two matches before Christmas we won, beating the Academy on our ground by 2 tries to nothing, and Sedbergh, at Scdbergh, by 2 goals (1 penalty) to nothing. Fettes College won the return at Fettes by a goal to nothing, but we were able to repeat the results of the previous matches with Loretto and Academy, drawing the former without a score, and winning the latter, again by 2 tries to nothing. The final match, with George Watson's College, furnished another draw, in which we scored a try against a penalty goal. Of the ten School matches we won five. drew four, and lost one, scoring 3 goals and 9 tries (40 points) against 2 goals and 1 try (11 points). In all matches 57 points were scored against 67, and we were beaten three times.

1903-4.

W. Laidlaw captained the team, which included seven from the previous year. The forwards were weak to begin with, and improved but little as the season went on, though, on rare occasions, they played not so badly. The same may be said of the backs, but their defence was generally good, which compensated to a certain extent for the crudity of their methods in attack. We began with a narrow win over Trinity College at Glenalmond, by a try to nothing, but found easier victims in George Watson's College, whom we beat at Myreside by a dropped goal and 4 tries to nothing. Fettes College beat us on their ground by a goal to nothing, and we allowed Loretto to inflict on us a much severer defeat than the real difference between the teams warranted, when they won at Merchiston by 4 trics to a goal. A welcome win over Durham School at Durham by 3 goals (1 dropped) and 3 tries to nothing, concluded the first term's matches. After Christmas we played the Academy on our ground and won by a goal and 2 tries to nothing, and the Sedbergh match, also at Merchiston, gave us another win by a penalty goal and a try to nothing. Fettes College again proved their superiority by winning at Merchiston by 2 goals to nothing, but in spite of the fact that they won both matches, it was in these that our team did their best performances of the season, for Fettes College were much the better side. In School matches we won five and lost three, scoring 7 goals and 11 trics (64 points) against 3 goals and 4 tries (27 points). In all matches we scored 93 points to 71, losing five matches.

1904-5.

Although the final record is better than last year's, we cannot congratulate ourselves on any improvement in the football of the team. The forwards were, perhaps, the worst pack we have ever had, but all our opponents, except Fettes College, were much below average, so that our weakness was not so noticeable. Had the rest of the team followed the example of the captain, J. W. Alexander, who must be ranked amongst the best of our forwards, a very different state of affairs would fall to be recorded. Unfortunately, their admiration for his skill and tircless energy did not take the form of imitation, and they preferred to watch him playing. There were six of last year's team back—three backs and three forwards. Trinity College, Glen-almond, were beaten at Merchiston by 3 goals (1 penalty) and 5 tries George Watson's College also fell easy victims and suffered to nothing. defeat on their ground by 4 goals 5 tries to nothing. The Academy match at Merchiston was lost by sheer bad play, their score being 2 tries to our 1, but we managed to beat Sedbergh, at Sedbergh, by a similar score, 2 tries to 1 try. George Watson's College were beaten again in the return match by 2 goals and a try. We showed better form in the return with the Academy, winning by 2 goals to nothing. The Durham School match at Merehiston was won comparatively easily by a goal and 3 tries to nothing, but we found Fettes College a good bit better than ourselves, and we lost at Fettes by 2 goals (1 penalty) and a try to nothing. We, however, managed to beat Loretto pretty comfortably, by 2 goals (1 penalty) and 3 tries to 2 tries. Seven School matches were won, and two were lost. We seored 14 goals and 20 tries (126 points) against 2 goals and 7 tries (29 points). In all matches we secred 170 points to 86—losing five matches.

MERCHISTONIAN FOOTBALL CLUB.

No record, however brief, of Merchiston football would be complete without some reference to the Merchistonian Football Club, which played an important part in the early development of club football in Scotland. In the "sixties" and "seventies," clubs were fewer and matches less frequent, and it was quite possible for even a boarding school like ours, whose old boys were necessarily scattered, to get together teams of old boys, reinforced, when necessary, from the School, to play teams of former pupils of the Edinburgh and Glasgow Academies and the Royal High School, Edinburgh.

Many such matches are recorded in our School Magazines, and the Club appears for many years to have played one or two matches at least against the Edinburgh Academicals, the Glasgow Academicals, and the Royal High School F.P.s. In these encounters, the Merchistonian teams can claim their fair share of successes.

In the formation of the Scottish Rugby Football Union, which followed on the first international match against England, the Merchistonian Football Club took an active part and was one of the original members of the Union, and remains a member to this day. Three Merchistoniaus took part in that memorable match of 1871, and since then, both in the teams that have done duty for Scotland and in the councils of the Union, Merchistonians have taken a not unimportant place. In later years, as clubs increased in number and their fixture cards lengthened, it became increasingly difficult to command, on more than a very few occasions in a season, the services of Merchistonians who were necessarily playing for other clubs. To the day school, with most of its old pupils near at hand, it is an easy matter to run a regular playing club of old boys, but that is not possible, in the same degree, for a boarding school. In late years, therefore, the appearances in the field of the Merchistonian Football Club have been fewer than in the past, but we have reason to believe that the contemplated institution of a series of matches at a season when club football is less exacting in its demands, may remedy this, and the Merchistonian Football Club may again take the place it formerly held amongst the football clubs of Scotland.*

[* Merchistonians went on tour at Christmas 1905. Two matches were played,—against the Harlequins in London, and Bristol in Bristol. Both matches were won easily. The former by 3 goals 2 tries (21 points) to nil, the latter by 3 goals (1 dropped) 2 tries (20 points) to nil. The Merchistonians on tour were R. M. Robertson, J. R. Simson, P. A. Macindoe, L. L. Greig, E. D. Simson, R. B. Waddell, H. N. Tennent J. J. Ainslie, C. L. Macdonald, T. Hodge, J. D. Young, J. T. Simson, J. M. Usher, H. R. Cook, G. H. Cook, M. W. Walter.]

CRICKET.

It was the enstom in the forties to preserve the cricket records in a tin box belonging to the Debating Society. There was also a custom of drawing lots for the scoring book, along with the rest of the club property, at the end of the year. Tin box and scoring books disappeared, leaving a regrettable blank in the history of primitive Merchiston cricket.

The few numbers of *The Merchiston Magazine* of 1842 which have survived give no assistance, for they make no mention of games of any kind, and we do not even know when cricket was first introduced into the School. It was already an established game, we are told, in 1845, but it is not till 1849 that we light upon the names of any players. In this year there were two brothers Fisher of Dunkeld, who were the first to attempt the round-arm style of bowling which had recently come into vogue in English cricket.

The Merchiston Chronicle of 1859 deplores the loss of the records of earlier years, and can only rescue from oblivion the names of officebearers between 1850 and 1859. There is some uncertainty as to the correctness of the names in the first half of this decade, but the names of the latter five years are well authenticated.

The only other cricketing name that we can discover in these days is that of Robert Cowan (1855). He appears to have revived the round-arm bowling which had disappeared with the brothers Fisher. G. Gordon, T. C. Nesham, W. Rutherford, J. W. Sinson, in the course of the next two years carried the new art a stage further. In 1858, in the earlier part of the season the bowlers were Forbes, Van der Byl, and George Mitchell, but Van der Byl was called upon to keep wicket later, and W. Ewing took his place as bowler. Forbes was the best of this group of bowlers, being apparently able to keep up an end through a match, without the extravagant number of wides common in these early days of round-arm bowling.

The year 1856 is memorable as the year of an unfortunate schism, happily of short duration, in Merchiston cricket. A section of the 1st and 2nd XIs. mutinied for some reason unexplained, and organised a club of their own, calling it the Alma C.C. The club was limited to the cleven playing members and had no captain, but was managed by Gordon, Nesham, and Daw, a triumvirate whose word was law. Happily, the seceders soon recognised that such divisions would weaken the school, and the Alma Club was dissolved. Mr Harvey, the headmaster, now provided the school, at his own expense, with a professional, Batchelor, who remained three years, and the club found itself strong enough to challenge such clubs as Musselburgh, and Dalkeith. Hitherto only schools had been played. Other matches had been provided by house and class contests, but the home game that excited the keenest interest of all was the annual match in July between the "Two Tables."

In the following year, 1857, long known as "Gordon and Nesham's year," we played Edinburgh Academy for the first time, but neither in this year nor the next did we meet with any success. Adrian van der Byl was captain in 1858, and the XI. is said to have had a fairly successful season in spite of its defeats at the hands of the Academy. This is, unfortunately, all that we know of the cricket of 1857 and 1858.

1859.

