

### ADDRESS

Delivered at the Memorial Service, 30th March 1919.

REV. A. B. TAYLOR, M.A.

In unforgettable words our Lord Jesus Christ proclaimed the law of sacrifice as the law of life. "Except a corn of wheat fall into the ground and die, it abideth alone; but if it die, it bringeth forth much fruit." "Whosoever will save his life shall lose it; but whosoever will lose his life for My sake shall find it." It is one of the laws that God built into the mechanism of the universe. It belongs to the eternal order. The sacrifice of life for life—that is the law, and it operates everywhere. It is the law of nature, the law of human life, the law that sent the Son of God to Calvary. So essential and beneficent is this law of sacrifice that without it there is no progress. To it we owe all our best possessions. There is not a right or privilege or liberty that is ours to-day that has not been purchased at a great price.

"Yea, all through life I see a cross,

Where sons of God yield up the breath;
There is no gain except by loss,

There is no life except by death."

It is a law that has been lifted into a new prominence by the terrible war through which we have just passed. The war came to us as a direct practical challenge. Truth and justice and liberty, public honour and law, were all at stake. The significance and magnitude of the issues were such as to make the need for sacrifice urgent and imperative. And when volunteers were called for, many of the young men of this congregation were the first to respond. The list of those connected with us who have served during the war contains 205 names. We honour them all, and we thank them for the noble service they have rendered to the cause of righteousness and freedom. We gratefully remember also our indebtedness to the loyal hearts at home. There was sore anxiety when loved ones were out amid the perils of the battle-field or on the high seas. There was the heavier burden of bereavement as tidings came from time to time that another of our gallant sons had fallen. But the dark days were faced with faith and patience and hope. We can never forget the fathers and mothers and wives who sent forth to the war's grim work those who were dearer to them than life itself. Theirs was ever the keener pain, the greater sacrifice, and the finer courage. What they suffered is part of the price of our freedom, and we thank them for their brave endurance.

But it is the men who have laid down their lives in the mighty conflict, 41 in number, that we specially think of to-day. We are met here, in this place of hallowed memories, to acknowledge before God the great debt we owe to our unreturning brave. It is only right that we should thus recall the services of our fallen heroes, and that we should reverently do them honour. Their blood has been shed in defence of our most sacred and cherished possessions. These men had no love for war. But they knew that justice and liberty must be upheld at all costs. They had a vision of the righteousness and kingdom of God and of the duty of serving these to the uttermost. So calmly and



deliberately they made their choice, knowing what their action meant, and they have paid the price of victory and peace in the spirit of Him who said, "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends." For our sake, for Britain's sake, and for the world's sake they have given their lives. Some have fallen on historic battle-fields; others have perished in distant seas, or

"Sunk beneath the wave, Fast by their native shore."

They fought and suffered for the noblest of causes; they died for truth and faithfulness, for righteousness and freedom, for the moral conditions that make possible a permanent peace.

These brave young knights have made the supreme sacrifice. And perhaps the hardest thing to understand and bear is that death has taken them from us while they were still in life's morning. But we dare not say that they were taken before their time. We dare not say that they would have accomplished more if they had been permitted to come back to us. "We live in deeds, not years." Only God can tell whether life or death is of greater use in the working out of His purposes.

"One gave long years with heart and brain,
One, youth's brief fiery blow,
For freedom; whence the greater gain
Only the high gods know"

It is not the length of one's life here that matters, but what is done with the life. It may be completed at twenty as well as at seventy. Did not the Christ die in the flower of His manhood? Yet there was nothing untimely about His death. He died only when His hour was come, so that He was able to say: "It is finished." He had accomplished the work that His Father had given Him to do. What seems to us the incompleteness of life is in reality one of the signs of its continuance. "On the earth the broken arc; in the heaven the perfect round."

In laying their all upon the altar our young heroes have done a far, far better thing than ever they had done before; and as we think of the great sacrifice, one question forces itself upon us—Are we worthy of it? We have been travelling through a long dark night, and because these men have suffered and bled and died we are now standing with our faces toward the dawn. The hope is in our hearts that

"There shall come from out this noise of strife and groaning A broader and a juster brotherhood."

The fulfilment of the hope depends on the use we make of our dearly-bought heritage. So let us keep faith with the men who return to us no more. Let us use our freedom for the high ends of the Kingdom of God. Let us rejoice that we are privileged to live and play our part in these great times; and in the after days, when our children and our children's children see "the light high in the heavens," we shall be able to say to them:

"I saw the powers of darkness put to flight!
I saw the morning break!"
