Collector's Accounts.

The Account of the Intromissions of Mr. William Maclean, Jun., as Collector of the House for the year preceding 17th September last, was referred to as on the table; and the Convener stated that, in terms of the Resolution of the House, the Account, and the Auditors' Report thereon, had been printed and circulated among the Members. The Meeting, on the motion of the Deacon-Convener, discharged, and do hereby discharge, Mr. MacLean of his Intromissions with the Funds of the House, and, further, thanked him for his great care of and attention to the interests of the House, and the excellent manner in which he had discharged the duties of the office of Collector during the past year.

Corse Glen, and the Meeting accordingly, by a majority, elected, and do hereby nominate and appoint Mr. Tullis Collector to the House for the ensuing year, and he accepted that office, and qualified as use is; and he named Deacon Skinner and Mr. Thomas G. Weir as Cautioners to the extent of £500 for the faithful discharge of his duties as Collector of the Trades' House. The Meeting approve and appoint the Bond to be prepared as usual.

Agree to concur in instituting an action.

FLESHERS.

Agree to become a party to action.

MASONS.

Agree to concur in instituting an action, but on the express condition that the whole expense shall be paid out of the funds of the Trades' House.

Agree to become a party to action, provided the Trades' House relieve them of all legal expenses connected therewith, and on condition that the proceeds of sale falling to the House and Incorporations be applied in the re-erection of new Buildings on the present or some other site.

BARBERS.

Consent to contribute the same proportion in the new Trades' Hall Buildings that they have in the present Buildings.

The Meeting appoint the Account to be printed and circulated as usual, and adjourn the further and final consideration thereof until the next meeting of the House.

Letter from Weavers as to Entrants' fees.

The Clerk read a letter, dated 28th August last, which he had received from the Clerk to the Incorporation of Weavers, annexing copy Resolution of that incorporation as to fees chargeable for Entrants, to be submitted to the House for approval. The Meeting remit the same to the Bye-Laws Committee to consider and report.

Remit.

Minutes of Committee on Finance.

The Minutes of the Meetings of the Committee on Finance, dated 3rd and 29th June last, and 17th and 21st September instant, were read and approved.

Minutes of Committee on Bye-Laws.

The Minutes of the Meetings of the Committee on Bye-Laws, dated 3rd July and 25th August last, were read and approved, subject to the following addition, on the motion of Deacon Robert Anderson, to the Minute of 3rd July last—viz., that “in the election for the offices of Deacon and Collector, it shall be necessary to have a majority of the Members present and voting to secure an election, but for the other offices the candidate or candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be deemed elected”—be inserted after the first paragraph on page 9 of the Bye-Laws of the Incorporation of Dyers.

Additional Amendment on Dyers' Bye-Laws.

Upon the motion of Mr. Henry Stewart, the Meeting unanimously resolve to send prints of the collected Bye-Laws of the House to the Clerks of the several Incorporations, to be considered by the various Master Courts, and report such suggestions as they may consider expedient.

The Minutes of the Meetings of the Committee on Education, Minutes of Committee dated 14th July and 25th August last, and of the Sub-Committee, on Education, dated 1st September instant, were read and approved.

The Minutes of the Meetings of the Committee on Buildings, Minutes of Committee dated 17th and 21st September instant, were read, and the Deacon-Convener moved that they be approved of, which was duly seconded.

Mr. Andrew Lauchlan moved that the Minute of 21st September Amendment instant be disapproved of, and was seconded by Mr. Donald Munro.

The vote having been taken, the Meeting, by a majority, Vote, approve of the Minutes.

In terms of the notice given by him at last General Meeting, Mr. David Kinghorn moved—“That a Return be made by the Clerks of each of the Incorporations of the persons belonging to their Incorporation presently in receipt of pensions from the funds of the Trades' House, the amount received by those persons from the Incorporation to which they belong, also the amount they were receiving at the time they were recommended for a Trades' House pension”—which was seconded by Mr. W. R. Copland, and unanimously agreed to.

Thereafter, Mr. Andrew Lauchlan, in terms of the notice given by him, moved—(1) “That the Lord Ordinary (Lee) having delivered an Interim Interlocutor on the action raised by the House in the Court of Session for Division and Sale, in which he states his difficulties in dealing with the whole case, and ‘thinks it right to report the matter to the Court in order that his difficulties, if unsubstantial, may be disposed of in a manner which will leave the title clear of all doubt,’ resolve that a copy of said Interim Interlocutor and Report be printed and sent to the Members of the House and the various Incorporations as parties in the case”—which was not seconded, and consequently fell.

Mr. Lauchlan further moved—(2) “That, in the altered circumstances in which the House is now placed it be remitted to the Committee on Buildings to take steps to put the Large Hall into a more lettable condition by cleaning, painting, &c., and that

The Meeting resolve to dine together on Wednesday, the 14th day of October next, being the day on which the Deacon-Convener and Collector fall to be elected; that the usual sum be contributed towards the expense from the funds of the House; and appoint the Convener, Collector, late Convener, and late Collector, and Messrs. Phillips, Barr, and Sellars a Committee to make all necessary arrangements.

For the year ending 31st August, 1885, the Dean of Guild Court granted 182 linings, detailed as under, with estimated values, viz. :—

For the disposal of these cases, 33 Courts were held, each with a preceding meeting, at which the plans were subjected to a careful examination in all their details, and the foregoing valuation made. Many of the practical suggestions made by the Representatives were given effect to, and, on seven occasions, they made special inspections in various districts of the city.

CLYDE NAVIGATION TRUST.

Mr. ANDREW M'ONIE.

Appointed a member of the "New Works," "Ferries," and "Harbour" Committees, and attended throughout the year 58 meetings, as also several Sub-Committee meetings, besides the regular visits to the works in progress. On various occasions formed one of the Deputations appointed throughout the year.

Mr. ROBERT ROBIN.

Attended all the monthly meetings of the Trustees, and the meetings of Committee of Management, as also nine out of the ten meetings of the "Ferries" Committee, and twelve out of the thirteen meetings of "Rates" Committee.

The depression of trade has affected the Harbour and Govan Ferries, the number of passengers carried being 7,404,186, against about 9,000,000 in 1882-1883, when the greatest number were carried. The up and down river steamers have rendered signal service to the public. The number of passengers availing themselves of the service gradually increases, and other hopeful signs point to this branch early proving a financial success.

It is worthy of note that the revenue of the Trust has, for the year 1885, reached the highest figure ever attained, viz., £291,658.

HUTCHESONS' HOSPITAL.

Mr. THOMAS REID.

No report.

Mr. ANDREW MITCHELL.

Attended all the meetings of the Patrons, and taken my share of the general work of the Hospital. As a member of the Pension Committee, visited 27 applicants in their own homes, and saw that those who had been Members of any of the Incorporations or of the House should have every attention paid to their claims. Was thus of use in getting some of our decayed Members on the Pension Roll of the Hospital who would otherwise have been left out.

Mr. D. CORSE GLEN.

Attended three general meetings, and four of the Pension Committee, besides visiting 26 applicants for pensions. The principal change effected in the management of the Hospital was the separation of the Educational from the Pension Trust, through the action of the "Educational Endowments Act, 1882," under the scheme for which the Trades House sends one Representative to the Educational Trust, while the Representatives as at present remain on the Pension Trust. The pensions were granted on the 2nd June, 1885, and were, with few exceptions, for five years. Augmentations to 142 recipients, amounting to £451, were recommended; the total amount granted, including renewals and augmentations, being £1805.

BUCHANAN INDUSTRIAL INSTITUTION.

The Representatives desire to remind the House that this Institution was founded to provide educational and industrial training for destitute children, and that by the settlement of the late Mr. Buchanan, the founder, £3000 per annum was bequeathed to the Institution during the lifetime of his widow, and the residue of the estate at her death. The residue was expected to have been sufficient to provide £3000 per annum in perpetuity, but owing to depreciation in the Stocks held by Mr. Buchanan and the long period that the widow survived him, the residue of the estate has been so reduced that it cannot be expected to provide over £2000 per annum.

Efficiently conducted hitherto, the Institution has proved eminently successful. Many pupils have risen to good positions—several have become clergymen; last year one graduated as M.B.C.M. and another obtained from the Board of Trade a certificate as sailing master.

The number of boys at present on the roll is 303, and while, during the year, the average number on the roll has been 288, the average daily attendance has been 245.

These boys, in addition to educational and industrial training, are supplied daily with breakfast, dinner, and supper, and the total average cost per boy in attendance was £8 0s. 1d.

In conclusion, your Reporters add:—The pupils are necessarily in very poor circumstances, and, when any have developed unusual talent, it has been a matter of regret that no means are available for assisting such pupils to prosecute their education beyond the point to which they are carried in the Institution. It might be worth consideration, whether it would not be desirable for the House to institute three or four scholarships of a small amount, to be awarded by competition and held for three or four years—one being available for competition annually. Seeing that the House received from Mr. Buchanan a legacy of ten thousand pounds for educational purposes—specially designed for sons of decayed Members of the House—it appears that it would be a graceful act to spend a few pounds annually in this way for the benefit of the pupils of the Institution, who are virtually Mr. Buchanan's foster children.

The Representatives cordially recommend this suggestion to the favourable consideration of the House.

Mr. JOHN MILLEN.

Did not attend any meetings owing to other engagements.

COLLEGE OF SCIENCE AND ARTS.

Mr. ANDREW M'ONIE.

Attended about 14 meetings of the Management of the Institution, including one for examination of pupils competing for the "Guilds of London" grants.

ALLAN GLEN'S SCHOOL.

Mr. THOMAS MILLER.

Appointed a member of three Committees, as also one of the auditors, and attended 18 meetings throughout the year.

The Glen School continues to prosper, and was last year completely filled with scholars.

The Endowed School Commissioners have, under their new scheme, given the Trustees power to expend £8000 in extending the School Buildings, by which the usefulness of the School will be greatly increased, and, so soon as the scheme receives the sanction of Parliament, operations are to be commenced.

HALDANE'S TRUST.

Mr. THOMAS MILLER.

Attended the four meetings of the Trust held during the year.

The Trustees have done little further than assist the Endowed School Commissioners to prepare a scheme for the future management of the Trust.

The Funds of the Trust are still applied in assisting the School of Design, more especially in the application of design to the industrial arts.

Mr. HENRY MACFARLANE.

No report.

M'MILLAN'S BEQUEST.

No meetings.

ROYAL INFIRMARY.

Mr. ROBERT PATERSON.

Attended nearly every one of the monthly meetings of the Managers, and some of the weekly meetings of the House Committee, and visited wards as appointed.

An efficient Institution, which continues to merit the support of the House.

WESTERN INFIRMARY.

Mr. WILLIAM BOYD.