For the next few years *The Chronicle* supplies us with a continuous, if sometimes fragmentary record of the school cricket. The captain this season was a master, Mr H. H Almond, an enthusiastic cricketer, and afterwards the famous headmaster of Loretto. The professional for the early part of the season was Bentley of Torquay and, later, Sewell. The season began in March, but allusion is made to even earlier practice. There is no question about the ardour for the game at this time, for one contributor to *The Chronicle*, possibly the enthusiastic captain himself, recommends aspiring bowlers to practise at a single stump every possible day in *January, February*, and *March*, and to take every opportunity of Bentley's soft ball winter coaching in the playroom.

Twelve matches altogether were played, and of these seven were won. In our school matches we were twice defeated by the Academy, but we beat the High School in an innings (Hector Tennent 53, Hugh Tennent 20), and Glenalmond (Hector Tennent 28) by 104 Richard, Brown, and M'Lean were the successful bowlers in these matches. Two matches were played with the Grange, the first being lost by ten wickets, and the return, with the assistance of the professional Sewell, won comfortably. Mr Almond was top-scorer in the latter match with 21 and 12. In home and home matches with the Academicals we divided the honours. In the first match the Tennents distinguished themselves, Hector by what is described as a beautiful 20, and W. Tennent "the smallest boy ever in the XI," by his long-stopping, no by being allowed to pass, a most unusual feat in these days of erratic bowling. In the return match the 34 wides given by our round-arm bowlers contributed targely to our defeat. Success attended the XI, also against Edinburgh University, though the students can hardly have been very good ericketers to give us 57 byes and 14 wides in a total of 113 !

The team was usually chosen from Mr Almond, Hector Tennent, W. Tennent, Crum, Grant, Brown, Richard, M'Lean, Mylne, Coxon, Burlton, Ewing.

1860.

The eleven players which were picked at the beginning of this season, with one exception, kept their places to the end. They were :-Barelay, Brown, Coxon, J. Ewing, A. Grant, R. Maxwell, L. Mylne, T. Mylne, Hector Tennent, and W. Tennent, and Slater (supplanted by Dalgleish later). Fourteen matches were played, and of these six were won, four lost, and four drawn. The season therefore was fairly successful. The averages, however, indicate a weak batting side, for Hector Tennent's average of 10 was the highest! Ewing, with forty-eight wickets at a cost of 6, was the most effective bowler, but H. Tennent took thirtyeight wickets, Mr Almond fourteen, at even less cost, though both bowled underhand. Barclay's lightning expresses were more expensive. The first two matches against the Academicals and the Grange were lost, Bentley's bowling not compensating for our weakness in batting. In the next match, r. the University, Ewing made his mark as a bowler and we won easily, assisted by 25 wides (!) and 22 byes allowed us by the students. The University longstop, says the reporter of the match, on the rough ground had a lively notion of what Tom Sayer's condition must have been in the second hour of the fight. The recent fight between Jack Heenan and Tom Sayers was then the topic of the day. The High School were beaten in an innings, but scoring was very low in this and subsequent matches, the highest score of the season, in fact, being 41 by Hector Tennent in the return with Glenalmond.

[1861-62-63-64. No information.]

1865.

In this year the School Magazine was first issued under its present title, and the record of cricket is henceforward, if not always continuous, at any rate less fragmentary. Under the captaincy of F. A. Bond, who had been captain also in 1864, the XI. had a satisfactory season, winning five of their matches and losing four. The great School match was still that with Edinburgh Academy, and this was lost by 33 runs. The defeat was attributed to bad fielding, and the drastic remedy was applied of setting apart two evenings a week for penal practice. The XI. were badly beaten by Glenalmond, but Loretto, still known as Loretto House School, were defeated by 53. There were two matches with a school that has long since disappeared, Dreghorn College, the first match being won and the return lost. The most important club matches, and in which the XI. were assisted by the professional, Percival King, and Mr Whittington, were with the West of Scotland and the Caledonian, in those days a strong Edinburgh club. The School lost by 20 runs to the West of Scotland, and defeated the Caledonian. Mr Whittington held the highest batting average (25) for all matches, at the end of the season.

1866.

This year the XI. had a busier season and a really good record, winning fourteen matches out of eighteen played. We read of no more complaints of the fielding, the method of correction employed in the previous year having apparently been effective. Missed catches, however, seem to have been the cause of another defeat by the Academy, this time a very severe beating by an innings and 150 runs. With Glenalmond it was another story, and the defeat of the year before was amply avenged, Merchiston winning by more than 203 runs, W. Roland scoring 80, a phenomenal score in those days, and Mr Whittington 53 not out. (In some of the School matches it was still the custom to play masters.) In spite of another fine innings of 60 by Roland, we suffered a single innings defeat at the hands of Loretto, quite an unexpected humiliation as it was then deemed. For successes against clubs King's bowling was largely accountable.

1867.

Cricket is meagrely reported in the School Magazine of this year, being apparently crowded out by the voluminous articles on logarithms ! The result of the first match with the Academy is described as a draw in favour of Merchiston, but we question if this was admitted by our opponents, who had six wickets to fall in the second innings and only 22 runs to make. Moreover, we altogether failed to justify our "moral victory" in the return, being soundly defeated by nine wickets. Against Loretto we did well, defeating them on both occasions, in the first match by ten wickets, and in the return by 82 runs. In club matches the School (with the usual assistance) defeated Carlton (twice), West of Scotland, and Edinburgh University; and lost to Kelso and Northumberland County. Scoring ran low all through the season, for the captain, C. E. Bell, W. Cross, and Mr Whittington were at the head of the batting list with averages of only 15 each. T. Whittington was by far the most successful bowler.

1868.

Again the pressure of more serious matter in the Magazine leaves cricket reports exceedingly fragmentary; and yet there were successes in this year that were memorable, notably the double victory over the Academy, our first success in this match for seven years. The first match was won by 50, the return by 13 runs, and in both victories W. Roland had a large part, as he played innings of 43, 31, 15, and 51. Earlier in the season the same batsman had also contributed largely to our two victories over Loretto, against whom he scored 52, 43, and 42. The XL, however, seems to have been rather a one-man batting side, and when Roland failed in the Glenalmond match, we were badly beaten, Wedderburn scoring 84 against us. The averages are not given, but W. Roland scored so consistently that he must have had good figures at the end of the season.

1869.

This was a disastrous season, as all the school matches were lost. We suffered two defeats from the Academy, two from Loretto, and one from Glenalmond. In club matches results were better, but batting averages which range from 12 to 1 clearly point to a very weak batting side. Spears seems to have been an effective, but very erratic bowler, taking seventy-six wickets but bowling 50 wides !

1870.

The record of cricket in this year is very incomplete. The XI., under the captaincy of W. Dickins, began the season apparently with good prospects of success, and defeated Loretto by 25 runs, Thew being the chief scorer with a not out 37. The Loretto bowler, Gray, was a thorn in our side as in the preceding year. No other school match is reported, cricket reports unaccountably ending with the month of May. The hopes of a successful season do not appear to have been realised later.

1878.

After a long eclipse, *The Merchistonian* made its reappearance this year, and the record of cricket is hereafter continuous. In the interval Fettes College had come into existence, and had rapidly attained to equality with the other schools. In the first two matches we played with them, our 2nd XI, was pitted against their 1st X1, but results not justifying this arrangement, the schools met on equal terms

for the first time in 1873. Between 1873 and 1877 nine matches were played, and of these only two were won by Merchiston; one was drawn, and the remaining six won by Fettes.

A. H. Dickins, an able and energetic cricketer, was captain in 1878, and stood head and shoulders (figuratively speaking only, for he was a small man) above the rest of the team. This is shown in the list of averages, in which Dickins stands first with 32, and the rest are nowhere, not another double figure appearing. The year is memorable chiefly for the opening of the new field in Colinton Road, and for the international match, England v. Scotland, which was played there. Dickins had the honour of being chosen for Scotland, but he met with no success. His best performances were in the return match with the Academy, in which he made 141 without giving a chance, and in the matches with Selkirk, in which he scored 98 and 45. The first match against the Academy was, after very low scoring on both sides, lost by ten wickets : but Dickins' great score gave us a handsome win in the return. Craigmount School were beaten by 57 (T. Begbie 35). With Loretto there does not appear to have been any match. Wright was the professional this year, and in the first match v. Selkirk made 169 not out, his stand with Dickins being long remembered by the Border Club. The bowling of the XI. was of very uncertain quality, and Dickins was more successful with his slow underhands than any of the round arm bowlers.

1879.

