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# REGULATIONS

OF THE

GLASGOW ASYLUM FOR LUNATICS,

ERECTED BY PUBLIC CONTRIBUTION,

*And opened on the 1st December, 1814.*

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## General Meetings of Contributors.

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I.—The General Meetings shall be composed of Contributors to the extent of at least Five Guineas, or Annual Subscribers to the extent of at least One Guinea. The Lord Provost of Glasgow shall preside, and, in his absence, a Chairman shall be elected. All matters of debate shall be determined by a majority; and in case of an equality, the Chairman shall be entitled to a casting vote, in addition to his own as a Member of the Meeting.

II.—A General Meeting shall be held annually, on the Thursday after the first Tuesday of January, for the purpose of considering the Report of the Directors during the preceding year, and of choosing by ballot eight of their own number as Directors for the current year.

III.—A *pro-re-nata* General Meeting may at any time be called by the Lord Provost, by three of the Directors, or by six of the qualified Contributors or Subscribers; intimation of the time, place, and purpose of such Meeting being always given, by public advertisement in two or more of the Glasgow Newspapers, at least one week previously.

IV.—It shall be competent for all General Meetings to revise, direct, and control the whole affairs and management of the Institution.

V.—If, at any future period, the persons qualified according to the first Regulation shall be reduced below twelve in number, all General Meetings shall thenceforward cease; and in that event, the number of Directors to be chosen from the community shall be returned as follows:—two by the Town Council, two by the Merchants' House, two by the Trades' House, two by the General Session, and two by the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons, none of whom shall

be Members of the public body by whom they may be so elected.

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### Directors.

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I.—The ordinary management shall be vested in twenty-three Directors, who shall be constituted as follows :—five *ex-officiis*, viz. the Lord Provost of Glasgow, the Chief Magistrate of Paisley, the Professors of Anatomy and of Medicine in the University of Glasgow, and the Physician to the Asylum for the time being; ten to be returned by Public Bodies of the City, viz. two by the Town Council, two by the Merchants' House, two by the Trades' House, two by the General Session, and two by the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons; and eight to be elected by the General Meeting, in manner as mentioned.

II.—Five Directors shall form a quorum; the Chairman shall be appointed, and the procedure shall be conducted in the same form and manner as at General Meetings.

III.—The Directors shall be convened within five days after the Annual General Meeting, for

the purpose of electing by ballot the following Office-Bearers for the year; *viz.* a Weekly Committee, Visitors, and such Committees of Management as may be deemed expedient; a Physician, Surgeon, Superintendent and Apothecary, Matron, Chaplain, Treasurer and Secretary, Porter, and such other Office-Bearers as may be required.

IV.—The Directors shall likewise meet once every quarter, on the first Tuesday of April, July, October, and January, for the despatch of ordinary business.

V.—A *pro-re-nata* Meeting of Directors may at any time be called by the Lord Provost, by the Weekly Committee, or by any three of the Directors, for which purpose a requisition shall be addressed to the Secretary, with which he shall be bound to comply, and to give due intimation of such Meetings, by printed or written notices, left on the day preceding, at the house or place of business of each Director, specifying the time, place, and object of such Meeting.

VI.—The Directors shall have the power of enacting such Rules for the conduct of the Officers and Servants, and of making, from time to time, such alterations of, or additions to the same, as may appear best calculated to promote the welfare of the Institution; but no such alterations or

additions shall be adopted, till they have been submitted to the consideration of the Directors for one month at least, and have been thereafter approved of by two-thirds of a Meeting called for the express purpose of deciding on the same.

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### Weekly Committee.

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I.—The management of the internal concerns and particular interests of the Institution, shall be vested in the Weekly Committee, consisting of six Directors. They shall meet once a-week at the Asylum, on such day and at such hour as the majority of themselves may appoint ; one Member shall form a quorum for the transaction of ordinary business, but three shall be required for extraordinary. They shall regulate the admission of Patients, the economy of the House, the conduct of the Officers and Servants, and all other details which may occur in the usual course of business.