Attended the meetings of the House Committee—of which Committee appointed a member—as also the monthly meetings of the Directors, until the beginning of April, when laid aside by a lengthened illness.

Mr. A. M. BAYNE.

Appointed a member of the House Committee, and regularly attended its weekly meetings, as also the monthly meetings of the Board of Directors.

Visited the Infirmary periodically.

This Institution is very efficiently conducted, and deserves the hearty support of the Trades House and the several Incorporations.

LUNATIC ASYLUM.

Mr. GEORGE YOUNGER.

Attended the meetings of the Directors and visited the establishment. The affairs of the Institution are in a very satisfactory state in all respects.

Mr. DAVID KINGHORN.

Attended three of the four meetings of Directors. At the second meeting the election of Committees took place, but I was not put in any of them. Visited the establishment, when everything seemed to be worked in an economical and effective manner.

ASYLUM FOR THE BLIND.

Mr. HENRY STEWART.

This Institution continues to meet the wants of a very interesting portion of the community deserving of sympathy and support.

There is a Board of twenty Managers, which, however, divides itself into four Committees, supervising a like number of departments.

The Institution is divided into two branches—the educational and the industrial. In the former about 30 young persons are receiving an ordinary English education, including music, while in the latter about 170 are receiving employment. Neither of these branches is self-supporting, and the large annual deficit has been a source of anxiety to the Managers; but strong efforts are being made, and with some degree of success, to reduce it.

Your Reporter would recommend that, in the future appointments of Representatives by the House, Members should be sent who, by their position in the House, would be eligible to act on the Board for a period of at least two or three years.

Mr. WILLIAM NEWLANDS.

Visited the Institution several times. Did not attend the monthly meetings regularly, as they were usually held on a day and at an hour when I had another meeting to attend.

The Institution suffers from lack of funds to provide desired improvements, such as a steam engine—the want of which necessitates operations being performed by the hand which could be done better and more cheaply by machinery.

A Representative with a knowledge of kindred work, and able to visit the Institution frequently, would be very useful.

MATERNITY HOSPITAL AND DISPENSARY.

Mr. JAMES LAIRD.

Attended the four meetings of Directors, and, when appointed, visited the Hospital regularly, besides frequently calling during the session.

Found the patients well looked after, and Institution in good working order.

LOCK HOSPITAL.

Mr. JOHN M'GREGOR.

The Hospital is thoroughly and systematically managed, and, in the opinion of medical men and Police and Parochial authorities, is invaluable, and not only calculated to cure and prevent much direct physical suffering, but is the means of benefiting many of the inmates when dismissed.

Under the guidance and influence of the Matron, a considerable number are annually returned to their relatives and otherwise provided for.

CONVALESCENT HOME.

Mr. JAMES WILSON.

Attended all the quarterly meetings and a special meeting.

The business of the Home is well looked after.

COULTER'S MORTIFICATION.

JAMES A. WILSON.

No meetings held since 18th February, 1884. Mr. Munro has been in communication with the Lord Provost and Town-Clerk, urging the necessity of a meeting to give effect to testator's will. The Representatives are now informed that the Endowed School Commissioners have claimed the fund, and although the Magistrates and Council have not paid it over, Dr. Marwick will not advise any action being taken by the old Trustees and Assessors.

Your Reporters recommend that the Governors from the Trades House should give special attention to this Mortification to try and preserve it intact, as there would be no lack of applicants if proper measures were taken to advertise it yearly, and in carrying out the will of the testator encouragement would be given to a class of artisans and other inventors otherwise outwith the scope of the schemes of the Commission.

Mr. Findlay, however, was satisfied that he would have it restored and fit for occupancy by the time stipulated.

The Clerk submitted a letter dated 17th instant, which he had received from Messrs. Robertson, Low, Robertson, & Cross on behalf of Messrs. Marr, Downie, & Co., stating—"That as their clients were satisfied that the burned premises could not be restored and in a fit state for their occupation by the 1st of March next, the negotiations for the lease must be held to be at an end." He further stated that at an interview he had with Marr, Downie, & Co. they insisted on abandoning the lease unless the Trades' House would come under an obligation for the complete restoration of the premises by 1st March.

that the words, "and the management of the funds of the House," be inserted immediately after the word "hospital" in Rule 1, page 7; that the words, "not less than," be inserted before the word "five" occurring in Rule 4, page 7; that the words "debtors and" in Rule 8, page 7, be delete; that sub-section 5, Rule 11, page 9, be delete; and that the following new Rule form Rule No. 10, page 7—"In case of the death, resignation, or bankruptcy of a Collector in office, the Deacon Convener shall convene a meeting of the House, to be held not earlier than four nor later than eight days after such death, resignation, or bankruptcy, for the purpose of electing a new Collector." A Member of Committee further suggested that the words, "whose occupation is," should be inserted instead of the words, "a place of business," occurring in the fourth line of Rule 7, page 3; but the Committee do not make any recommendation regarding such an alteration.

The meeting adjourn the further consideration until a future meeting.

BYE-LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF

The Trades House
OF GLASGOW.

INTRODUCTION.

THE BYE-LAWS of the TRADES HOUSE of GLASGOW have been the growth of centuries, and the outcome of the requirements of changing years. Early in its history this ancient body was erected into a Corporation, received the sanction of Parliament, had conferred upon it extensive powers, and also functions of a partly judicial character. With little more of a written constitution than that "the Deacon-Convener shall, as occasion requires, convene the Deacons of Crafts and their Assistants, and shall judge between them and any of them all matters pertaining to the Crafts and Callings, and shall make Acts and Statutes for good order among them," it followed from the experience of years and the advancement of later days that the unwritten Code of Regulations—the traditions of the House—gradually found a place in the records of its proceedings.

These Bye-Laws—scattered throughout the Minutes of the Trades House—are, so far as still subsisting and applicable in the present day, collected and arranged in the following pages :—

THE DECREE OF DECLARATOR.

" THE LORDS OF COUNCIL AND SESSION found, and hereby find, that the Constitution of the Society of the TRADES HOUSE, as established either by the decreet-arbitral, commonly called the Letter of Guildry, anno 1605, or by immemorial usage, cannot now be altered or encroached upon, and, particularly, that the Rank or Precedency of the several Trades or Incorporations, and the Number of Members which each Incorporation has a title to send to the Trades House, as in use prior to the late encroachments, which gave rise to the present dispute, being previously established by immemorial custom, must continue, and cannot be altered or varied either by the Trades or Convenery, by themselves or with the concurrence of the Magistrates and Council of Glasgow." " Found, and hereby find, that the Regulations in the Act 1729, concerning the poor of the Trades House, are proper and subsist-

ing Regulations, until they shall be altered in a rational manner and by proper authority, reserving to all concerned to object to any such alteration if they shall see cause: Found, decerned, and declared, and hereby find, decern, and declare, that the Rank and Precedency of the several Trades and Incorporations in the Trades House is, and ought to be, as follows, and in the order here set down:—Hammermen, Tailors, Cordiners, Maltmen, Weavers, Baxters, Skinners, Wrights, Coopers, Fleshers, Masons, Gardeners, Barbers, Bonnetmakers; that the Number of Members which each Trade or Incorporation has a title to send to the Trades House are as follows, viz.:—The Hammermen, Tailors, and Cordiners, each their Deacon, with five Assistants; the Maltmen, their Visitor, with five Assistants; the Weavers, their Deacon, with three Assistants; the Bonnetmakers and Dysters, their Deacon, with one Assistant; the Baxters, Skinners, Wrights, Coopers, Fleshers, Masons, Gardeners, and Barbers, each their Deacon, with two Assistants—being in all fifty-four in number: That the Office-Bearers of the Society are a Deacon-Convener and Collector.” “That, when the Deacon-Convener and Collector are chosen out of the first five Trades—viz., the Hammermen, Tailors, Cordiners, Maltmen, or Weavers—then these Office-Bearers are to be accounted part of the ordinary Representatives of the first five Trades, so that the ordinary Number of Members of the House shall not thereby be increased; but if it shall happen that these Office-Bearers are chosen out of any of the remaining nine Incorporations, then they shall be additional extraordinary Members of the Trades House; and the Trade or Trades out of which they are chosen shall be entitled to have their ordinary Number of Representatives in the Trades House over and above the said Office-Bearers.”

CONSTITUTION OF THE HOUSE.

The several Deacons, and the Visitor, and Representatives of the several Incorporations, shall, before being received or qualified as Members of the House, exhibit to the House, or to the Deacon-Convener and Clerk of the House, their Burgess Ticket of the Craft Rank, or, if a Merchant Burgess, the receipt for payment of two guineas to the House.

REGULATING POWERS OF THE HOUSE.

1. The Deacon-Convener shall convene all the Deacons of the Crafts and their Assistants at such times as occasion shall require, and shall judge betwixt them, and any of them, in matters pertaining to the Crafts and Callings, and shall make Acts and Statutes for good order among them, with advice of the rest of the Deacons and their Assistants: Providing always that these Acts neither prejudice the common weal of this Burgh, Merchant Rank, or their Assistants, nor any privileges granted to any Deacon of this Burgh by their Letter of Deaconry granted to them. 2. The Act of 1846, for the abolition of the exclusive privilege of trading in Burghs in Scotland, provides that, notwithstanding such abolition, the "Guilds, Crafts, and Incorporations shall retain their corporate character, and shall continue to be Incorporations, with the same names and titles as heretofore; and nothing herein contained shall anywise affect the rights and privileges of such Incorporations or of the Office-Bearers or Members thereof." 9 and 10 Vict., Chap. 17, Sec. 2.

3. Any difference that shall fall out in any particular Trade with respect to the management of their stock, election of their Deacons or other Office-Bearers shall, in the first instance, be brought before the House to be determined; and for that end the Deacon-Convener for the time shall, upon application made to him, in writing, by the Deacon of any Trade wherein any difference shall fall out, or by any private Member pretended injured, convene the House for determining the said difference. THE DEACON-CONVENER.

1. It is agreed and contracted that yearly, in time coming, there shall be a Deacon-Convener, who shall ever be of the rank of Craftsmen and their Assistants, who shall yearly be chosen by the Deacons of the Crafts and their Assistants, and is to be one of the most wise and worthy amongst the said Craftsmen and their Assistants; and the Deacon-Convener shall not bear office above two years together, and shall always be an ordinary Councillor of the Town's Great Council, and have a principal key of the town's charter chest to keep, and shall be sworn faithful in his office. He shall convene all the Deacons of Crafts and their Assistants at such times as occasion shall require, and shall judge betwixt them, and any of them, in matters pertaining to the Crafts and Callings; and shall make Acts and Statutes for good order among them with the advice of the rest of the Deacons and their Assistants. THE COLLECTOR.