This season, under the captaincy of T. A. Begbie, is described as "the most unsuccessful in the annals of the School." The first match against the Academy was the solitary win of the year, and the range of the batting averages (11 to 2) tell their own tale. The highest individual innings played by a boy was 25 by Adie v. Lasswade, and 24 by Tom Anderson v. Craigmount.

1880.

Tom Anderson was captain, and the XI. were fairly successful, winning seven and losing four out of the sixteen matches played, whilst four of the five drawn matches are stated to have ended in our favour. The best averages among the boys were those of E. T. Roland 25, and Tom Anderson 18. Bancroft, the professional of the year, Mr Sleight, and Mr Garner rendered very useful assistance in the club matches. The first School match was v. Craigmount, who scored 244 to our 60 for one wicket, but the result is put down as "greatly in our favour." Our first match with the Academy had a most exciting finish, and we won by 1 run. Roland and Anderson were our chief scorers with 37 and 34, and our fielding appears to have been quite brilliant. Against Blairlodge, who played a professional and Masters, we lost by 4 runs. In the return with the Academy we were defeated by 63, and we lost also to Fettes by 46. George Jones was the best School wicket keeper of the year, but did very little in batting.

1881.

Twenty matches were played this year, the School team taking part in eleven, winning eight, and losing three. Of the other matches six were won, two drawn, and one lost. The season was therefore very successful. Tom Anderson was again captain, and this year heads the average list with 30, E. T. Roland dropping to 16. The rest were nowhere. Roland, however, though less successful in batting than the year before, was a most effective bowler, and his eighty-two wickets at an average cost of 5 runs must have contributed very largely to the good record of the XI. The "Championship"—which we now hear of for the first time—was claimed by Loretto, but the honour was disputed by Merchiston. The Academy were twice defeated by 68 and 55; Blairlodge by 32 (T. Anderson not out, 60); Craigmount by 25; and Fettes by 104 (Roland, 74, not out): but Loretto, for whom Usher made 64, defeated us easily. In club matches the XI. had the same assistance as last year.

1882.

This was the memorable diphtheria year, when the School moved to St Andrews for half the October term. There was no sickness, how-ever, in the summer, and, under Tom Anderson's third year of leadership, the XI. had another successful season, out of eighteen matches thirteen being won, three lost, and one drawn. That Anderson was the largest contributor to this successful record, his average of 40 (with nothing nearer to him than 13) is proof enough. We were again successful against all the schools except Loretto, who caught us at our worst, and defeated us by more than 200 runs, A. S. Blair and Lindsay making 87 and 59 respectively. Thanks to a 102 not out from the captain, we easily had the better of Craigmount; whilst fine bowling by Jack Clark, with a 59 from George Jones, gave us a single innings victory over the Academy. Clark took fifteen wickets for 39 in the two innings. George Jones came off again in the Fettes match, which was won by 72 runs. George Jones also kept wicket admirably throughout the season, but except in the two School matches just mentioned did not show his powers as a batsman. In club matches, assisted by Wheat (professional), Mr Garner, and Mr Sleight, we defeated Lasswade (twice) and Dalkeith. In the first match with Lasswade Anderson made 103 not out. In the home and home engagements with Selkirk, Hawick, and Berwick, honours were divided.

1883.

George Jones' XI. in this year won the coveted honour of being premier school, and this success lent additional enthusiasm to the Jubilee celebrations. We defeated Blairlodge by 25; the Academy by 114; George Jones scoring 96 not out. An even draw was the result with Fettes, who played a scratch team owing to an outbreak of diphtheria there. Clark took five wickets for 43, and G. Jones made 36 in this match. Another good innings by Jones and excellent bowling by D. L. Grant (six for 34) and Clark (four for 31), gave us the narrowest of victories over Loretto by 1 run. Against clubs we were less successful, our best performance being a victory over the Grange. We also defeated Selkirk twice, and Carlton once; but were defeated twice by Lasswade; Shacklock, the Notts fast bowler, taking all our ten wickets in the return match. George Jones headed the batting average with 29, but the others were very small. The professional, Wheat, assisted regularly in club matches, and played no small part in those we won. Twenty-two matches in all were played, of which twelve were won, seven lost, and three drawn; hardly so good a record, in spite of the Championship, as the previous two years.

A Merchistonian Cricket Club was started in this year, but it was on no occasion properly represented, and sometimes as many as six masters had to be requisitioned. West was the only consistent scorer, and Mr Garner practically the only bowler ; and it was due mainly to the efforts of these two players, with occasional assistance from John Cross and J. R. Burns, that seven matches were won out of the thirtcen played. West's two best scores were 55 and 45, both not out. Under the captaincy of J. Stewart Clark, and thanks largely to his effective left hand bowling, we won four of our six School matches, going down only to Fettes and Blairlodge. In club matches we were less successful, but this was partly due to the innovation (attempted in the early part of the season, and then abandoned as impracticable) of playing the School XI. unassisted in all matches. Nineteen matches in all were played, and of these eight were won, nine lost, and two drawn. The batting averages were low, Chearnley Smith 17, M'Clure 13, and Clark 13 heading the list. It was a weak XI. in fact, happily blessed with an effective pair of bowlers, Clark and Alexander, who did practically all the bowling. Jack Clark, who was at his best this season, took one hundred and three wickets at a cost of 10; Alexander's sixty-two wickets averaged 12 runs apiece. These two bowlers were pillars of strength in the school matches. Clark's best performances were six for 35 v. Fettes, and six for 15 v. Craigmount. Alexander also did two performances that could rank with Clark's-seven for 29 v. Academy, and six for 15 v. Loretto. Fettes defeated us by ninety-nine, and the defeat would have been much more severe but for Clark's bowling, and his innings of 27 not out. In the match with Blairlodge we were nowhere, and H. L. Fleming played a memorable innings of 114. In the Loretto match scoring was low, and Alexander's bowling, with a 39 from Chearnley Smith, gave us an easy victory. The other three schools defeated were the High School, the Academy, and Craigmount. Against Craigmount, now a declining institution, Chearnley Smith made 88, and Clark did the fine bowling performance already mentioned. The most notable successes with clubs were victories over Selkirk (twice), Hawick, and Berwick. In some of the club matches we were assisted by the professional, Tom Blaikie.

The Merchistonian C.C. met with fair success, and was better supported than in the previous year. The usual players were W. L. Calderwood, West, A. Black, Bowhill. Symington, G. Wilson, E. Freeman, J. M. Black, the Rowlands, with Mr Garner, and the professional, Dalrymple. Five matches were won, and six lost. The best scores were 60 not out by Calderwood, and 49 not out by C. Craig.

1885.

Though we had only three of last year's team back, this was a successful year, for we lost only to Fettes in our School matches. H. P. Inglis was captain, and Blaikie was again the professional. The bowling was weak, but J. P. Smith, who took sixty-three wickets at an average cost of 9, did several good performances, and he had a good supporter in J. W. Dowden. Goodhue, the hitter of the team, was at the head of the batting averages with 20: the only other double figures were J. P. Smith 13, and Inglis 12, so it cannot have been a very strong batting side, in spite of its success with schools. Inglis was a good captain, but felt his responsibilities and seldom did himself justice. His best innings was a 59 v. Loretto, and it was his batting and Smith's bowling (five for 24) which won us the match, with something to spare. In the Academy match the heroes were Goodhue and Bankier, for Goodhue, aided by luck, scored 87 not out, and Bankier distinguished himself with the ball. taking five for 13. Our form against clubs was very variable. Good performances were the victories over Selkirk (twice), Gala, and Paisley Kelburne (Goodhue 94), but our weakness in batting was painfully apparent in the matches with Carlton, Greenock, and Lasswade, who dismissed us in turn for 20. 41, and 37. Altogether nine matches were won, six lost, and three drawn, the match with Blairlodge in our favour.

L

The Merchistonian C.C. began the season badly, losing three out of the first four matches. The later matches are not reported. R. W. West, W. L. Calderwood, G. Wilson, H. M'Clure, E. Roland, J. M. Black, D. Symington, were the only regular players.

1886.