II.—A *pro-re-nata* Meeting of the Weekly Committee may at any time be called by any one Member, on a requisition addressed to the Secretary, as aforesaid.



## Physician.

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I.—The Physician shall visit the Asylum at least three times a-week, and examine each Patient once a-week. When any one labours under fever, or any acute disease, the Physician shall visit that Patient every day, or as often as, in similar cases, is usually deemed necessary.

II.—After reading the case, as entered by the Apothecary, the Physician shall carefully examine each Patient, and then prescribe the treatment. This shall be distinctly marked in the Case-Book, in which, from time to time, regular reports shall be made of the effects of the prescriptions, and of the variations that may occur in the disease.

III.—On the death or discharge of a Patient, the Physician shall add to the history of the case, such remarks as may seem proper for explaining and improving the practice; and he shall furnish to dismissed Patients, or their friends, in writing, such precautionary instructions as he may think best adapted for preventing a relapse.

IV.—Every volume of the Case-Book shall be considered as the property of the Asylum, and none shall, on any pretence, be carried out.



V.—No person shall have access to the Case-Book, except the Directors, the Physician, the Superintendent and Apothecary, or such as may obtain, for some specific purpose, a written order from the Weekly Committee.

VI.—No part of such cases shall ever be published, except by the Physician, or with his consent, or in consequence of formal permission from the Directors ; and no name shall, *on any account*, or by any person, be improperly disclosed, nor any circumstance mentioned, which may tend to hurt the feelings of the friends or relations of any Patient.

VII.—In another Book, entitled the “ Physician’s Visiting-Book,” he shall mark the day and hour of each visit, together with any observation respecting the general management that seems worthy of notice. This Book shall be regularly laid before the Weekly Committee, whose Meetings he shall attend as often as possible.

VIII.—When he shall judge it necessary, he may call another Physician or Surgeon into consultation ; and, when farther aid or advice shall be desired by the Directors, the Weekly Committee, or the relations of any Patient, the Physician shall always be present at the visit.

IX.—He shall prepare a Report on the state of

the Institution, to be submitted to the Directors, at each Quarterly Meeting; and also the Report of each year's procedure, to be laid before the Annual General Meeting of Contributors.

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### Surgeon.

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The Surgeon shall attend the Asylum whenever his assistance may be desired by the Physician, or by the Superintendent; and the compensation to be allowed for his services shall be determined by the Weekly Committee.

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### Superintendent and Apothecary.

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#### I.—SUPERINTENDENT.

I.—He is to superintend and regulate the whole Establishment, subject, with respect to the treatment of the Patients, to the orders of the Physician, when present, and responsibility to him when absent.

II.—He shall devote his whole time and attention to the interests of the Institution, and shall not be entitled to take charge of any Patients who are not in the Asylum.

III.—Every morning and evening, at least, he shall examine the room of each Male Patient, together with the galleries, day-rooms, and exercising grounds.

IV.—He shall have the charge of all the Male Servants of the House, with power to hire and dismiss; and, in the event of his suddenly dismissing any, he shall report the cause to the next Meeting of the Weekly Committee.

V.—He shall keep a correct list of all the articles belonging to the apartments on the Male side, and of all the clothes belonging to the Male Patients, and regularly note such variations as may occur.

VI.—He shall keep a distinct account of all the provisions ordered and brought in, and of the money received and expended by him for the Asylum.

VII.—During meals he shall frequently examine the different rooms, observe the state of the provisions, as to cooking, cleanliness, propriety of distribution, &c. the conduct of the Keepers, and the demeanour of the Patients; and every night, before retiring to rest, he shall examine the House with the greatest care.

VIII.—He shall never be absent from the Asy-

lum at the same time with the Matron, nor during the night, without leave from the Weekly Committee.



## 2.—APOTHECARY.

I.—On the admission of each Patient, the Apothecary shall enter a description of the case in a Book to be kept by him for that purpose, and entitled “ Case-Book for Patients,” marking distinctly every circumstance stated by the friends, or learned by communications with the Patient. The case so taken shall be read to the Physician, or by him, before he examines the Patient.