1. The Deacon-Convener, with the advice of the rest of the Deacons and their Assistants, shall have power to elect Collectors, one or more, for the gathering in of the rents, annuals, and duties pertaining to their Hospital, ^who shall be accountable to the Deacon-Convener and the rest of the Deacons and their Assistants for his intromissions, upon eight days' warning, as he shall be required. (2) Resolved further, that the present arrangement—viz., four Pensioners from each Incorporation—should still subsist, and that Craftsmen and their widows, before receiving a pension from the funds of the House, should, as formerly, receive a pension from the Incorporation to which they respectively belong. Should any Incorporation not be able to send any eligible persons to fill up the vacancies, the House shall appoint Members from other Incorporations otherwise qualified.

The management of the Lands of Gorbals is under their charge, and the Clerk of the House is Clerk to these Delegates and their Factor for collecting the feu-duties, &c.

On Kelvinbank and Sandyford—

Composed of the Deacon-Convener, the Collector, the late Convener, and the late Collector, and eleven Members of the House, and is appointed by the House to take charge of the feuing, &c., of the Lands of Kelvinbank and Sandyford.

On Public Business—

On 30th July, 1873, the House resolved that the House appoint a committee to conduct all business of a public nature which any Member may think necessary to bring before the House. It consists at present of the Deacon-Convener, Collector, late Convener, late Collector, and twelve Members of the House.

On Finance—

Composed of the Deacon-Convener, Collector, late Convener, and late Collector, and ten Members of the House. Its duty is to arrange loans, examine into the obligations by and the securities in favour of the House, and the valuations of the whole properties of the Corporation, and also to examine and audit the Collector's accounts, to pass all the accounts contracted by the other Committees, with the exception of the Delegates on the Lands of Gorbals, and to report to the House from time to time as may be necessary.

On Pensioners—

Composed of the Deacon-Convener, Collector, late Convener, and late Collector, and the present and late Deacons and Visitor.

On the Bye-Laws of the House and Incorporations—

Consists of the Deacon-Convener, Collector, late Convener, late Collector, and eight Members of the House.

On Education—

Consists of the Deacon-Convener, Collector, late Convener, late Collector, and fourteen Members of the House, appointed by the House, for the purpose of taking charge of the Scholarships, Bursaries and Educational Grants, &c., by the House.

In the foregoing Committees four Members constitute a quorum, and the Deacon-Convener is Chairman of them all.

No Member of the House shall be allowed to sit and vote in New, any Committee appointed by the House until he is duly qualified June 9, 1881. as a Member thereof.

RULES FOR TRADES HOUSE SENIOR SCHOLARSHIPS.

1. The Senior Scholarships of the Trades House are for the promotion of higher education.
2. There shall be nine Scholarships, of the average value of Thirty Pounds, and tenable for three years—Twenty-five Pounds to be paid the first year, Thirty the second, and Thirty-five the third year.
3. These Scholarships shall be open to Children and Grandchildren of Freemen in connection with any of the fourteen Incorporations, educated in any school. The maximum age for boys and girls competing for a Scholarship is hereby fixed at eighteen years.
4. A boy able to pass an examination in a standard somewhat equivalent to the entrance Bursary Examination at the University will be eligible for a Scholarship. A standard of corresponding value to apply to girls.
5. The holders of such Scholarships shall attend the University or some Technical Institution, and give evidence of attention to their studies, by submitting to the Clerk of the Trades House a certificate from their Teacher, before their half-yearly allowances are paid. Girls who hold Scholarships must also prosecute their studies in an Educational Institution, and in a manner satisfactory to the Committee on Education, subject to the same conditions as the boys.
6. Three Scholarships shall be filled up the first year, and the same for each succeeding year.
7. The examination shall be held in October of each year.
8. The Scholarships shall be awarded according to the merits of the candidates, on the report of a duly qualified Examiner appointed by the Committee on Education, with the sanction of the House; but the minimum of 400 out of 1000 marks must be reached in order to entitle to a Scholarship.
9. The payments shall be made in November and May in each year.
10. The Committee on Education reserve to themselves the right of testing the progress of the holders of Scholarships at the end of each year, and, in the event of not being satisfied with the progress made, or having received evidence of inattention to studies or misconduct on the part of any one holding any Scholarship, it shall be in their power to suspend them from the benefits of said Scholarships, or altogether deprive them of the same.

RULES FOR TRADES HOUSE JUNIOR SCHOLARSHIPS.

1. The above Scholarships of the Trades House are for the promotion of higher education.
2. There shall be thirty Junior Scholarships, of the average value of Fifteen Pounds, and tenable for three years—Ten Pounds to be paid the first year, Fifteen the second, and Twenty the third year; but the minimum of 400 out of 1000 marks must be reached in order to entitle to a Scholarship. Ten of these to be filled up annually.
3. These Scholarships shall be open to the Children and Grandchildren of Freemen in connection with any of the fourteen

Rules for Trades House Junior Scholarships.

Incorporations, educated in any school. The maximum age for boys and girls competing for a Junior Scholarship is hereby fixed at fourteen years.

4. A boy or girl able to pass an Examination in the Fifth* Standard of the Scottish Code, and any two of the Specific Subjects of secular instruction mentioned in said Code, will be eligible for a Junior Scholarship.

5. The holders of the Junior Scholarships shall be required to attend some school where a graduated course of higher instruction is given, and give evidence of attention to their studies by submitting to the Clerk of the House a certificate from their Teacher, before the second half of their annual allowance is paid.

6. The Examination shall be held in July of each year.

7. The payments to be made in November and May in each year.

8. The Scholarships shall be awarded according to the merits of the Candidates, on the report of a duly qualified Examiner appointed by the Committee on Education, with the sanction of the House.

9. The Committee on Education reserve to themselves the right of testing the progress of the holders of Scholarships at the end of each year, and, in the event of not being satisfied with the progress made, or of inattention to studies or misconduct on the part of any one holding any of the above Scholarships, it shall be in the power of the Committee to suspend from the benefits of said Scholarships, or altogether deprive of the same.

* STANDARD V.: *Reading*.—Reading with expression a short passage of prose or poetry, with explanation, grammar, and elementary analysis of simple sentences. *Writing*.—Writing from memory the substance of a short story or narrative read out twice by the Inspector; spelling, grammar, and handwriting to be considered. *Arithmetic*.—Practice, bills of parcels, and simple proportion. *History and Geography*.—Outlines of the History of Great Britain from the Union of the Crowns to the Death of George III. Geography of Scotland, with special knowledge of the County in which the school is situated, and map-drawing of it.

TRADES HOUSE TECHNICAL EDUCATION.

For the purpose of furthering the education of the youth of either sex connected with the Incorporations, the House has allowed the Committee on Education a sum, not to exceed in any one year £100, to be spent for Scientific Instruction—special reference being had to Art and Manufacture—in morning or evening classes.

Rules for "The Searcy Bursary."

1. There shall be One Bursary of the value of £18 per annum, tenable for three years.
2. Competitors must be sons of Members of any of the Fourteen Incorporated Trades of Glasgow, and prepared to enter on their first or second year's course at the University. They shall lodge an application, on a Schedule to be furnished, and must be recommended by the Director of Education of the Incorporation to which they belong.
3. Attendance must be given at the Arts Classes of the Glasgow University.
4. The Bursary shall be awarded according to the merits of the Candidates found eligible to compete, or it shall be in the option of the Trades' House Committee on Education to recommend such applicant as they may see fit to be appointed to the Bursary without competition. In the event of a Competition, the examination shall be that fixed for the Trades' House Senior Scholarships. A minimum of 400 out of 1000 marks must be reached in order to entitle to the Bursary.
5. The Examination shall be held or the appointment made not later than the month of October. All vacancies shall, besides being intimated to the Clerks of the several Incorporations, be advertised in the Glasgow newspapers.
6. The payments shall be made half-yearly in May and November in equal proportions.
7. The Bursary shall not be held along with the Trades' House Junior or Senior Scholarships.
8. The holder of the Bursary shall, at the close of each Session, produce to the Clerk of the Trades' House the Certificates granted by the Professors, and in the event of his not being satisfied with the progress made, or if evidence is received of inattention to studies or misconduct on the part of the holder of the Bursary, it shall be in the power of the Committee on Education to suspend such holder from the benefits thereof, or altogether deprive him of the same.

The Public Buildings, for which Linings granted, comprise:—The additions to the Bazaar; University Tower; Dispensary for Sick Children; Nurses' Dormitory, Royal Infirmary; and the Exhibition Buildings, Kelvingrove Park.

The Dean of Guild Court met on 25 occasions during the year. There were 25 preliminary meetings at which a careful examination of the plans which had been lodged was made. In addition to these ordinary meetings there were on various occasions special meetings and inspections.

CLYDE TRUST.

Messrs. JOHN BROADFOOT.

JOHN M'GREGOR.

Report that they are on several Committees of the Trust. Mr. Broadfoot on the "New Works," "Harbour," and "Ferries;" and Mr. M'Gregor on the "Harbour" and "Ferries."

The monthly meetings of the Trust, and about 40 committee meetings, were regularly attended.

The Revenue of the Trust now amounts to £287,933, and for the past year shows an increase over that of the previous year, of £5,021.

The work principally engaging the attention of the Trust consists of strengthening Custom House Quay, providing ranges of new sheds at Lancefield and Finnieston Quays, additional accommodation for Cattle at Shieldhall, proceeding with new Cessnock Dock, and the Dredging of the River. During the past year dredging was done to the extent of 1,319,344 cubic yards, at a cost of £45,206.

A reduction of 33% on the fares for the Cross Ferries has been made to the general public. The traffic by the Up and Down River Steamers has been much increased, and this, for the first time, shows a profit.

HUTCHESON'S HOSPITAL.

Mr. D. C. GLEN.

No Report.

Mr. ANDREW MITCHELL.

Attended all the meetings of the Patrons, as likewise those of the Pension Committee, of which appointed a Member.

The Patrons having for some time past thought that the division of the free Revenue as now enforced, gives too much for Education, are presently making an effort to have an alteration effected, and the former arrangement of 2/3 for Pensions and 1/3 for Education reverted to.

Mr. JAMES WILSON.

Attended nearly all the meetings of the Patrons.

Reports that the funds are carefully administered, and the interests of the Institution attended to.

BUCHANAN INDUSTRIAL INSTITUTION.

Messrs. WM. CHERRY.

JAMES Y. MERRY.

JAMES IMRIE.

Report that the Directors have only met twice since November last, the routine work of the Institution being carried on by the staff, under the supervision of the House Committee, which meets monthly.