The XI. this year had some disappointments, and results were not so good as were hoped for. In School matches they did fairly well, for though they lost to both Fettes and Loretto, they beat the four other schools, the most creditable of these victories being that gained over Blairlodge. Four good batsmen, including the captain, H. P. Inglis, were left from last year. Only two of these, Fred Jones and Inglis did themselves any justice, but the failure of the others was compensated by Gray's success with the ball. Gray was an exceptionally good school bowler, some think the best we have ever had : his record this year, one hundred and one wickets at a cost of 8, was certainly remarkable. With another bowler half as good to support him the season's record would have been better. As it was, out of twenty-five matches played, eight were won, ten lost, and seven drawn. In club matches, in spite of assistance from Mr Sharman, and either Blaikie or W. Thompson, (the Brunswick bowler employed as second professional) the results were disappointing. In the return match with Gala we were all out for 26, Burrows, the club professional, taking eight wickets for no runs ! This XI. does not seem to have had a good character for fielding (though honourable exception must be made of Inglis, who was a brilliant point), and this may have had something to do with disappointments. Fred Jones was at the head of the batting averages with 22, the other double figures being Inglis 16, Greenlees 12, and Loney 11. Greenlees played one fine innings of 67 not out v. the Grange, Jones made 128 against the High School, and the hollow victory that we gained, following our previous easy victories year after year, led to this school match dropping out of our programme. Gray's best performances with the ball were seven for 20 v. Blairlodge, six for 15 v. Glenalmond, six for 26 v. Gala, and six for 45 v. Fettes. The match with Loretto at Pinkie was the most exciting of the year, and the finish must have been one of the most exciting moments in Gray's life. He went in to bat last when 3 were wanted to win, put up a catch, and we lost by 2

An effort was made in this year to put the Merchistonian C.C. upon a more satisfactory footing. J. P. Smith was an energetic secretary, and much more representative teams took the field. The batting was strengthened by Mr A. H. Sharman, and the bowling by W. Thompson, the School second professional. Other prominent players were J. M. Black, Calderwood, E. F. Roland, G. Wilson, J. W. Dowden, Walter and Hugh Neilson. Four matches were won, two lost, and three drawn. George Wilson's 50 against the Academicals was the highest individual score.

1887.

In the choice of the captain for this year, authority and influence in the School were considered before skill in the game, and W. A. Hutcheson, the popular School and football captain, was elected. With all his energy, however, he possessed hardly the necessary knowledge of the game to make a good captain. Twenty-three matches were played, of which seven were won, nine lost, and seven drawn. With more than half of last year's XI. back we had hopes of a more successful season. Against the schools, it is true, we did well, defeating the Academy, Craigmount, and Blairlodge, losing to Fettes by only 11, and to Loretto by the still narrower minority of 2 runs. Seven of the defeats were from clubs, but we played, it must be remembered, unassisted in all these matches. The highest scorers during the year were Greenlees 115 not out against Craigmount, and Sl v. Paisley Kelburne, 55 not out v. Hawick; Fred Jones 89 v. Blairlodge, 56 v. Hawick (ret.); W. J. Reid's 73 v. Lasswade, and 64 v. Major Dickens' XI. Gray was quite as good a bowler as last year and he took one hundred and eight wickets at a cost of 8 a piece. He was well supported by Duffus, but the want of a good change bowler Against the Academy, Gray and Duffus divided was often apparent. the bowling honours, and put our opponents out for the small score of 27, but generally Gray was far the more effective bowler, seldom sending down a really bad ball. In the Fettes match the bowlers had the better of the batsmen on both sides and the scoring was low. Jones, the best batsman of last year was, except in the Blairlodge match, disappointing in School matches. More, too, was expected of Dunlop, who was one of the most promising batsmen in the team. Greenlees, who was a stylish player, ultimately headed the average list with 23, followed by Jones and Reid 15, Dunlop 13, and Hutchison 11. The fielding of the team was generally smart, Jones and Dunlop in particular excelling in the outfield.

The Merchistonian C.C. was this year under the captaincy of Chearnley Smith, but great difficulty was experienced in raising teams, and results were not good, only one match being won, three lost, and six drawn. The highest scores made were by Mr Webber 84, and J. P. Smith 76 not out. Symington and J. P. Smith bore the brunt of the bowling.

1888.

The number of matches was this year reduced, some of the unattractive elub matches being dropped and home games substituted. The season was fairly successful, seven matches being won, six lost, and three drawn. Cricket throughout the School profited by the extension of net coaching to lower grades, and H. M. W. Gray was an excellent captain. Dunlop, a riotous hitter in his day, was at the head of the batting averages with 20, his best scores being Sl v. the Cameron Highlanders and 54 not out v. the Academy; but on the whole it was not a very good batting side. In School matches we lost to Fettes and Loretto, but defeated the Academy and Blairlodge. The Academy were no longer the formidable foes they had been in the past, and our old rival, Craigmount, which for some years had been declining, had ceased to exist. Under the old single day arrangement we should have defeated Loretto, but this year the present two-day fixture was instituted, and after leading by 16 on the 1st innings, we lost the match by missing catches and batting feebly to Dun's lobs. The XI. depended too much upon four batsmen and two bowlers, the same two bowlers as last year. Gray's bowling had lost some of its sting, but his figures were much the same as in the past two years. Duffus showed marked improvement, and ran him close for the best analysis. The double figures among the batting averages were Dunlop 20, Gray 15, G. T. Neilson 11, W. Neilson and T. O. Mathieson 10. W. Neilson was expected to do much better, as it was his second year in the XI. and his batting was full of promise. Better days, however, were in store for him.

This year saw the last of the Merchistonian Club. The results of matches were better than those of the year before, but it was realised that, with so few players actively supporting the club, its continuance was impossible. The most regular players were Chearnley Smith (captain), J. P. Smith, Symington, J. W. Dowden, G. Wilson, T. M. Scott, with Mr Webber, Mr Lyde, and Gee, professional. The club defeated the Australasians, Rockville, and Moffat, and lost to the School, Selkirk, and the Academicals.

1889.

An unsuccessful scason, six matches being won, thirteen lost, and two drawn. G. T. Neilson was not a strong captain, and he had a weak XI. under him. No less than twenty-two players were tried in the course of the season. There were seven double figure averages, but Gow's 15 was the highest, and this in spite of a memorable 104 v. Loretto. J. Lamb was the most successful bowler, with an average of 10 for sixty-one wickets. In School matches, the Academy and Craigmount were defeated, but we lost to Fettes, Loretto, and Blairlodge. In the Fettes match we lost four wickets for 1 run, but George Neilson hit up 49 and saved an intolerable situation. Our total score was only 89, but had George Hutcheson not missed Normand badly at short leg, we might have won even with this. Against Loretto, after being in a minority of 189 on the 1st innings, there was a memorable stand between Gow and Livingstone when the game seemed all over. Between them they added 161, and averted at any rate a single innings defeat. Gow's 104 was the first century on record v. Loretto, and his plucky effort well deserved the bat with which he was generously presented by the Head of Loretto. Against Blairlodge we were all out for 17, the lowest score on record in our School matches. Their crack bowler M'Laren was too much for us, and he took six wickets for 7. It was a sorrowful day.

1890.

Results were again poor this season, though in W. Neilson the School had the best captain it had had since Tom Anderson. Though not doing himself justice in the earlier part of the season, he ended well with an aggregate of 500 runs and an average of 23. He was poorly supported in batting, for the next average was that of J. D. Guise 9, with a total of only 165. Mr Webber and Mr H. Smith assisted in a few of the club matches, and in one match, v. the Australasians, took all The same School matches were won and ten wickets between them. lost as last year. W. Paterson and Gulland were the chief bowlers, Paterson meeting with marked success in the latter part of the season. G. T. Campbell scored 113 not out against us in the Fettes match. In the match with Loretto, on a very soft Pinkie wicket, Gedge's 50 in the 1st innings had much to do with the result, this being the only score that reached 20 on either side. Paterson bowled with great effect, taking twelve wickets for 65. We defeated the Academy easily, W. Neilson playing a fine innings of 109, while Paterson made 49, and took eight wickets for 6 runs. Blairlodge were again much too strong for us, and we suffered a severe defeat.

1891.

In W. Neilson's second year of captaincy, better results were obtained, eight matches being won, seven lost, and five drawn. Neilson raised his own average to 25, while C. S. Jackson and Gulland had averages of 18 and 15 respectively. Gulland and Paterson were a successful pair of bowlers, and between them did nearly all the work, Gulland taking sixty-four, and Paterson sixty wickets. The Academy and Blairlodge were beaten, but we lost to Fettes, Loretto, and. unexpectedly, to Glenalmond. The match with the Academy had an exciting finish, as, after leading by 73 on the 1st innings, we only managed to win by one wicket. Against Fettes, onr bowlers failed ns, and we were badly beaten, E P. Thomson scoring 130. Against Loretto we were all out for 39 in the 1st innings (Pearson seven for 12), but making 114 at our second attempt, we ultimately lost by only four wickets. Our match with Blairlodge on our ground produced the surprise of the season. We were not considered to have the remotest chance against the powerful Blairlodge X1., but C. M'Intyre's hitting and Guise's bowling won the match for us by 17 runs and gave Loretto the championship for the year. The last School match of the year was on our ground v. Glenalmond, and, holding our opponents too cheaply, we were deservedly beaten by 43 runs. This was the first time for many years that the Perthshire school had visited us.