II.—In the same Book, the Apothecary shall mark the reports and prescriptions dictated by the Physician.

III.—He shall carefully prepare, and faithfully administer, or see administered, every medicine ordered by the Physician.

IV.—Under the direction of the Physician, he shall perform all the smaller operations. When any difficult operation may be thought necessary, the Surgeon of the Asylum shall be employed to perform it, unless some other shall be preferred by the relations of the Patient.

V.—In a Book kept for the purpose, he shall enter all the medicines which he orders; and in another, all the instruments purchased for the Asylum, noting, from time to time, such as may be injured or worn out, so that a sufficient number, in the best order, may always be kept ready.

VI.—In a Day-Book, he shall keep a register of the weather, marking, in separate columns, the height of the Barometer and Thermometer, the day of the moon, direction of the wind, &c.

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### Matron.

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I.—The Matron shall take a charge of the Female Servants, Keepers, and Patients, similar to that of the Superintendent in regard to the Males; and every morning and evening she is, with equal care, to examine their apartments, day-rooms, and galleries.

II.—She is also to superintend the kitchen, the washing-house, and laundry.

III.—She shall make out and keep correct inventories of the whole furniture, bed-clothes, and linens in the House, to be laid before the Weekly

Committee at the conclusion of every year, for the purpose of examination. She shall likewise keep a regular list of the apparel belonging to the Female Patients.

IV.—She shall never be absent from the Asylum at the same time with the Superintendent, nor during the night, without leave from the Weekly Committee.

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### Chaplain.

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I.—The Chaplain shall perform divine service in the Asylum at least once every fortnight, on Sundays, throughout the year, and at any fixed hour of the day which may be found to be most convenient.

II.—It shall be a part of his duty to visit any Patient in the Asylum, with the approbation or at the desire of the Physician, with whose consent other Clergymen may also be admitted occasionally to visit the Patients.

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### Treasurer and Secretary.

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I.—The Treasurer, who shall also act as Secretary, shall, at his appointment, find satisfactory



security for his intromissions, to such extent as the Directors shall consider reasonable; and he shall be allowed such a Salary for his trouble as they shall fix.

II.—He shall, once a quarter, collect all sums due for the board and other expenses of the Patients; he shall, from time to time, receive all subscriptions, donations, and legacies; and, in general, all sums of money to which the Institution shall be entitled.

III.—He shall, once a quarter, discharge all demands against the Asylum, except such claims for petty household expenses as it may be found more convenient for the Superintendent to settle as they occur, from funds to be supplied to him by the Treasurer.

IV.—He shall regularly deposit with such Banking Company as the Directors shall appoint, on an account to be opened in his name, as Treasurer to the Asylum, all sums of money, whenever they amount to twenty pounds.

V.—He shall keep such Books of Accounts as shall be necessary for exhibiting to the Directors at all times the state of his transactions, and of the affairs of the Asylum in general. In particular, he shall keep the following Books;—

A *Register of the Patients*, showing the dates of their admission, their names, their former residences, their rates of board, the sureties for payment of it, the dates to which it has been paid up, and the dates of the death or dismissal of the Patients.

A *Cash-Book*, in which the whole sums received and paid shall be regularly entered from day to day.

A *Ledger*, in which the various Receipts and Disbursements shall be entered to their respective Accounts; such as the Bank, Patients' Board, Furniture, Grounds and Buildings, House Expense, &c.

A *Letter-Book*, containing copies of all letters of any importance written by him on the business of the Asylum.

A *Register of Contributors*, in which their names shall be entered alphabetically, with their residences, and the dates of their contributions.

VI.—He shall attend all the Meetings of the Directors, the General Meetings of the Contributors, the Meetings of the Weekly Committee, and of such other Committees as may be appointed from time to time, and shall write their Minutes, and otherwise attend to their instructions. These Minutes he shall afterwards enter in two separate Books, the one of which shall be kept exclusively for the proceedings of the Weekly Committee, and the other for those of the Contributors and Directors.