Messrs. Cherry and Merry are members of the House Committee. There have been eleven meetings, at ten of which Mr. Cherry was present, and nine of which Mr. Merry was present. At these meetings enquiry is made into the circumstances of every boy admitted. At present there are upwards of 300 boys on the roll, who get three meals a-day, the ordinary school instruction, and industrial training in joiner and tailor work.

The Institution was last year examined by one of H.M. Inspectors, who reported favourably.

COLLEGE OF SCIENCE AND ARTS.

GLASGOW AND WEST OF SCOTLAND TECHNICAL COLLEGE.

Mr. W. R. COPLAND.

College of Science and Arts.

Attended all the meetings of the Council, and, with the exception of two, all the meetings of the committees of which appointed a member. College, under date 26th November, 1886, merged in the

Glasgow and West of Scotland Technical College.

Attended all the meetings of the Governors, with one exception.

The new college have under their charge the College of Science and Arts, Anderson's College, and the Allan Glen School.

Have been appointed Convener of the Property Committee, and that committee under the instructions of the Governors are at present making considerable alterations on the buildings connected with Anderson's College and the College of Science and Arts, and are about to proceed with an extension of Allan Glen's School at a cost of something like £8,000.

The work of the College during the Session has been of the very best order: in evidence of that, five Whitworth Scholarships of £150 each, and one of £100, have been taken by students. The number of these Scholarships for the United Kingdom is twenty-five—one for £200, eight for £150, and sixteen for £100. Students of this College have thus taken no less than 24% in number and 28% in value of the Scholarships offered for competition.

GLEN'S SCHOOL.

Mr. JOHN CUMMING.

Attended all the meetings of the Trustees, also the meetings of the Sub. Committee on Finance of which appointed a member. The last meeting of the Trustees was held on 26th May last, when the Secretary was instructed to transfer all books, deeds, etc., to the Governors of the Glasgow and West of Scotland Technical College in terms of the 19th Section of the Scheme, which has been done.

HUTCHESON'S EDUCATIONAL TRUST.

The DEACON CONVENER.

Reports that the Schools connected with the Trust have been maintained during the year in a very high state of efficiency. Has attended regularly the committee and general meetings.

THE GLASGOW GENERAL EDUCATIONAL ENDOWMENTS BOARD.

Attended almost every meeting during the year, and, as formerly, acted as Convener of the Finance Committee. The Institution is in full operation and doing good work.

There have been seven Governors' meetings and eleven Financial Committee meetings during the year, the greater number of which have attended. Was appointed to represent the Board as a Governor of the West of Scotland Technical College.

The Members of Parliament for the City and County have given their sympathy to the movement, and the House will, I have no doubt, be again asked to strengthen the hands of the Managers in furthering this object.

Attended regularly the weekly meetings of the House Committee, also the Board meeting once a month. The Institution is well worthy of the support of the House and the various Incorporations.

LUNATIC ASYLUM.

Mr. ANDREW CLARK.

Attended one meeting of Directors, and made two visits to the Asylum, and on each occasion went over the House with one of the resident Doctors. Everything is being done for the comfort and welfare of the patients. The Asylum is scrupulously clean, with great regularity in all the arrangements.

Mr. R. B. GALBRAITH.

Attended one meeting of Directors. Twice visited and inspected all the departments of the House, and found everything satisfactory for the comfort and welfare of the patients.

ASYLUM FOR THE BLIND.

Mr. ROBERT HAMILTON.

Have attended most of the meetings during the past year.

Institution is progressing very satisfactorily, but to sustain and promote its efficiency a larger increase of public sympathy and support desirable both in the way of Subscriptions to its Funds, and purchases of the various useful articles manufactured.

Several new industries have been introduced to replace others now unsuitable, owing to their unremunerative nature, principally occasioned by the introduction of machinery, and through foreign competition. These comprise the making of cork fenders, carpet hassocks, woven wire spring mattresses, and recaning chair seats. It is intended to still further introduce new and suitable industries.

Owing to the unfortunate fire the workshop accommodation is presently insufficient. The new premises will be admirably adapted for a large business, and permit the employment of an increased number of blind people.

TRADES' HOUSE.—HALL BUILDINGS.

I have pleasure in submitting the accompanying drawings, illustrating a scheme for the partial reconstruction of the Hall buildings.

I have prepared plans and sections, Nos. 1 to 5, shewing the present arrangement of the buildings, and plans, Nos. 1 to 3, shewing the proposed partial reconstruction.

The large Hall and the lesser Hall are not altered, except that an additional door to the large Hall is proposed; nor is any alteration made on the spirit merchant's shop, Nos. 81-83 Glassford Street, or on the front portion of the restaurant, Nos. 87 and 89 Glassford Street.

The shop, No. 79 Glassford Street, also remains as at present, except a trifling alteration at the back part, to be afterwards referred to.

The scheme aims at the better and more profitable occupation of the portion of the site next Virginia Place; the using of apartments on the ground floor and above the Halls, at present yielding no income; and the providing of additional apartments in connection with the Hall, which will add to its convenience and accommodation, for the purposes of the "House" and increase its letting value.

The alterations may be described as follows:—

Ground Floor.—The dining-room, smoking-room, ladies' room, and other accommodation connected with the restaurant, and lying between Virginia Place and the back wall of the Hall, to be removed and replaced by similar accommodation, with increased floorage, and improved as regards arrangement and lighting.

The north and south (end) walls of the dining-room, although shown new on the plan, may not require to be removed; but the outside wall next Virginia Place, and the back wall, should be removed and rebuilt with larger window space, to improve the lighting, not only of the dining-room,

but of the apartments behind, and the alterations proposed would considerably increase the letting value of the premises.

The large apartment under the lesser Hall, at present used as a kitchen in connection with the Hall, is inconveniently placed, and unnecessarily large for the purpose. It is proposed to utilise it as a warehouse, store, or workshop, and in connection therewith an office is provided.

The entrance to these premises would be from Virginia Place, and being on the ground floor and of moderate extent, a tenant would readily be found.

It is further proposed to utilise the space presently occupied by the officer's office and dwelling-house as a shop on the ground floor and a service room and kitchen on the upper floors.

A spacious staircase (with goods hoist), the access being from Virginia Place, rises from this level to the upper floors.

First Floor or Hall Level.—The meeting-room (above the dining-room of the restaurant, and formerly used as a school-room), the safe, and the minor stairs are removed, and a new Hall, with a large ante-room *en suite* provided.

The minor staircases referred to are not required under the re-arrangement, and accommodation for the safe can be found in the basement, if necessary.

The new Hall and ante-room would form a valuable and convenient adjunct to the Grand Hall, supplying much-needed accommodation for the purposes of the "House," and increasing materially the usefulness of the Grand Hall for general purposes, and therefore its letting value.

These apartments are so arranged that they have a separate entrance from Virginia Street. They could be let separately, and would be suitable for many public purposes. The present meeting-room (old school-room) is not of much value in connection with the Grand Hall; it cannot be separately occupied for public purposes, and a considerable increase of revenue might fairly be expected from the additional accommodation in connection with the Grand Hall; and as a separate occupation. Lavatory accommodation is provided in connection with the present lesser Hall, in which the meetings of the "House" are held, and in connection with the new Hall.

New kitchens and service rooms are provided in the space (two floors) at the north end of the large Hall, formerly occupied by the officer's house. In this position the kitchen would be more conveniently placed in relation to the Hall than the present kitchen.

The officer's house of three apartments, instead of four as at present, would occupy the space (two floors) at the south end of the Hall. As the letting of the Halls is now under the management of the Clerk to the House, there is not the same need as formerly for the officer having an office. The access to the officer's house would be by a private stair rising from the ground floor, as shown on the plan.

The present window in the main staircase would be blocked up by the new staircase; but a new window would be opened up in the south wall, and, in addition, it would be lighted by a cupola in the roof. The lighting of the staircase would be greatly improved by this arrangement.

The present staircase and the new staircase are connected by a doorway on the half landing, thus providing a new and convenient means of exit from the Grand Hall.

There is only one door from the street at present, and it is most desirable that the Hall should be improved in this respect. With the additional door from the Hall to the corridor, and the additional exit by the new staircase to Virginia Place, it would meet the most recent requirements as regards exits, and compare favourably with other Halls in the city.

Second Floor.—A Second Floor over the new Hall and Ante-room is to be constructed, and the area obtained, along with the old School-rooms above the lesser Hall and the Grand Hall, is to be utilised as warehouses and workrooms, with offices attached.

The space could be let in one, two, or more occupancies. The subdivision of the space and the lavatory arrangements have not been shewn on the plan, but it would be divided to suit tenants.

In the central positions occupied by these premises, and being on the second floor only, with convenient and easy access from the street, and having a hoist for goods from the street level, they would command fair rents for many classes of occupation.

The present rents of the shops are moderate.

The three shops were let in 1877-78 at £430. In 1879-80 they were reduced to £390, and there has been no change since that date. The annual revenue from the Halls has ranged from £1035 in 1875-76 to £242 18s. 11d. in 1882-83; but the former year was quite exceptional, owing to a prolonged occupation and a large number of special lets, the highest revenue, apart from special circumstances, being £448 3s. in 1884-85. The average revenue during the past 7 years has been £333 17s. 1d.

The prices obtained for the use of the Hall appear to have decreased steadily for several years.

During the same period, 1875 to 1886, the charge for soirees has fallen from £5 5s. to £3 3s. and £4 4s.

These reductions are no doubt largely due to the superior attractiveness of, and accommodation connected with, more modern Halls; but with the improvements proposed to be effected, it is not unreasonable to anticipate an increased revenue by more numerous lets at improved rates.

I estimate the additional rental to be derived from the buildings, if the proposed alterations are carried out, as follows:—

I have made a careful calculation of the probable cost of carrying out the proposed alterations and additions, and allowing full rates for the new buildings; a sum of £500 for alterations on the main staircase, etc., and 10 per cent. for contingencies, I estimate the same at *Three thousand six hundred pounds* (£3,600).

During the alterations there would be a loss of revenue, arising from disturbance to tenants, and Hall lets, for which provision has to be made.