1892.

This was quite one of our most successful years. Twenty-five matches were played, a long programme, and of these ten were won and four lost, the rest being drawn. The heroes of the year were undoubtedly J. D. Guise, who, with an aggregate of 618, could show a batting average of 30, and O. F. Lumsden, the best bowler we had had since Gray, whose fifty-nine wickets cost him 8 runs apiece. Nor was the batting or the bowling all the work of this couple. Guise's batting average of 30 was followed by eight other averages of double figures : while in bowling Lumsden was often ably assisted by Guise, C. S. Jackson, and W. Paterson (Capt.), though the last-named, owing to a strain, was no longer the bowler he had been. The Academy and Watson's College were beaten easily ; Loretto and Glenalmond, after exciting finishes, by very narrow majorities. Fettes were not played for some reason, and the match with Blairlodge, owing to bad weather, was drawn. We were, therefore, the champion School of the year.

In this summer John Smith (Lancs.) superseded Tom Blaikie, who was retained as second professional.

1893.

Won seven, lost six, drawn five. A less successful season than the year before, but memorable for the first victory over Fettes for thirteen years. The batting skill was well distributed, though there was no outstanding batsman like J. D. Guise. The chief averages were G. O. Turnbull, 18; Mann, 16; B. G. Forman, 15; J. A. Guise, 13; and F. H. Fasson, 11. Lumsden, who was captain, beat his previous bowling performances by taking seventy-nine wickets at an average cost of 7. Forman and Mann were also at times effective, especially in the Fettes match, where the dismissal of our opponents for a small score was due to them entirely. We passed their score with only five wickets down, but Pritchard then did the hat trick and we won by only 10 runs. On each side there were five cyphers. We defeated the Academy and Glenalmond but lost the Loretto match by two wickets. In the 1st innings we made 157 (Fasson 53) against their 182 (H. A. Brown 89), but in our 2nd innings we went down for 50, and could not hope to pull through. In the matches with clubs we did not meet with much success, and we were badly defeated by the Masters, Mr Webber making 82 not out, and Mr Rush taking six wickets for 22.

1894

Cricket was much interrupted during this summer by bad weather, and out of nineteen matches on the card only thirteen were played. Of these five were won, four lost, and four drawn. G. O. Turnbull, who was captain, though failing signally in school matches, headed the averages with 24, followed by J. A Guise, 22, and Grimond, 14, but there were no other double figures. In bowling we were weaker than we had been for many years. In three of our school matches we were very severely defeated. The Academy beat us in an innings, Fettes by 100 and Blairlodge by 184 runs ; but the season ended more cheerfully with victories over Loretto and Glenahmond. The match with Loretto was, at their request, only a one-innings contest, and, thanks largely to J. A. Guise's seven wickets for 49, we won by 7 runs.

1895.

This was a year of misfortunes, and results were poorer than we had had for some years. The only school match won was against Glenalmond; and we were beaten by Watson's College for the only time on record. We had good batsmen in Turnbull and Fasson, but the attack was very weak. The match with Watson's College was lost by bad generalship and by Forrest's missing the man who scored; also generally by over-confidence, though it was known that Watson's had a dangerous bowler in Cappie, as was proved by his taking seven for 27. We were beaten by Fettes only by 36, J. M. B. Duncan bowling well on this occasion and taking seven for 43. Against Loretto we were 37 ahead on the 1st innings. but missed catches ultimately lost us the match by two wickets. Blairlodge were a better side and beat us by 45. Honours were divided in the drawn match with the Academy. Turnbull made 68 and 29 in this match, but both he and Fasson rather disappointed expectation in school matches. Turnbull's best effort of the year was a fine 88 not out v. Forfarshire.

1896.

With a good captain in F. H. Fasson, the XI. had a satisfactory season, six matches being won, seven lost, and six drawn. We were successful in our School matches, except v. Blairlodge, who beat us, and v. Loretto, with whom, however, we had the best of the draw. There were nine double figures among the averages, and the captain, very properly, headed the list, his aggregate being 337 and his average 21. J. M. B. Duncan and E. R. Jones were the chief bowlers of the year; they took sixty and fifty-two wickets respectively, with little difference in cost. The best performance of the year was the victory over Fettes. Time made the finish very exciting, for we had only five minutes to spare, but we beat them by 38, Knox making 67, and Jones taking eight for 32, a bowling performance that we do not think has been equalled in this match. The worst performance of the season was against the Carlton, who put us all out for 28. The Blairlodge match was lost by 31. In the unfinished match with Loretto we were left with 39 to get and five wickets to fall, and though scoring ran low all through the match, we would gladly have played to a finish. The Academy were defeated in an innings, W. D. Hardisty making 60, and A. S. Drybrough 52. Two promising young players this year were A. W. Duncan. who made several good scores, and W. Rutherford, who, though not ultimately getting his place, took eighteen wickets. The match with the Masters was lost for the third year in succession, Mr Dunlop being chiefly responsible for our defeat.

Matches played eighteen-won nine, lost six, drawn three. Weakness in attack alone prevented the XI. of this year achieving complete success. They were a hard-hitting, quick-scoring team, and had a good cricketer in their captain, J. M. B. Duncan, who was full of energy and enthusiasm. His bowling, unfortunately, had deteriorated, and we were left with practically only one straight bowler, W. Rutherford, for R. M. Robertson had not much control of the ball, and was only occasionally successful. Rutherford's fifty-two wickets were obtained at an average cost of 12. The batting strength is shown by the averages, the captain heading the list with 28, closely followed by that promising cricketer, his younger brother, with 26; and each had a century to his credit. Next came Knox 19, J. R. Simson 17, Rutherford 11, Freer and W. H. Welsh 10. The lack of effective bowlers was very apparent in the school matches. We defeated, as usual, the weaker schools, like Watson's College and Glenalmond; but lost to Fettes and Loretto, and had two very lucky draws with Blairlodge and the Academy. The Fettes match was lost, it is true, by only 12, and if D. M. Ramsay had taken the chance that John Campbell gave him at mid-off, we should probably have won. In the Loretto match the captain (41) was the only batsman who could do anything with the Loretto bowlers, Harper Orr and Kerr, who bowled unchanged, but our attack was very weak at one end, Rutherford, who took seven for 41, alone bowling well. Against Blairlodge a memorable stand by the captain and Knox, who made 51 and 55 not out respectively, alone saved us from a defeat that looked inevitable. Blairlodge had a fine cricketer in Elborough, and he scored 111 not out. The highest individual innings of the season were the captain's 130 not out v. Watson's, A. W.'s 103 not out v. The Stewartonians, J. R. Simson's S1 v. Dollar, and Knox's 72 v. Watson's. One of the best performances against clubs was the match with the University, whose colours were saved only by the call of time. The lion's share of the credit fell to the Duncan brothers, for A. W. scored 52, and the captain did his best bowling performance of the season, taking six for 37. A. Attewell superseded John Smith as professional in this year.

1898.

Matches played twenty-seven-won seven, lost eight, drawn five. The captain was J. Knox, a capable and energetic cricketer. The results of our School matches were disappointing, for our only wins were against Watson's and Glenalmond. Against Fettes, who were expected to be much too strong for us, we did better than we hoped, and lost only by 16, and had we taken our catches, the result might have been reversed. Couper, 35 not out, was the chief contributor to a small total. The Loretto match was a day of disaster, and we had never been so swiftly and decisively beaten by them before. Kerr and Henderson dismissed us for 37 and 21, and won a single innings victory with a score of 84! All was over by five o'clock on the first day! With the Academy we effected a creditable draw, for after being nearly 100 behind on the first innings, we made 206 for seven (Knox 72 not out) at our second attempt, and saved the match. The batting was not so strong as the year before; Knox's average ran to 20, and this was the best. Alec Duncan dropped to 18, failing signally in School matches, but he had developed into a cunning bowler and was of great assistance, taking fifty-two to Rutherford's seventy two wickets. One of the best club victories, that over the Brunswick Club, was entirely due to his feat of taking eight wickets for 31. A very bad club performance was our match with the Heriotonians, who put us all out for 18, and then scored more than 100 for one wicket. Against the Grange we did well, making 186 for eight

(J. R. Simson 69, Duncan 36, and Couper 28 not out), against the Grange score of 143 for seven, and if the two catches given in the outfield by Boyd had been taken, we might have won. Rutherford bowled well in this match, and also in the next, v. Glenalmond, seven of whose wickets he took for 31. The victory over Watson's was also largely due to his good bowling.