VII.—He shall, by written or printed notices, give due intimation to the Directors and their Committees, of the time, place, and purpose, of all Meetings to be attended by them; and shall, in like manner, warn the Visitors in their order.

VIII.—He shall conduct the whole correspondence connected with his department of the business of the Institution; and shall, at all reasonable times, be ready to give the necessary information and directions to those applying for the admission of Patients; and shall exercise his best discretion in judging of the sufficiency of the sureties offered for their board.

IX.—He shall carefully preserve the vouchers of his disbursements, with the whole letters of correspondence, title-deeds, and other such documents relative to the affairs of the Asylum; which, with the Books to be kept by him, as before-mentioned, shall at all times be subject to the examination of the Directors.

X.—He shall, at the close of each year, have his Books of Accounts made up, and prepare a distinct state of his whole Receipts and Disbursements during the year preceding. These, with the vouchers thereof, he shall then lay before the Directors, that they may be minutely examined by them, or by a Committee of their number ap-

pointed for that purpose, and docketed, if found correct.

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### Male and Female Keepers.

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The Keepers shall observe exactly the following Rules, with such farther instructions as shall be furnished to them by the Physician or Superintendent.

I.—The Keepers shall use the Patients with the greatest mildness and gentleness, and shall not subject them to confinement, to privation, or punishment of any kind, without express authority and specific instructions from the Physician, or, in his absence, from the Superintendent.

II.—No Keeper shall at any time attempt to deceive or to terrify a Patient, nor to irritate the Patient by mockery, by mimicry, or by wanton allusions to any thing ludicrous in the present appearance, or ridiculous in the past conduct of the Patient.

III.—Every Keeper is to exercise the greatest vigilance, and, while the Patients think themselves

at perfect liberty, they are to be continually under the Keeper's eye, both in the day-rooms, in the galleries, and in the exercising ground.

IV.—Whatever peculiarity the Keepers may observe in any Patient, they are immediately to mention it to the Superintendent.

V.—None of the Keepers shall quit their posts, without special permission from the Superintendent or Matron, for a limited time, nor shall any of them be absent from the Asylum after nine o'clock in the evening. During their absence, which is never to extend beyond the time specified, their place must be supplied by a trust-worthy person.

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### Visitors.

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I.—The Asylum shall be regularly visited twice a-week by a Director, or a Visitor appointed from among the Subscribers.

II.—The number of Visitors in one year should not exceed Thirteen, and none should be appointed but those who agree to perform the duty.



III.—The Visitors may visit in rotation, for one or two weeks, as may be agreed on. Each shall be regularly warned by the Secretary when his turn comes round, and, when he is prevented, he may request another Visitor to supply his place.

IV.—In a Book kept for the purpose, the Visitors shall mark the day and hour of their visit; the letter of the Ward, and the number of the apartment of each Patient who may be confined; the condition in which they find the House, the Servants, and the Patients, with any thing that occurs to them, as requiring change or improvement. These Reports shall be regularly laid before the Weekly Committee, and, when thought necessary, the Committee shall lay them before the Directors.

V.—The Visitors are expected to repeat nothing out of the Asylum, by which the feelings of relations, or of the Patients on recovery, may be hurt.

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### Porter.

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I.—The Porter shall attend the Gate according to instructions, and, when necessarily absent, shall always commit the care of it to some trusty person, so that it may never be left without an attendant.



II.—He shall be bound at all times to obey the Superintendent and Matron.

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## Patients.

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I.—Patients shall be admitted on a written application to the Directors from one or more of their nearest relatives, or from their guardians, or, in the case of Paupers, from the Ministers of the Parishes to which they belong, accompanied by a certificate of insanity from a respectable medical practitioner, and an obligation for payment of the board, and for due observance of the Rules of the Institution, from one or two responsible persons, resident in Glasgow, agreeably to the forms contained in the Appendix.