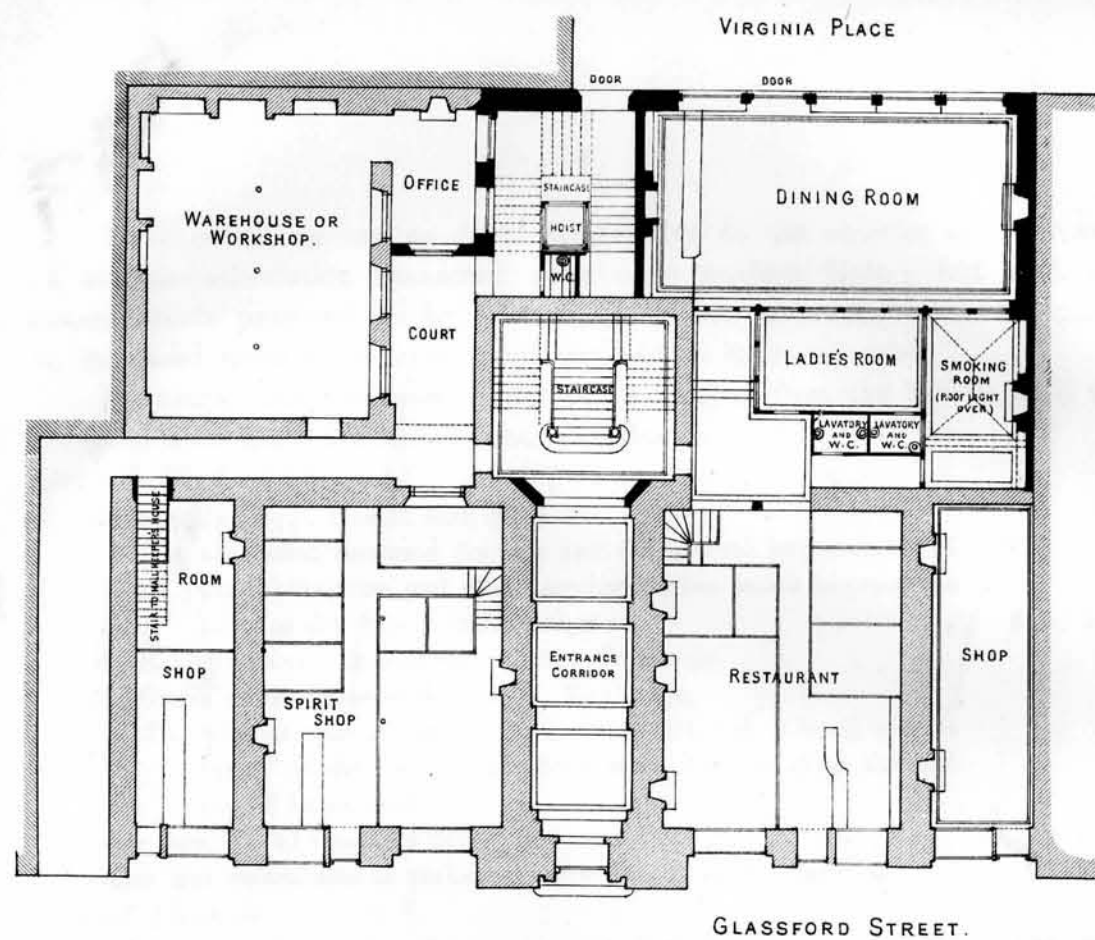
Adding the probable loss of revenue to the cost of the structural alterations, a full estimate of the whole cost would be *Four thousand pounds* say £4,000.

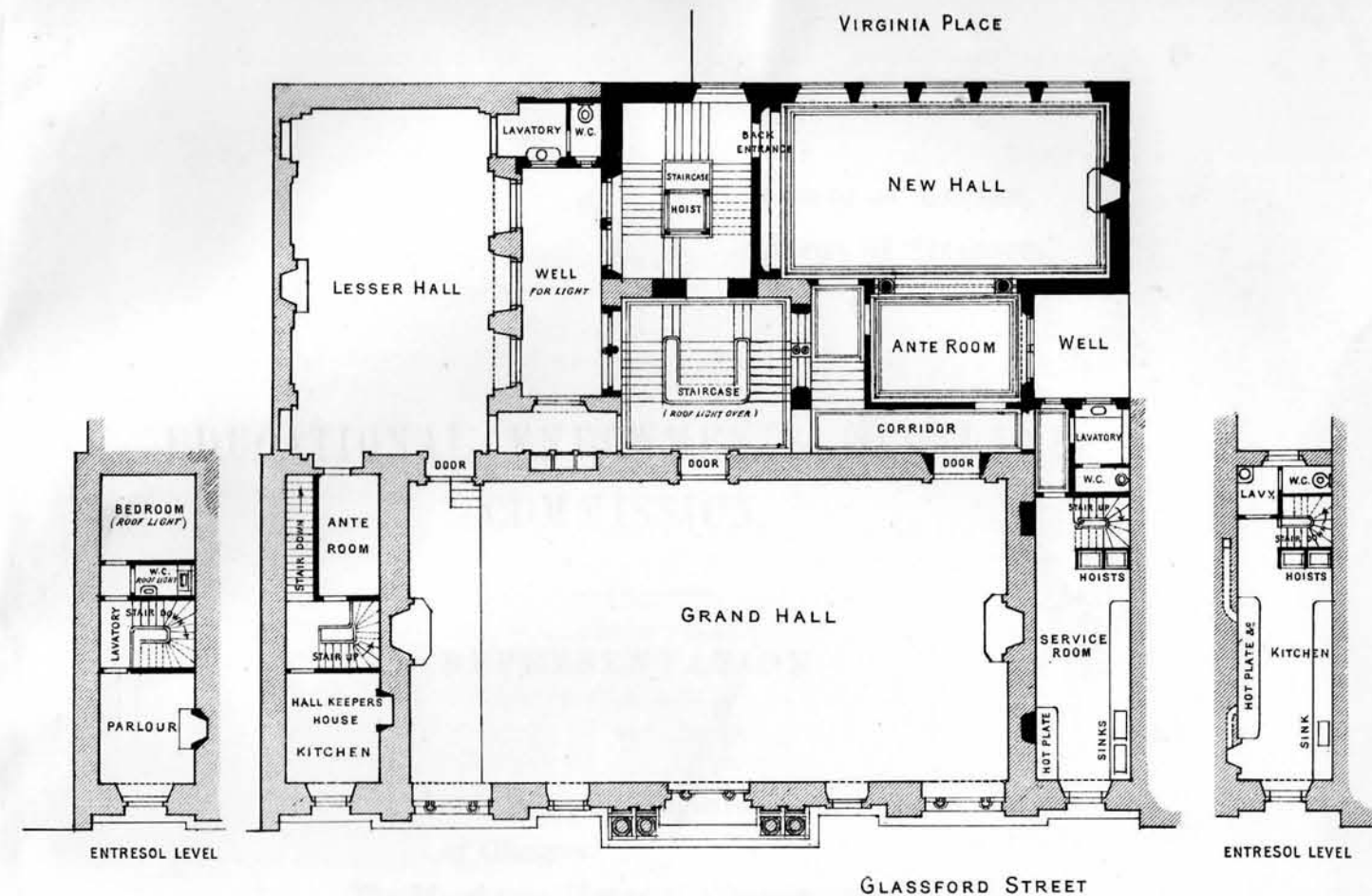

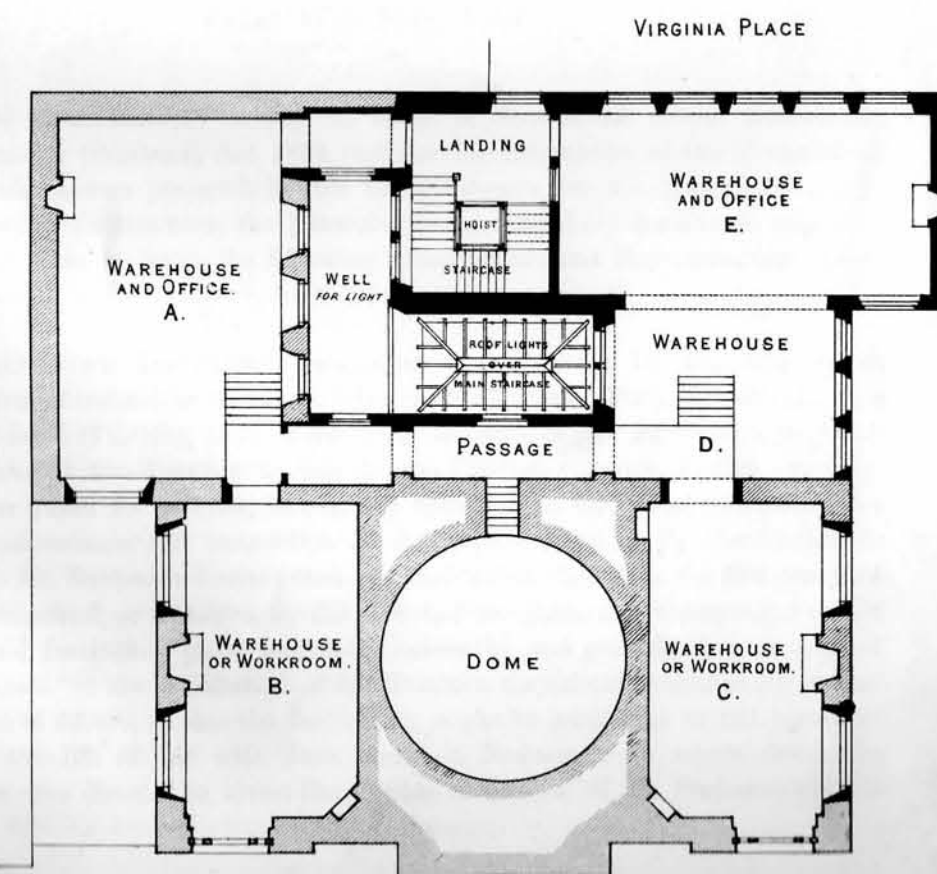
PLAN OF GROUND FLOOR.

EDUCATIONAL ENDOWMENTS (SCOTLAND) COMMISSION.

REPRESENTATION

BY

The Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Town Council
of Glasgow,
The Merchants House of Glasgow, and
The Trades House of Glasgow,

ANENT THE

Draft Scheme for the Administration of the
Endowment known as BUCHANAN'S INSTITUTION,
hitherto held and administered under the Will
of James Buchanan, 49 Moray Place, Edinburgh,
dated 17th May, 1857.

The Commissioners having, in terms of Section 23 of the Educational Endowments (Scotland) Act, 1882, sent for the information of the Memorialists the Draft Scheme prepared by the Commissioners for the Administration of BUCHANAN'S INSTITUTION, the Memorialists have carefully considered the same, and beg leave to make the following Observations and Representations thereanent:—

BUCHANAN'S INSTITUTION originated in a bequest by the late James Buchanan, Merchant in Glasgow, latterly of 49 Moray Place, Edinburgh, in a Codicil dated 17th May, 1857, to his Trust Disposition and Settlement, by which he instructed his Trustees to pay to the City of Glasgow, £3,000 annually, "for ten years, for carrying into active operation an Industrial Institution for the maintenance and instruction of destitute children." By the Codicil to his Will Mr. Buchanan directed that the Institution should, in the first instance, be experimental, or tentative, for the period of ten years, and thereafter, "should the said Institution prove eminently successful, and give decided promise of usefulness," to the satisfaction of his Trustees, they should continue the annual payment of £3,000, so that the Institution might be continued in full operation during the life of his wife, Jane Jack or Buchanan; on whose death the Trustees were directed to invest the residue or balance of Mr. Buchanan's estate

"in the Stock of the Bank of England in name of the City of Glasgow, in trust for behoof of the said Institution, the dividends and bonuses accruing therefrom to be exclusively appropriated and expended, in all time coming, in the maintenance and education and mechanical instruction of *destitute boys*, who may be admitted, from time to time, as pupils into the said Institution."