1899.

This was quite one of our best years. The XI. was stronger all round than the year before, and had an exceptionally good cricketer in the new captain, A. W. Duncan. Out of sixteen matches played, seven were won, only three lost, and seven drawn. This improved record was largely due to the greater strength in bowling, for in addition to the two regular bowlers, Duncan and Rutherford, we had very useful changes in de Villiers and Forsyth. The captain made great advance in batting, his average rising to 52, but J. M. Brown was a very good second with 31, while Forsyth, 15, E. D. Simson, 12, Moore and Whitaker, 12, and de Villiers, 10, on several occasions did good service. In School matches we were unbeaten, defeating Watson's, Blairlodge, and the Academy, and drawing with the others. Two memorable centuries were made in the School matches, a wonderful 175 not out by Duncan against Loretto, and 130 not out by J. M. Brown v. Blairlodge. Our batting in our first School match v. Watson's was anything but promising, for we were all out for 90, but Duncan was in great form with the ball, and took nine wickets for 10, the whole Watson's team being dismissed for 31. Against Fettes we made an unusually large score (Forsyth 63 and Brown 55), but our bowling was not good enough to get our opponents out. Glenalmond also saved their match by good defence, in spite of good bowling by Rutherford and Duncan. Play on the second day of the memorable Loretto match had to be abandoned owing to heavy rain. Duncan's record score of 175 not out was largely responsible for our total of 322, and he gave no chance till he had made 160. Loretto lost two wickets for 2 runs, and this was the end, for play was quite impossible on the second day. The Blairlodge match was won by Forsyth's bowling (six for 18), and Brown's grand innings of 130 not out, a performance in no way inferior to Duncan's against Loretto. The Academy match was won, after an exciting finish, by 20 runs. Our best batsmen, with the exception of the captain, who made 36 in the 2nd innings, did not do much. Plucky batting by E. D. Simson and Rutherford at the crisis of each innings had much to do with the result.

1900.

No better side probably ever represented Merchiston than the XI. of this year. A. W. Duncan was again captain, and he was undoubtedly the best cricketer we had had since Tom Anderson. The record was unusually good, nine matches being won, three lost, and seven drawn. In the School matches we lost to Blairlodge by 11 runs, and could only draw with the Academy, but we beat Fettes, Loretto, Glenalmond, and Watson's. The captain's aggregate of 867 runs, with an average of 51 per innings, is a record that will not soon be lowered. There was no other batsman in the same class, but de Villiers, 17, Forsyth, 16, Pringle, 15, E. D. Simson and Roberts, 14, Rutherford, 13, and Lamb, 12, could on most occasions be depended upon. Rutherford and Duncan, who each took sixty-four wickets at low cost, practically did all the bowling work, and were a very good pair, but de Villiers, Forsyth, Roberts, and E. D. Simson, were all very useful change bowlers, when required. Rutherford's six for 42, and a 47 from the captain's bat, gave us a narrow victory over Fettes by one wicket. It was a finish full of excitement, with 2 runs to win and five minutes to go. The captain was also very prominent in the Glenalmond match, as he took nine wickets for 23 and scored 73, following this up by scoring 132 not out against the Stewartonians in the very next match. Duncan also played the largest part in the Loretto match, scoring 25 and 41, and taking eight wickets in the two innings at small cost. Rutherford bowled equally well: in fact. it was our good bowling that enabled us to win comfortably. Other fine scores by Duncan were 85 v. the Grange, 80 not out v. Dunfermline, and 71 v. Lasswade. A two-day match was played in July with a strong team of the Oxford Authentics, but we were badly beaten. Rutherford bowled very steadily, but our other bowlers were outclassed. We had to follow on 143 in arrears, but brisk batting by the tail of the XI. in the 2nd innings saved the single innings defeat. Against Blairlodge both Rutherford and Duncan bowled extremely well, but so did Thorburn on the other side, and it was his bowling that defeated us.

1901.

Under the excellent captaincy of E. D. Simson, we had another good batting side, mostly quick scorers, but the bowling was not up to the same standard. There were several bowlers who would do well on occasions, but no one bowler was consistently effective. Roberts, de Villiers, and Fraser were the most successful, while Ballantyne and E. D. Simson were often useful. Ten double figures, quite an unusual number, appear in the batting averages. W. L. Fraser headed the list with 27, followed by de Villiers, 24, Pringle and J. T. Simson, 19, E. D. Simson, 18, Roberts, 15, Meikle, 14, Ainslie, 12, Scott-Douglas, 11, and T. H. Ballantyne, 10. Twenty matches were played, seven being won, five lost, and eight drawn. The Blairlodge match was again the only one Fettes were not played. De Villiers was the hero of the first lost. school match v. Watson's, as he made 55 and took six for 26. The credit of the very easy victory over Loretto was shared by several, Fraser, de Villiers, and Pringle scoring well in both innings, the bowling honours being divided between Fraser, Roberts, and Simson. Good batting all round, assisted by effective bowling by Roberts, who took six for 26, also won the Academy match. Our best club performance was the defeat of Lasswade, on their own ground, by 120, a result to which Roberts' excellent analysis of eight for 28 contributed quite as much as our good all-round batting. Against the Grange we put up the large score of 237 for nine (Roberts 55 not out and E. D. Simson 51), and certainly had the best of the day's fun, but our bowling was not equal to getting our opponents out. Our batting broke down to Attewell's bowling in the match with the Masters, and we had a sorry leather-hunt in the concluding match of the season against the Merchistonians, Alec Duncan scoring 142 and Dunlop 101 not out.

1902.

Under the popular captaincy of J. T. Simson the XI. had a prosperous season, in school matches losing only to Fettes. The most capable cricketer in the team was W. L. Fraser, and his figures, both in batting and bowling, were the best, his batting average being 26 and his bowling record 64 for eleven. Ainslie and the captain also did well in batting and attained the dignity of a 20 average, Scott-Douglas, 13, and H. Tennent, 12, being the other double figures. The batting all through fell short of the standard of the year before, and Fraser had no bowler of his own class to support him. Bisset, who took thirty-eight wickets, was the next best, but he was very variable. The largest individual scores of the year were Ainslic's 132 v. the Academy, Fraser's 101 not out v. Watson's and 81 v. Brunswick, and J. T. Simson's 75 not out v. Lasswade. In the Fettes match A. K. Tennent, at this time rather a midget, made 41 out of the 69 we scored, the others being quite unable to play Lyle. The postponement of the Coronation holidays owing to the King's illness led to a second meeting with Fettes, with no better result for us. The most exciting match of the season was with Glenalmond, and we won by one wicket. Bisset bowled well in this match and took six for 39. The highest score on our side was a very good 54 by the captain. Scarcely less exciting was the finish in the Loretto match, which, though played to a finish, we won by two wickets. Scott-Douglas was the hero of the day, making 28 and 40 in a match where scoring ran low. The season ended with a hollow victory over the Academy by an innings and 188 runs. Ainslie made the century already mentioned, and there was some very rapid run-getting by J. M. Rutherford and Spencer, who added 90 in thirty-five minutes. Most of the wickets fell to Fraser and Bisset.

1903.

The XI. this year was a weaker team than had been seen for some years past, both batting and bowling being below the average standard. Results were correspondingly poor, only four matches being won and nine lost. H. R. Cook was an energetic captain and a good manager, but only a moderate cricketer. In School matches we beat Watson's College and the Academy, lost to Loretto and Glenalmond, and made a Lonege and the Academy, lost to Doretto and Orenamond, and made a lucky draw with Fettes. J. Hamilton, a hard-hitting left-hander, was at the top of the averages with 24, followed by Milne, 15, Walter 15, and Sanderson, 13. A. K. and J. M. Tennent, 11, J. G. Stewart, 10, were also in double figures. A. K. Tennent and Walter, both promising cricketers, disappointed expectations. The bowling was very weak. J. G. Stewart did the bulk of the work, but was ineffective and expensive, his forth with the provide the tension of the tension of the tension. his forty wickets costing 19 runs apiece. A. K. Tennent's thirty-one wickets were obtained at less expense, but it was only at the end of the season that he met with any marked success. Fettes made 228 for three wickets (Johnstone, 103 not out) against us, but they were too late in applying the closure, and we just managed to hold out till time was called. Against the Glenalmond, Hamilton 59, and Walter 43, batted well for us, but our bowling was at its worst, and cost us the match. Against Loretto, Walter 29 and 21, Stewart 32 and 14, were our most successful batsmen, Ellis our most effective bowler. After being S4 behind on the 1st innings, we put them out for 74, but 159 was too much for us against the good bowling of Kerr and Godby. The Academy match was won for us by the wonderful bowling of A. K. Tennent, who took four for S in the 1st innings, and all ten for 29 in the 2nd. Our batting was not remarkable. G. S. Milne with 50, being our top scorer. One feat this XI. performed which stronger XI.s had failed year after year to accomplish. They defeated the Heriotonians, the heroes of the day being Sanderson, 33, and Stewart, five for 29.