II.—The Physician shall have power to grant orders for admitting, and for dismissing Patients, subject to the control of the Weekly Committee. In the absence of the Physician from town, the Superintendent shall have power to receive Patients till such time as the Physician shall arrive.

III.—In cases of emergency, Keepers and apparatus may be employed to secure a lunatic out of the Asylum, or to bring a Patient to the House,

by order of the Physician, or, in his absence from town, by authority of the Superintendent, such cases being always reported to the Weekly Committee.

IV.—Patients shall be admitted at such rates of board as shall from time to time be fixed by the Directors.

V.—According to the Rate of Board, a difference will be observed in some or all of the following particulars, *viz.* in the size of the bed-room, in the number of apartments, in the quality of furniture and of diet, in the rank of associates, and in the proportion of Keepers, or Servants, appointed to a given number of Patients.

VI.—Paupers belonging to the City of Glasgow shall be admitted at a rate annually fixed by a Committee, consisting of two of the Directors of the Town's Hospital, two of the Directors of the Asylum, and one of the Magistrates of the City.

VII.—Parishes which contribute a sum proportioned to their population, shall pay for their Paupers a board according to the rate annually fixed for Paupers belonging to Glasgow.

VIII.—Parishes which may not so contribute, shall pay according to the next rate of board.

IX.—The board shall in all cases be paid quarterly, and in advance.

X.—When any Patient shall be dismissed, or shall die, before the close of a quarter, the Weekly Committee shall have power to decide whether any, and what portion of the sum advanced for board, shall be refunded.

XI.—Patients shall have no claim to remuneration for their labour.

XII.—A fee on admission shall be paid to the Physician for each Patient at such rate of board as shall be fixed by the Directors.

XIII.—On the dismissal or on the death of a Patient, after six and within twelve months, the fee shall be repeated. But should the Patient remain a year or longer, the fee shall be repeated only on the expiry of the year, and on that of each succeeding year of his or her residence in the Asylum. No fee shall be paid for Paupers, nor for Patients at the first rate of board.

XIV.—When any Patient is ordered to be dismissed, due notice of the order shall always be given in writing, by the Secretary, to the person or persons in Glasgow, who have granted the obligation for payment of board; and if the Patient

shall not be removed from the Asylum within a week after the time fixed in the notice, the rate of board shall be doubled.

XV.—Near relatives, or guardians, or others producing proper authority in writing from those upon whose application Patients have been admitted, shall be allowed, on receiving an order from the Physician, to visit Patients at such hours as he may specify.

XVI.—No person shall be permitted to bring into the House, or to carry out of it, any article for a Patient, without the knowledge of the Superintendent, or of the Matron.

XVII.—Every Patient shall be provided with a proper suit of apparel, and with a sufficient number of changes of those articles of dress which require to be often washed. An accurate list of every article brought with a Patient, must, on admission, be delivered to the Superintendent or Matron. If any necessary part of dress shall not be duly supplied, after intimation has been given that it is wanted, it shall be provided by the Superintendent or Matron, and the cost of it charged against the relatives, guardians, or parish by whom the Patient has been placed in the Asylum.

XVIII.—If at any time the House shall be full,

those who apply for the admission of Patients shall be preferred in the order of their applications; and the dates of such applications shall be regularly entered in a Book to be kept for that purpose by the Secretary. The Weekly Committee, however, shall have a discretionary power of acting according to circumstances, in judging of such applications.

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### General Rules.

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I.—None of the Officers, Keepers, or Servants, shall, on any account, receive money or presents from the Patients, or any of their friends, or from those who have dealings with the Institution, without the knowledge and approbation of the Weekly Committee.

II.—None of the Male Officers, Keepers, Servants, or Visitors, shall be admitted into the wards appropriated for Female Patients, unless accompanied either by the Matron or a Female Keeper; nor shall the Matron, or any of the Female Keepers, Servants, or Visitors, be admitted into the wards occupied by the Male Patients, unless accompanied either by the Physician, the Superintendent, or one of the Male Keepers.