To secure this bequest, subscriptions were made, *inter alios*, but principally by the Corporation of the City of Glasgow of £1,000, by the Merchants House of £500, and by the Trades House, and several of its Incorporations, of £2,005, and the Institution was accordingly established in 1859.

In terms of Mr. Buchanan's Will, the management of the Institution was committed to twelve Directors, three being members of the City Corporation, annually elected by the Town Council; three members of the Merchants House, and three members of the Trades House, annually elected by the Merchants and Trades Houses respectively; the Lord Provost, the Dean of Guild, and the Deacon Convener being also Directors, *ex officio*.

For the purposes of the School, ground was purchased, the title being taken in name of the City Corporation and the Corporations of the Merchants and Trades Houses, as Trustees.

The conveyance of the property to these Trustees contains the following stipulation:—"Second. That should the said Institution which the said James Buchanan declared to be experimental be found not to work successfully, on the lapse of ten years, and that it should be considered advisable by the Directors appointed for the management of the same to abandon it, and carry it on no longer, then and in that case the said lot of ground and whole buildings thereon shall be held by our said disponees for behoof of the Corporation of the City of Glasgow to the extent of One thousand pounds, being the sum advanced by the said Corporation towards payment of the foresaid price thereof, for behoof of the foresaid Corporation of the Merchants House of Glasgow to the extent of Five hundred pounds, being the sum advanced by the said Corporation from its corporate funds towards payment of the foresaid price thereof, for behoof of the foresaid Corporation of the Trades House of Glasgow to the extent of Two thousand and five pounds, being the sum advanced by that Corporation and the Incorporations of Hammermen, Tailors, Maltmen, Weavers, Bakers, Skinners, Wrights, Coopers, Masons, Gardeners, Bakers, Cordiners, and Fleshers of Glasgow, towards payment of the foresaid price thereof; and for behoof of such person or persons, Corporation or Corporations, who shall hereafter advance and pay to the Directors of the said Industrial Institution, established under the authority conferred by the said James Buchanan by his said Disposition and Settlement and Codicil, such sum or sums of money as such person or persons, Corporation or Corporations, shall so advance and pay towards payment of the foresaid price, and the expense of fitting up and building the necessary accommodation on the said ground for carrying forward the purposes of the said Institution, provided that such advances shall, within six months of the same being made, be intimated by the Directors of the said Institution to the said Corporations of the City of Glasgow, Merchants House, and Trades House severally, and be sanctioned and approved by them, by Minute duly recorded in the Sederunt Books of the said respective Corporations."

In the Fifth place, the said Disposition further provided, that "after the primary object of the Institution shall have been fulfilled, the said lot of ground and buildings thereon shall continue to be held in trust"—"for payment to the Corporation of the City of Glasgow, the Merchants House of Glasgow, and the Trades House of Glasgow in the proportion foresaid, and to the

"several persons or Corporations who shall have contributed towards payment of the foresaid price, as shall be ascertained in manner foresaid, to the end that the said price and the whole expense which shall have been incurred from the formation of the said Institution, shall be repaid and reimbursed to them in case the said Institution should at any future time be abandoned."

Having regard to the foregoing, the Memorialists respectfully submit that the following amendments should be made on the Draft Scheme, viz.:—

(1.) That in Section 3, enacting the Constitution of the Governing Body, the representation proposed to be given to the Parochial Boards of the City and Barony Parishes of Glasgow should be omitted, and that the number of the Governing Body should be preserved by giving one additional representative to each of the Merchants and Trades Houses, thus making the Board consist of three representatives elected by each of the City Corporation and the Merchants and Trades Houses, and two representatives by the School Board of Glasgow.

The Memorialists are led to this from consideration that the interpretation which the expression "*destitute boys*" in Mr. Buchanan's Will has, with much advantage, obtained in the regular practice of the Directors, commends itself to their approval, as it has done since the outset, to all who have taken an active interest in the affairs of the Institution—viz., to admit to the benefits of the Institution boys of a destitute but at the same time deserving class, not absolutely or permanently "paupers," which would be to the mere relief of the poor rates of the City.

The Memorialists would further suggest that the "last day of November" should be substituted for the "first day of August" as the period to which the Governors first elected should hold office—November being the month in which the General Meetings of the City Corporation and Merchants and Trades Houses are annually held, for electing their representatives to public and other institutions and trusts.

(2.) That Section 15, which empowers the Governing Body to sell or feu the property of the Institution, should be qualified with the proviso, that to the price paid, or feu-duty, there should be attached the condition that it is subject to the stipulation contained in the disposition of the heritable property in favour of the City Corporation and Merchants and Trades Houses, for securing repayment to them of their respective contributions in the event of the primary or original object of the Endowment or Institution being abandoned, or departed from.

(3.) That as the designation "Day Industrial School" in Section 22 is generally considered as applicable to a "penal" School, the Memorialists would further suggest that such inference should be avoided by omitting the word "day," and by making it clear that the School is intended for the maintenance, education, and industrial training of destitute boys, and is not to be reduced to the level of a Reformatory Institution.

Further, that the Scheme should by an additional Section, (say 27a), provide for the periodical inspection of the School, as at present, under the regulations of the Scotch Education Department.

(4.) That to avoid ambiguity as to the sex of the recipients of the benefits of the Endowment, the word "boys" should be substituted for "children" in Sections 23, 24, 26, 27, and 28 of the Draft Scheme.

(5.) And for the reason already stated, the Memorialists also suggest that the concluding paragraph of Section 23, providing for arrangements with the Parochial Boards of the City and Barony Parishes of Glasgow, should be deleted.

(6.) That in *Section 29*, which, "in the event of the Governors being of opinion that the purposes hereinbefore (*i.e.*, in the Draft Scheme) specified may and ought to be carried out in whole or in part by the School Board or other public body," empowers the Governing Body "to close the School," or to sell or transfer it to the School Board or other public body, the Memorialists submit that a proviso should be inserted that repayment shall in that event be made of their respective contributions to the City Corporation and Merchants and Trades Houses, as stipulated in the Deed of Conveyance of the property, unless these Corporations, respectively, expressly agree to the purpose for which the sale or transfer is made or effected.

(7.) And similarly with respect to *Section 34*, which empowers the Court of Session on the application "by the governing body or any party interested," with consent of the Scotch Education Department, "to alter the provisions of the Scheme," and *Section 36*, which empowers the governing body with consent of the Court of Session "to incorporate or amalgamate" with other Trusts or Endowments, the Memorialists respectfully submit should be amended to the effect that such "alteration in the provisions of the Scheme," or "incorporation and amalgamation," should be subject always to the fulfilment of, and in no way to derogate from the above-mentioned stipulation.

The Memorialists accordingly crave that the Draft Scheme be amended so as to give effect to what is set forth in the foregoing Representation, and, if need be, that the Commissioners will either afford the Memorialists an opportunity of supporting their views before the Commission, or otherwise will by themselves hold an inquiry concerning the subject-matter of the Scheme, or direct a local public inquiry to be held by an Assistant Commissioner, in manner appointed by the said Educational Endowments (Scotland) Act, 1882.

The Clerk submitted Draft Petition to the House of Lords against the Universities (Scotland) Bill, which, having been read and considered, was unanimously approved of, and authorised to be transmitted for presentation.

Universities Bill Petition Approved.

The Convener stated that he had obtained a copy of the Burgh Police and Health (Scotland) Bill presently pending in the House of Commons, and which has been remitted to a Select Committee for consideration. He explained that by the Bill as presently framed power was conferred upon the Commissioners appointed under the Act to *inter alia* discontinue any existing Dean of Guild Court, and establish a new Court composed wholly of such Commissioners and the Dean of Guild where there is such. Power is further conferred upon Town Councils having a local Police Act to adopt the new Act either in whole or in part, and thus the present right of the Merchants' House and Trades' House to elect four Councillors each to the Dean of Guild Court might be taken away. After several Members had expressed their opinions, the Meeting, upon the motion of Mr. David Kinghorn, seconded by Mr. James Imrie, unanimously recommend that steps should be taken to get a clause inserted in the Bill reserving the rights and interests of the Merchants' House and Trades' House, and if necessary that a deputation should proceed to London for that purpose.

MEMORIAL AND REPRESENTATION

BY

THE MERCHANTS HOUSE AND THE TRADES HOUSE OF GLASGOW

TO

THE RIGHT HON. THE LORD ADVOCATE OF SCOTLAND

RESPECTING

THE PROVISIONS OF THE ABOVE BILL RELATING TO THE DEAN OF GUILD COURT,

1888.

The Memorialists may be permitted to refer to the letter addressed to your Lordship on 19th April last, by Mr. William Walls, Dean of Guild of Glasgow, respecting Sections 192, 193, and 194 of this Bill, and with special reference to their application to the Dean of Guild Court of Glasgow.

It was there pointed out, that by the Glasgow Police Act 1866 (29 and 30 Vict., Cap. 273, sec. 275), re-enacting in this respect the provisions of previous Acts of Parliament, express reservation was made of the Dean of Guild Court of Glasgow as then, and presently, constituted, and of the rights and privileges of the Merchants House and Trades House in relation thereto; that the propriety of continuing this reservation seemed to be recognised by the proviso in Clause 192 of the Burgh Bill, that "nothing herein contained shall be taken to restrict or prejudice the jurisdiction, or to alter the constitution of any Dean of Guild Court as existing at the commencement of this Act;" but that, apparently unintentionally, the reservation was rendered nugatory, by the enactment in the subsequent Clause (193), that "it shall be lawful for any Burgh having an existing Dean of Guild Court to resolve to discontinue the same as constituted at the commencement of this Act, and to pass a resolution, at a Meeting specially called for the purpose, establishing a new Court in terms of the immediately succeeding section of this Act;" as, although the Bill was declared not to apply to Glasgow unless adopted by resolution of the Magistrates and Town Council,* yet, as the Council were by the Bill† empowered to adopt all or any of its provisions, it would be competent for them to adopt the clauses exclusively relating to the Dean of Guild Court, and

thereupon to resolve to discontinue the Court as at present existing, and in lieu to establish another as an appanage of the Town Council.*

Suggestions were accordingly made in Mr. Walls's letter, with the view of preserving the existing constitution of the Dean of Guild Court of Glasgow, to which your Lordship was pleased to endeavour to give effect, by moving in the Select Committee of the House of Commons, an amendment on clause 193, "that nothing herein contained shall alter, prejudice, or affect the existing constitution, rights, or privileges of any Dean of Guild Court existing at the commencement of this Act, the Members whereof consist of the Dean of Guild and other persons, and are not, under the existing constitution, wholly appointed by the Town Council of the Burgh."