1904.

Won six, lost four, drawn ten. A successful scason, the only School match lost being v. Fettes, with whom we shared the honours. A. K. Tennent was a strenuous captain, as well as a cricketer born, and he contributed largely to the success of the team. There was unusually keen competition, both among batsmen and bowlers, for the place of honour, and there was little to choose, if figures are a criterion, between the merits of the first four batsmen, Sanderson, 22.7, the

captain, 22, Milne, 20.6, and Walter, 20.4, or those of the three bowlers. Ellis, Macdonald, and the captain, though in aggregate of runs made and wickets taken the captain stood easily first. Walter began the season brilliantly with 104 not out and 53 for his two first attempts, but then had a long spell of ill luck, and did not recover his true form again till late in the season. The first School match, v. Watson's College, was drawn. The captain played a dashing 85, which gave ns a good total in spite of a very bad start, but our bowlers, though straight enough, met with resistance unusual in this match, and we failed to put the whole side out. Of seventy-three overs, thirty-six were maidens ! We had hopes of beating Fettes, as their bowling was reported weak. but it proved strong enough for us, and but for a timely stand between A. K. Tennent, 36, and Martin, 27, we should have done very badly. Glenalmond, Blairlodge, Loretto, and the Academy, were all defeated without any difficulty. Against Glenalmond Milne made 54, and A. K. Tennent had the fine bowling figures of six for 19. Blairlodge, a mere shadow of what they were, were an easy prey, and we won by 246, our chief scorers being J. Tennent. 59, Walter, 58, A. K. Tcnnent, 57, and Milne, 46. The honours of the Loretto victory were shared both by batsmen and bowlers, Martin making 41, Walter 34, J. Tennent 27, while Macdonald, Ellis, and the captain divided the bowling spoils. In the 2nd innings of the Academy match, the captain went near to repeating his wonderful bowling feat of the year before, capturing nine wickets for 16 runs. Our batting was rather disappointing, Macdonald with a lucky 45 not out in the 1st innings, and Martin with a very merry 30 in the 2nd, being the highest scorers.

1905.

Matches played, twenty-two-won eleven, lost seven, drawn four. A more successful season even than the last, though we again had to be content with sharing the honours, this time with Loretto. It was a stronger XI. in batting, the great advance made by the three best batsmen, Walter, J. M. Tennent, and Martin, amply compensating for the loss of last Walter took over his command, and was an year's able captain. admirable successor. His success with the bat was remarkable. In the middle of July he had scored 859, and, with three matches still to go, it looked as if he were about to establish a new record, and reach his 1000 runs. This feat, however, he failed to accomplish, his last three innings realising only 21, and his average sinking to 41 90. Tennent and Martin, the former especially, were also very successful with the bat. Their aggregates were respectively 634 and 531, their averages 33 and 22, and they undoubtedly formed with Walter as good a trio in one year as we have ever had. Martin also showed great improvement in bowling, but the attack on the whole was not so effective as last year. Martin did a great performance in the first School match, taking seven wickets for 4 runs v. Watson's. As usual on our own ground, we did badly against Fettes, making only 114, and losing by three wickets. We were somewhat handicapped, however, by the absence of Ellis, who was unable to play owing to an injury. The match with Glenalmond we won comfortably, but did not do well against Loretto, and it was only J. D. Brown's great effort in the second innings that saved us. The Academy were defeated, after a match remarkable for unusually large scoring, by nine wickets. Tennent scored 99, and J. R. S. Mackay 78 in the first innings; Martin a brilliantly hit 49 in the second. The highest individual scores of the year were Tennent's 101 not out v. Clarendon, and Walter's 100, also not out, v. the University "A" team; but a better performance than any one century was Walter's 78, 78, and 75 in three successive innings, v. the Grange, the Merchistonians, and the Clarendon.

HISTORY.

It is in December 1884 that we first hear of a movement being set on foot to form a Cadet Corps in connection with the principal Edinburgh Schools. The originator of the movement was Colonel Macdonald, now Brigadier-General Sir J. H. A. Macdonald. The scheme is not yet complete, but meantime the School is divided into three companies for purposes of drill which takes place every Friday. T. M'Millan is captain, W. Neilson is lieutenant, and in the following term rifles arrive but only for the first section. "They look like relics of Waterloo, but we are assured that they are of more recent date," writes a scoffer in The Merchistonian.

The first inspection of the Corps took place in the summer term of 1885 and is thus described: "This Corps, which at present consists entirely of pupils attending Merchiston Castle School and George Watson's College, was inspected yesterday at Merchiston by Major Macrae of the Q.E.R.V.B. The Merchiston contingent consisted of two sergeants and twenty-six rank and file, while that from Watson's College numbered two sergeants, forty-six rauk and file, and eleven recruits. The two companies, under the command of Lieutenant Mackersy went through the manual and firing exercises in a highly creditable manner, the Merchiston boys showing up particularly well as they were all dressed uniformly in the school cricket colours. The bayonet exercise . . . was executed in excellent time and with good effect." Then follows an account of the Battle of Myreside, which, fiercely fought with fixed bayonets, swayed between Curror's and the Flag-staff Hill.

We notice, too, that "a wild enthusiasm, stimulated partly by the offer of prizes, was developed among the juniors for polishing rifles and bayonets." Mr Burgess seems to have been the moving spirit even from the very outset.

The Corps, though yet without proper uniforms, and not fully armed, does not lack its Tyrtaeus. In the August number of *The Merchistonian* "The Volunteers' Chorus" by Mr Waddy appears.

1885-6.—In the following session Captain Dickson of the Queen's Edinburgh kindly gave his assistance in tutoring the prefects in the art of war, and became honorary captain of the Corps, which post he held until 1888.

The great question to be decided was now what uniform to adopt, and though the Debating Society "showed great animosity to any other uniform than the 'kilt," there seems to have been some difficulty in obtaining the sanction of the authorities.

There is also a proposal that a pipe band should be formed.

In the summer term the Corps is inspected by Captain Money but as yet they have no uniforms and no rifles.

1886-7.—After much consultation and extensive correspondence between the senior officers of the Q.E.R.V., the war office, and the School officials, the Cadet Corps has at last been fully organised and equipped. The Corps now numbers two lieutenants, five sergeants, five corporals, three pipers, two drummers, and above eighty rank and file. The uniform has been decided on and will shortly be supplied to the force. It will consist of Norfolk jacket and nickerbockers (*sic*) of dark material with stockings to match, and black patent leather waist-belt. The glengarry bonnet, also, will be worn with the School badge. The pipers will wear a kilt of Grant tartan. Snider cavalry carbines have been supplied by the War Office, and it is expected that in the course of time a number of Martini-Henry rifles will be provided for shooting practice for the seniors. The Corps is drilled twice a week—the off days at football—in strict military fashion by a thoroughly efficient sergeant, and the band have made considerable progress in the national martial music.

The official sanction for the establishment of the Corps dates from 3rd December 1886. The Gazette of that date has "Cadet Corps attached to the 1st Edinburgh Rifle Volunteer Corps. Captain David Dickson to be honorary captain" Mr J. R. Burgess is lieutenant-commanding.

On 19th March the Corps in full uniform has its first march-out, when along with about 1500 of the Q.E.R.V. it marched through the principal streets and *out into the country* towards Trinity. The average height was two inches above that of any other company in the regiment. It was inspected in Queen's Park in May and took part in the Review held on 17th June in honour of the Queen's Jubilee. 1887-S—The uniform is changed and the adoption of a Highland dress approved of. Captain Dickson resigns and his place is taken by Mr Burgess. Shooting with the Morris tube is begun, targets are fitted up in the gymnasium, and a competition is held in which Lean is the winner.