III.—All communications respecting the Patients, addressed to any of the Officers or Servants of the Institution, shall be immediately submitted to the Physician.

IV.—Persons desirous to view the Asylum, may be admitted to see such parts of it as can with propriety be shown, provided they obtain a written order from a Director, and be accompanied, in going round the House, either by a Director, or by the Superintendent or Matron, or some confidential person specially appointed.

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## I.—LETTER OF APPLICATION,

Prefix the name of the place, and the date of subscription.—Insert, in their proper places, the name of the Patient, and that of the County, Town, or Parish, in which he has resided; and fill up the other blank spaces properly.—Each subscriber of this letter must state his or her proper address; and, if a relative, the denomination of his or her relationship.

## II.—MEDICAL CERTIFICATE.

The medical practitioner granting this certificate, will, after prefixing the name of the place and the date of his subscription, insert his own name, designation, and place of residence; the name of the Patient, and that of the County, Town, or Parish, in which he resides. If the practitioner be a member of the Society of Friends, let him use the form of affirmation adopted by that Society.

## III.—OBLIGATION

For Payment of Board, to be subscribed by one or two responsible persons, resident in Glasgow.

*To the Directors of the Glasgow Lunatic Asylum.*

*As you have agreed to admit  
 into the Glasgow Lunatic Asylum, as a Patient and Boarder,

 always in advance, to your Treasurer; to provide the requisite  
 supplies of clothes; to remove the Patient when required; to  
 defray, in case of death, the funeral charges; and to fulfil  
 any other condition incumbent on me as Surety for the Patient,  
 according to your Regulations.*

## IV.—QUERIES.

Relatives or Guardians, with the assistance of the Medical Attendant, are requested to furnish, according to the best of their knowledge, precise Answers to the following Queries, or to as many of them as may be applicable to the case of the Patient.

## HISTORY.

1. How long has the Patient been insane?
2. If the Patient has been oftener than once insane, when did the malady first occur; how often did it occur before this last attack; in what form, and of what duration?
3. Before the symptoms of lunacy became manifest, was any alteration observed in the temper, disposition, opinions, conduct, sleep, appetite, state of bowels, or health of the Patient; and how long before lunacy were any such precursory symptoms observed?
4. Does the malady appear to be increasing, declining, or stationary; and has any durable change in its form occurred?
5. Are there lucid intervals, or any great remissions, or exacerbations; and do such changes occur at uncertain times, or at stated periods?
6. Does the Patient rave indifferently on various subjects, or chiefly on one? and what is that subject? Mention particularly any permanent or remarkable illusions.
6. Has the Patient ever threatened or attempted to commit any act of self-violence? and by what means?
7. Has the Patient ever made any premeditated or dangerous attempt to injure any other person? and how?
8. Is the Patient prone to tear clothes, or to break furniture?

## CAUSES.

10. What is the age, and what was the profession or occupation of the Patient?
11. Is the Patient married or single, and was any relative of the Patient ever insane?
12. Were there any remarkable peculiarities in the Patient's *original* temper, disposition, opinions, habits, deportment, or

conduct? and, if so, what were these peculiarities? Mention, especially, predominant passions, religious impressions, and any habitual *vice*, or intemperance.

13. Is the Patient subject to periodical attacks of any other malady; to any unusual discharge, or to suppression or obstruction of any *customary* discharge; to sores, eruptions, rupture, epilepsy, or palsy? Specify any bodily infirmity, or disease of the Patient.

14. Did the present fit of lunacy occur, or has any former fit occurred, during pregnancy or in childbed?

15. Was the head of the Patient ever severely injured?

16. What is supposed to have been the exciting cause of the malady?

#### TREATMENT.

17. What has been done for the recovery of the Patient? and with what effect?

18. Has the Patient ever been treated for lunacy, in any public asylum or private mad-house? If so, how often, and how long, on each occasion, has the Patient been in any such establishment? When, in what state, and, if not cured, for what reason was the Patient dismissed?