On 19th June, when Clauses 192-194, of the Bill were reached, the amendment fell to be considered, but, your Lordship being Chairman of the Committee, and so not entitled to act as an ordinary Member, and having no deliberative vote, the amendment, partly through misapprehension, and partly from the absence of Members who would have moved in its support, was not adopted.

The CONSTITUENCY is large and influential, consisting of upwards of 1600 Members of the Merchants House and of 4000 of the Trades House. The Court is thus strictly and in the highest degree representative of the Mercantile and Trading interests of the City.

The permanence of the Dean of Guild Court, as at present constituted, is a matter of the utmost importance to the community of Glasgow, and the more so in prospect of an extension of the Burgh boundaries.

The Memorialists therefore beg leave respectfully but earnestly to urge your Lordship, when the Bill is set down in the House of Commons for consideration of the Committee's Report, again to move either your original amendment, or the insertion of such other provision, as shall secure to Glasgow the continuance of a Judicature which, from an early date, has proved most efficient and satisfactory in every respect. It is economical in working, and by the confidence which its experienced and carefully selected Members or Lyners inspire, and the soundness of its decisions—which are rarely appealed to a higher tribunal, and are more seldom reversed†—has secured the respect of all whose interests and property come under its purview.

* The Court which the Bill authorises to be established "shall consist of the Dean of Guild, or of the Provost of any Burgh not having a Dean of Guild, and not less than two of the Commissioners (i.e., Members of the Town Council), who may also be Magistrates" (Cl. 194, as amended in Committee); the Town Council being empowered to appoint a Master of Works in connection with the Court (Cl. 195), who may also be the Burgh Surveyor; the Town Clerk of the Burgh being declared Clerk, and the Procurator Fiscal of the Burgh, Fiscal in the Dean of Guild Court (Cl. 196).

While your Lordship is conversant with the functions of the Dean of Guild Courts in Scotland, you may not be precisely cognizant of the constitution, and of the extent and importance of the business transacted by the Dean of Guild Court of Glasgow, or of its special fitness to the general requirements of the City; and as it is of the utmost importance that Honourable Members should have full information on these subjects, we venture to submit the following Representation:—

The DEAN OF GUILD COURT OF GLASGOW was instituted by the Letter of Guildry of Glasgow, in the year 1605, which was confirmed and ratified in 1672, by Act of the Scots Parliament—Charles II., Cap. 129.

The CONSTITUTION OF THE COURT, prescribed by the Letter of Guildry, which has been observed inviolably to the present time, is, that in addition to the DEAN OF GUILD, who is annually elected by the suffrages of the whole Members of the Merchants House, eight persons, popularly known as "Lyners," viz., "four Merchants, whereof the Dean of Guild bearing office the year preceding shall be one, and four Craftsmen, all Guild Brethren, who shall be men of good fame, knowledge, experience, care, and zeal to the Common weal, the most worthy men of both ranks," (Article 3) are also annually elected, four by the Merchants House, and four by the Trades House, from among their most trustworthy and experienced Members.

Specially is this so as regards the LYNERS of the Trades House, who are invariably elected from Incorporations of that House connected with the building trades, care being taken to select Members whose interests are not likely to be involved in the business of the Court, but whose expert knowledge and practical skill in building operations renders their advice of invaluable importance;* while the Lyners of the Merchants House are selected from regard to their experience in affairs, time at their disposal, and general fitness to act and advise in a quasi judicial capacity. In

"in 1864, none; in 1861, one private case and one Fiscal case; in 1866, none; in 1867, two private cases; and, in 1866, five private cases and one Fiscal case. The number finally decided in accordance with, or adversely to, the decree appealed from, in so far as known or intimated to the Clerks of Court, was, in 1864, one appeal, judgment affirmed; in 1868, one appeal, judgment affirmed."

* This is very clearly brought out in Mr. Turner's evidence before the Law Courts' Commission, who states in answer to Question 7684: "The Dean of Guild is generally one of the most eminent of our Merchants, and he is advised by four Tradesmen sitting on one side of him, and four Merchants on the other. The parties come before the Court and submit their plans, and in many of the cases they are not at one about the boundaries; but the Dean of Guild and his Tradesmen enter into explanation with the parties, and suggest that certain arrangements should be made, for example, in regard to ventilation, putting water-closets in proper positions in the house, the strength and stability of buildings, and so on. The Tradesmen Lyners say, 'that wall is not sufficiently strong, it is not founded properly, or the joisting is not proper: you must alter it,' and the parties adjust that at the bar. Those cases are practically unopposed, because the moral effect of these eight men sitting and influencing the parties is such, that they are disposed of without litigation."

addition, the provision of the Letter of Guildry that the retiring Dean shall be one of the Merchant Lyners, or SUB-DEAN, secures to the Court a continuity in composition, together with experience in the conduct of its affairs, and a knowledge of its regulations and precedents, which are of the greatest practical value.

The JURISDICTION OF THE COURT, as defined by the Letter of Guildry, and in the Scots Act "Concerning the Dean of Guild's jurisdiction in "Burrowes" (James VI., Cap. 38, anno 1593), embraced not only "all "actions between Merchant and Merchant, and Merchant and Mariner, and "other Guild Brothers, in all matters of Merchandise and such like causes," which in more modern times have come under the Sheriff and other Courts, but also included what has been exercised by the Dean of Guild Court of Glasgow from the earliest times, and which it still possesses—the exclusive cognisance of all questions of "neighbourhood and lining within Burgh"—in other words, all questions of boundaries within Burgh, and of the erection, alteration, repair, and pulling down of houses and buildings.

The OFFICERS OF THE COURT consist of a Clerk and Assessor, a Procurator Fiscal, Master of Works, Treasurer, and a Dean of Guild Officer. These officials are all elected, and hold their appointment directly from the Court, independent alike of the Merchants and Trades Houses, and of the Town Council. This was deemed a matter of principle, sufficient in importance to call for its judicial settlement by the Court of Session, in the Case of the Dean of Guild *versus* the Magistrates and Town Council of Glasgow, 26th June, 1876, which decision has since been amicably acquiesced in.

The Court holds its ordinary SITTINGS for the despatch of business, on alternative Thursdays, and Special Meetings of the Court are held when the pressure of business or any urgent case requires it, and in cases of tenements dangerous from fire or other causes, the Dean at once instructs inspections and reports to be made; inspection on the ground by the Dean and Lyners is also made when necessary; further, the Dean, when requisite, holds Diets in Chamber.

The PROCEDURE of the Court, as defined by its Acts of Sederunt, is simple, expeditious, and orderly. Two days previous to the Meetings of the Court the Dean and Lyners convene, and, with a Master of Works, go over all the plans lodged and examine carefully into their sanitary arrangements, strength of materials, and stability of construction, &c., so as to be able to suggest to parties at the bar any improvement or alteration which may be deemed advisable. This has proved of great and acknowledged benefit to all concerned. When Linings are granted the plans are carried out at the sight of an Inspector of the Court, and the buildings are not allowed to be occupied till it has been certified that they are in exact conformity with the plans.

The BUSINESS transacted by the Dean of Guild Court of Glasgow is extensive and important. This will be better understood when it is stated, that in the last published Return of the Burgh Assessor, the number of occupied dwelling houses in Glasgow for the year 1886-87 was 112,891, with an annual rental of £3,391,000. The actual work done by the Dean of Guild Court can, however, best be judged from the following abstract of LININGS granted by the Court during the past five years, which, moreover, may be regarded as years of depression,* with less building than usual.

Neither the Merchants House nor the Trades House desire the continuance of the existing constitution of the Dean of Guild Court from any patronage or éclat it may give to their respective Corporations; they do not, nor do any of their officials derive profit, salary, or emolument from the Court in any shape or form, but it is their desire—in which they are joined by the heads of the Civic Corporation of Glasgow and of the Shrievalty of Lanark—to preserve, without the risk of hasty or ill-considered abolition, the existence of a Court well known and tried, and so satisfactory and economical in its working as is the Dean of Guild Court of Glasgow under its present constitution.

The ordinary business of the Court is fairly stated in the following answer by Mr. Turner, in his evidence already referred to before the Law Courts' Commission in 1869:—"No. 7683. Is the amount of work imposed in that way very great? It is very "considerable. I have had a table prepared in order to make the return which the "Commissioners have called for, and the following is the number of the Cases in each of "the years from 1864 to 1868 in Glasgow:—

At the same time it is only just and proper to bring under notice of your Lordship, and of Honourable Members, that the rights and privileges of the two Houses are not only expressly recognised and preserved by public enactment in the Burgh Reform Act of 1833 and Municipal Elections Act of 1860,* but as referred to in the above-mentioned letter to your Lordship, reservation of these rights is also made, and most express and emphatic recognition given to the existing constitution and powers of the Dean of Guild Court, by the several local Acts of Parliament for extending the Municipality, and consolidating, and improving the administration of the Police and Statute Labour of the City of Glasgow.†

While such are the facts, power is given by the present Bill whereby this efficient and time-honoured Court may be abolished, and under which the Town Council of Glasgow may substitute a Court selected out of their own body.

As illustrative of the disadvantages under which a Court so constituted would labour as contrasted with the existing Court, it may be mentioned that whereas in the Dean of Guild Court, as presently existing, there are besides the Dean of Guild, the Sub-Dean, and three other Lyners of the Merchants House, *four* Lyners connected with building trades, of the highest credit and reputation in their respective Incorporations, it is the actual fact,

* Section 22 of the Act of 1833 enacts with respect to Glasgow "That from and after the time when this Act comes into operation, the persons elected (or to be elected) as 'herein before provided to the offices of Dean of Guild and Deacon Convener' . . . 'by the Merchants House and Trades House respectively in the City of Glasgow, shall, in virtue of their said elections by the said Merchants House and Trades House respectively, be Constituent Members of the Town Council of the said City, and shall enjoy all the powers, and perform all the functions now enjoyed or performed by such office-bearers in said City;' . . . 'and the Councillors so elected in the said City and Burgh of Glasgow shall not, at the subsequent election of Magistrates and office-bearers, elect any other persons to fill the offices or perform the functions of Dean of Guild or Convener, but these offices shall be held and exercised in the said Council and otherwise, by the persons so elected as aforesaid, in the said City and Burgh of Glasgow, and by no other persons.'