1888-9.—The Corps now numbers 100, and the editor of *The* Merchistonian at this date must have come from over the border, for he says: "from painful experience we should say that the pipers are by far the most energetic part of it." The Martini-Henry rifles promised two years before now arrive, and section I. are armed with them, the remaining sections still having the old Snider carbines. Shooting is begun again at Hunter's Bog under Mr Davidson's excellent guidance and a team of five is entered for the Edinburgh Schools Trophy, the first shooting team we know of since 1870, and the trophy is once again brought back to Merchiston, and great credit is due to the energy with which they met their difficulties, for they had to get up at five o'clock every morning in order to practise. The conditions were five men a-side with seven shots at 200 yards and seven at 500. We are told also of an intention to make a first appearance at Bisley,—a promise not fulfilled until 1905.

1889-90.—The work of the Corps included a sham fight on the Pentlands, a march to Penicuik, and a parade to receive Lieutenant Stairs who had just returned from Africa. The School inspection was held on the games' day in May, and "among the novelties introduced was volley firing." There was no inspecting officer. The shooting team again won the Schools Trophy.

1890-1—This year seems to have been one of great activity. There was an inspection by Major Guild at North Berwick in the Abbey School field kindly lent by Mr Waddy. Later, on 28th March, the Corps took train to Galashiels and Abbotsford Ferry and then marched to Selkirk where they were welcomed by Provost and Mrs Craig-Brown; they paraded in Market Square and were inspected by Captain Hope, the adjutant of the Borderers, and after took part in some manœuvres. The home inspection on 14th April was again during the games, and the inspecting officer was Lieutenant-Colonel Sutherland. The band has now added a number of buglers. The change is said to be "very comforting."

buglers. The change is said to be "very comforting." On 18th June the competition for the Schools Trophy was held at Blackford Hill ranges in connection with the City of Edinburgh and Midlothian Rifle Meeting. There were six schools competing, but Merchiston only got third place in spite of a fine score of 61 by A. Fraser who takes the school shooting prize for the year.

1891-2.—Mr W. J. Mabbott becomes 1st lieutenant. Only one foreign expedition is made—to Dunblane. The Corps took train to Bridge of Allan then marched to Dunblane, and were there inspected by Colonel Stirling of Kippen Ross. In the Schools Trophy the team took second place in spite of the fact that they seem to have had more regular practice. "For the first fortnight eight of us drove out to Currie and shot during the evening (6.30-8), but this arrangement interfered too much with our work as we did not get back until about nine o'clock and consequently had little or no time for preparation. Now six of us drive to Queen's Park at 2.30 and return at 5.30." Whether this took place every day history does not relate.

1892-3.—The numbers have gone up to 120, and the season is described as in many respects the most successful which the Corps has experienced. An expedition was made to Dunfermline, when Sir Arthur Halkett inspected; and our regular inspection on the School field took place on 11th April, before Lieutenant-General Lyon-Freemantle. A detachment numbering about forty-four went into camp at Barry for the first time, and the shooting team again won the Schools Trophy, which narrowly escaped injury in the fire of 1894, the shade and glass being partially destroyed.

1893-4.—But after this, we hear no more of the Schools Trophy, presumably it was lost this year, and not competed for again. But the usual out-matches and inspections take place, one being at Innerleithen by Colonel Macadam of Leith. The Corps then marched to Peebles. "The march was considerably enlivened by the presence of John Hutcheson, who performed with the utmost impartiality on all the instruments of the band in turn. His endeavours, both with the big drum and the bugle, to get up a reel at one halting-place, were heroic, but unsuccessful." A bagpipe competition was won by T. Welsh.

1894-5.—A grant from Government of £38 is earned; "this is for the season before last." The annual inspection at Queen's Park on Saturday, 1st June, is chiefly remarkable for the route taken. They first marched to Craiglockhart and entrained for Waverley, and from there marched to the Park. There is an inter-sectional competition between I. and IV. sections resulting in favour of the former, while Colour-Sergeant A. Morton takes the prize for the best individual score.

1895-6.—There is a field day at Haddington on 31st March, and this year the home inspection takes place on the day before the games—not in the middle of the games as previously. General Rowlands is the inspecting officer. At the Annual Queen's Inspection we form as usual No. 10 Company of the first battalion. An attempt was made to go into camp at Barry, but the camp was flooded out, and "the gallant army was compelled to retreat to Merchiston the same night."

1896-7.—This is the greatest year in the history of the Corps. On 5th December they were inspected by Lord Wolseley, who remarked that "the cadets were more like men than boys." There was the usual inspection in June, and they were present at the Public Schools Review, held by Her Majesty Queen Victoria, in Windsor Park, to the number of seventy-nine, under Captain Burgess and Lieutenant J. Maudsley, who succeeded Mr Mabbott. On Monday, 28th June, the Corps left Edinburgh and camped the two following nights on Romney island, kindly lent by the Provost of Eton College. The inspection took place on Tuesday, and the return journey was made on Wednesday. A slight change was made in the uniform this year. White braid was added to the collar and shoulder straps, and the bronze cap badge was replaced by a silver one, previously only worn by the band, and the whole Corps had cock feathers.

1897-8.—Two field days were held this year. In the first on 10th May we were engaged with the Blairlodge Cadets and the 1st Royal Scots under Colonel Morgan Payler in manœuvres round Arthur's Seat; in the second on 25th May the Corps entrenched a position on the Braid Hills, and were attacked at night by the Queen's Edinburgh under Colonel Macrae. General Chapman was our inspecting officer this year.

1898-9.—There is little to chronicle this year except a field day with the University company at Dalkeith and our inspection by Colonel Trotter. In the shooting competition R. A. Blake was successful. Lieutenant Maudsley now leaves. 1899-1900.—On the Queen's birthday the Corps helped to line the streets, and a *feu-de-joie* was fired from the Castle battlements. The afternoon of the same day was given up to a sham fight at Malleny. General Chapman was again our inspecting officer, and at the end of term twenty-four boys went into camp at Lochcote.

1900-1.—Mr G. L. Thomas joined the Corps as first lieutenant—the vacancy had been filled since 1899 by the appointment of two cadet lieutenants. Our inspection by General Chapman was not so great a success as usual. During the manœuvres the General suddenly changed the point of attack, and "as we had practised that particular attack for several weeks, the result was a general confusion." Thirty cadets went into campat Barry. "Bedmaking was also a daily duty that took up no little time in the morning. Some fellows voted it such a nuisance that they never took their beds down, but slept in rugs instead."

1901-2.—Our own inspection was put off until the summer term to allow the newly formed detachment of scouts, cyclists, and ambulance, to become more efficient. The effect of these innovations was to include the whole School in the Corps, instead of limiting it as previously to boys of a certain height. But here comes a sad break in the continuity of the history of the Corps. Mr Burgess's death deprived it of one who had been the most active among its originators and its moving spirit throughout. He was succeeded by Mr G. L. Thomas. On 14th June the Corps was inspected with the Queen's by Colonel Broadwood, and on 24th July by Colonel Hunter, and thirty-five went into camp at Barry.

1902-3.—Mr Thomas only held the captaincy one term, and on his retirement Mr F. D. Evans became captain, and Mr G. P. Blake first lieutenant. A new armoury had been built and was fitted this year. The old bicycle shed in the cloisters was turned into a Morris tube range, with safety targets, and some shooting was done at Hunter's Bog. General Sir Archibald Hunter inspected the Corps in July, and a detachment of forty-seven went to the new volunteer camping ground at Stobs.

1903-4.—With the new Morris tube range, shooting now becomes obligatory for the whole Corps, that is the whole School, and every boy receives instruction and has to fire a certain number of rounds during the two winter terms. During the summer term advantage is taken of the Government issue of free ammunition to cadets, and all but the very smallest fired the cadet course at Hunter's Bog. A shooting team is also instituted, and to prevent any clashing with the cricket, the conditions laid down were that the team should consist of boys who were not or would not in future years be required for the 1st XI. They had regular practice three times a week at Malleny, and sent in a team for the Brock Shield competition at Darnley in June, gaining third place. In other respects the Corps kept its usual course of field days and inspections, and twenty-four boys went into camp at Stobs and were attached to the University company for field work. Owing to the difficulty of getting a suitable date for the officer commanding the Forces in Scotland, no private inspection was held.

1904-5.—Lieutenant Blake resigned his commission at Christmas and was succeeded by Mr R. E. Roberts. The inspection was held at the end of the Easter term by Coloncl Broadwood. The shooting VIII. had a successful season, winning the Brock Shield and making its first appearance at Bisley, where it took Sth place with a score of 467 ; Harrow was first with 473.