The Statute of 1868 enacts "Nothing herein contained shall prejudice the right of the persons elected or to be elected to the offices of Dean of Guild and Deacon Convener" . . . "by the Merchants House and Trades House respectively of the City of Glasgow" . . . "to be constituent Members of the Town Council of the said City and Burgh, as provided by the statute Third and Fourth William Fourth, Chapter Seventy-six, Section 'Twenty-two.'

† The Acts here referred to are—viz.:—39 and 40 Geo. III., Cap. 88 (1800), for extending the Royalty of the City of Glasgow (Sec. 2); 1 and 2 Geo. IV., Cap. 48 (1821); 11 Geo. that if the Court had to be constituted by the Town Council from its own number, there is this year only *one* person professionally connected with, or skilled in any building trade, who would have been available for election to office, and he, it may be mentioned, is actually at present one of the Lyners elected by the Trades House.

There is this further and serious objection in the case of Glasgow to the powers of the Dean of Guild being vested in a Court appointed by and from among Members of the Town Council, that the City Corporation, in their capacity of Trustees under the Police, Markets, Improvements, Water, Gas, Lodging and Washing Houses, Parks and Galleries, and various other local Acts, and as holders of extensive heritable subjects, are frequently, and in many important matters, Suitors before the Dean of Guild Court; without disparagement, therefore, or insinuation of partiality, it can scarcely be supposed, when the Judges themselves, as well as their Clerk and Assessor, and the whole officers of Court are also officials of the Corporation, that some bias may not arise adverse to those objecting to the suit of the Corporation, and thus prejudicially affect the judgment of the Court, and lessen its esteem in the eyes of the public.

Other practical objections to the provision of the Bill, so far as Glasgow is concerned, might be urged, but this only need be mentioned, viz.—that by Cl. 196, the Town Clerk is appointed Clerk and Assessor of the Court created by the Town Council. In Glasgow, when there were several Town Clerks acting conjointly, the Principal Clerk was generally appointed by the Dean of Guild Court as its Assessor, and not altogether without inconvenience acted in that capacity. Even then there was difficulty in litigations, where the Town Clerks were the Agents for the Corporation Suitors, independent professional gentlemen of standing having to be called in on more than one occasion, to act as the Assessor of Court, so as to prevent the impartiality of its decisions being called in question; but in more recent times, and when there is now only one Town Clerk of Glasgow, the respected holder of that office felt himself obliged, from the pressure of municipal duties, absolutely to decline to act as Clerk and Assessor of the Dean of Guild Court; since when the Court have successively had the valuable aid, as their Assessor, of the Professor of Scots Law in the University of Glasgow, and on his appointment to the Principal Sheriffship of the County, of the present Stipendary Magistrate of the City, in both instances securing in an eminent degree the qualification of legal training desiderated by the Law Courts' Commission, with the additional and most important advantage of an entire freedom from any personal or professional interest in, or connection with the business of the Court.

In these circumstances it is respectfully submitted, that as there exists no reason whatever for any change in the present Constitution of the Dean of Guild Court of Glasgow, and as the provisions of the Bill, as presently standing, are fraught with danger to that Court, your Lordship will be pleased,

when the Bill comes before the House of Commons for consideration of the Report by the Select Committee, either to move the insertion of your original amendment, or such other amendment as shall secure to Glasgow the permanence of a Judicature so highly esteemed as that of the Dean of Guild Court of the City.

The Ferry and Clutha traffic shows an increase of £2,826.

A grant of £200 was given to that School during the past year, and for the coming Session 90 Bursaries—tenable at the School of Art—are offered for competition to students attending any School. A Travelling Scholarship of the value of £50, known as "The Haldane Scholarship," is awarded annually by competition among Art students attending any School in Glasgow.

HUTCHESONS' EDUCATIONAL TRUST.

Late Convener MACLEAN.

Reports that the Schools have been conducted as hitherto.

In future the Session is to extend from 1st September to end of June, to suit date fixed by the Education Department for the leaving Certificate Examinations.

The first Class has been restored to enable whole families to attend School together.

THE GLASGOW GENERAL EDUCATIONAL ENDOWMENTS BOARD.

Mr. GEORGE YOUNGER.

Reports that there are Free Scholars, 640; Holders of Bursaries, 212.

The Bursaries granted this year number 126, for which there were 591 Candidates.

THE GLASGOW CITY EDUCATIONAL ENDOWMENTS BOARD.

Deacon-Convener TULLIS.

Collector MASON.

Report that they attended almost all the meetings. The work of the Trust is very satisfactory and now in full operation. A large portion of the funds are on deposit receipt awaiting investment.

THE GLASGOW AND WEST OF SCOTLAND TECHNICAL COLLEGE.

Mr. W. R. COPLAND.

Attended all the meetings of Governors during past year except three, which were held when I was unavoidably out of town.

Was reappointed Convener of Property Committee. The Buildings in connection with addition to Allan Glen's School are hardly finished yet, but are expected to be ready for occupation in the course of the present month.

The students of the College have again been very successful, carrying off 9 out of the 25 Whitworth Scholarships offered for competition throughout the United Kingdom.

ANDERSON'S COLLEGE—MEDICAL SCHOOL.

Mr. ALEX. WADDEL.

There were eight meetings during the year, one-half of which I attended.

The principal business has been in connection with the erection of new premises upon ground adjoining the Western Infirmary. These buildings are estimated to cost £3,000 or £4,000 more than the available funds, and an effort is now being made to raise this extra sum by means of subscriptions.

ROYAL INFIRMARY.

Mr. SAMUEL MARKS.

Reports that Institution has been fairly prosperous during the past year. In August the Directors were able to open a well-appointed Home for the Nurses. For convalescent patients a Verandah has been provided where it is proposed to have plants and flowers. A supply of these the Directors are anxious to receive, and this I mention as some of the Members of the House may have such to spare.

The proposal to have the Medical School erected into a College of the University is still being urged.

WESTERN INFIRMARY.

Have attended the weekly meetings of House Committee and the general meetings of Board, also made frequent visits to the Institution. Mr. Bayne being in the Medical Committee also attended these meetings.

LUNATIC ASYLUM.

Attended the meetings of Directors, also visited the House when appointed. Found everything highly satisfactory.

Mr. R. B. GALBRAITH.

Attended one meeting of Directors and made four visits to the House.

ASYLUM FOR THE BLIND.

Attended most of the meetings during the year.

The number of blind people receiving the benefits of this Institution is slightly in excess of last year, and the applications for admission to the Industrial Department are more numerous than at any former time. The new buildings will shortly be occupied, and from their complete arrangements will give greater accommodation both for work and workers, and otherwise facilitate the usefulness of the Institution.

After careful enquiry I find that none of the blind people at present in the Institution are connected with any of the Incorporations, but this should not prevent the Incorporations subscribing annually in support of the good work being done by this Institution.

Rules for the Trades' House Junior Scholarships.

1.—The above Scholarships of the Trades' House are for the promotion of higher education.

2.—There shall be thirty Junior Scholarships, of the average value of Fifteen Pounds, and tenable for three years,—Ten Pounds to be paid the first year; Fifteen the second; and Twenty the third year; but the minimum of 400, out of 1000 marks, must be reached in order to entitle to a Scholarship. Ten of these to be filled up annually.

3.—These Scholarships shall be open to—

- (a) Children of Freemen in connection with any of the Fourteen Incorporations, educated in any School; such Freemen having been duly qualified Members of their Incorporation, and on the Roll for at least year and day; and
- (b) Grandchildren of Freemen qualified as aforesaid, provided that no Scholarships shall be awarded to such, so long as a sufficient number of Children of Freemen have attained the minimum number of marks, to take up the whole Scholarships available; and further, that any Scholarships which may not be taken up by Children shall be awarded to the Grandchildren competing, provided they have attained the minimum number of marks.

4.—A boy or girl able to pass an Examination in the Fifth* Standard of the Scottish Code, and any two of the Specific Subjects of secular instruction mentioned in said Code, will be eligible for a Junior Scholarship.

5.—The holders of the Junior Scholarships shall be required to attend some School where a graduated course of higher instruction is given, and give evidence of attention to their studies by submitting to the Clerk of the House a certificate from their Teacher, before the second half of their annual allowance is paid.

6.—The Examination shall be held in July of each year.

7.—The payments to be made in November and May in each year.

8.—The Scholarships shall be awarded according to the merits of the Candidates, on the report of a duly-qualified Examiner appointed by the Committee on Education, with the sanction of the House.

9.—The Committee on Education reserve to themselves the right of testing the progress of the holders of Scholarships at the end of each year, and, in the event of not being satisfied with the progress made, or if inattention to studies or misconduct on the part of any one holding any of the above Scholarships, it shall be in the power of the Committee to suspend from the benefits of said Scholarships or altogether deprive of the same.

* STANDARD V.—*Reading*.—Reading with expression a short passage of prose or poetry, with explanation, grammar, and elementary analysis of simple sentences. *Writing*.—Writing from memory the substance of a short story or narrative read out twice by the Inspector; spelling, grammar, and handwriting to be considered. *Arithmetic*.—Practice, bills of parcels, and simple proportion. *History and Geography*.—Outlines of the History of Great Britain from the Union of the Crowns to the death of George III. Geography of Scotland, with special knowledge of the county in which the school is situated, and map-drawing of it.

Rules for "The Searcy Bursary."

1. There shall be One Bursary of the value of £18 per annum, tenable for three years.
2. Competitors must be sons of Members of any of the Fourteen Incorporated Trades of Glasgow, and prepared to enter on their first or second year's course at the University. They shall lodge an application, on a Schedule to be furnished, and must be recommended by the Director of Education of the Incorporation to which they belong.
3. Attendance must be given at the Arts Classes of the Glasgow University.
4. The Bursary shall be awarded according to the merits of the Candidates found eligible to compete, or it shall be in the option of the Trades' House Committee on Education to recommend such applicant as they may see fit to be appointed to the Bursary without competition. In the event of a Competition, the examination shall be that fixed for the Trades' House Senior Scholarships. A minimum of 400 out of 1000 marks must be reached in order to entitle to the Bursary.
5. The Examination shall be held or the appointment made not later than the month of October. All vacancies shall, besides being intimated to the Clerks of the several Incorporations, be advertised in the Glasgow newspapers.
6. The payments shall be made half-yearly in May and November in equal proportions.
7. The Bursary shall not be held along with the Trades' House Junior or Senior Scholarships.
8. The holder of the Bursary shall, at the close of each Session, produce to the Clerk of the Trades' House the Certificates granted by the Professors, and in the event of his not being satisfied with the progress made, or if evidence is received of inattention to studies or misconduct on the part of the holder of the Bursary, it shall be in the power of the Committee on Education to suspend such holder from the benefits thereof, or altogether deprive him of the same.
